Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Anthony & St Pius Families,

12th Sunday Ordinary Year B

Mark Mk 4:35-4

"Keep Jesus in your boat." Even if he's asleep, you want Him in your boat! He alone wil see us through our storms, because He is our refuge, our 'reset' our still point in the storm from which our peace is positioned and our strength comes. Not by accident, this whole episode occurs following Jesus' invitation to the apostles to retreat from the tumultuous turnabouts in the mass crowd ('to the other side' v. 35). Jesus was calling them into a period of recollection and renewal with Him. Only it happens that instead, they get out on to the open water, and with another rising storm they are back into an unfocused panic mode. They do call out to Him for help. That's good, that they instinctively know what to do when 'in deep', but Jesus wants to lead them to a place of peace in their hearts, where they do not have to be so 'reactive' to every push and pull of the winds. Perhaps if they were more 'centered' on Him, then they wouldn't be so dissipated in the crowds, or quick to grow anxious in any storm. So, the apostles teach us that just claiming Jesus, doesn't bring us His fruit. We have to be intentional about holding His peace within us, and cultivating His presence among us. They had Jesus in their boat, but they obviously weren't fully conscious of who He was--His providence/protection (awake or asleep- Jesus is God!) so even though we go through the motions of 'getting away with Jesus', do we take full advantage of His presence, allowing His peace to soak into our souls.

Some years ago I read an essay of Michel Montaigne (AD 1533-92), titled 'On Solitude', where he counseled, "We must reserve a back shop all our own, entirely free, in which to establish our real liberty and our principal retreat and solitude." Montaigne's words emphasize the value of remaining true to one's own self (who God made you to be) but more importantly related to today's gospel, he advises us to seek a calm place ('back shop' or 'prayer corner') away from the chaos of the crowds - to listen to one's own heart- to commune with God in a sanctuary of one's own. Montaigne diagnoses correctly that in a crowded mob, we are tossed around and subsequently torn from our inner peace and focus. He writes that, "Contagion is very dangerous in the crowd......The wise person will flee the crowd, endure it if necessary but given the choice, choose solitude." A similar insight is expressed by the Scottish economist Charles Mackay (AD 1812–89). In his book Popular Delusions and the Madness of Crowds when he said that, "It will be seen that men go mad {quickly} in herds, while they only recover their senses slowly, and one by one." So, Jesus wisely calls His apostles to retreat with Him, to keep anchored in His presence and in His person. Their bustling business in the crowds had dispersed their energies. Jesus sought to distil their focus again on Him and His mission. But it was not enough for them to just go with Jesus geographically to a place of rest, they also needed to 'rest' in their own minds with Him. Jesus took them away from the crowds, but they had to 'take the crowd' out of their minds. There is a double move here of first setting time aside to be with Jesus, but also setting everything else aside to truly be WITH Jesus, absorbed with only His Presence in that time.

Please allow me a few notes on that splendid phrase in the gospel, "the other side". This call of Jesus to the apostles is a wink to them that they are in for a 'revelation'- the other side! Buckle up because they are in for a transformative initiation, a rite of passage, or a vision quest opening before them. Such a call is typical of all 'lifechanging' journeys! I compare this 'stormy night' survival episode of the apostles to the similar Transfiguration story and its flash of light on the mountainside later on between Jesus and some apostles. One is by land and one by sea, (St Paul's is even later on by horseback, like Revere?) but these are all cases of a revelation scene where the awesome might of Jesus as 'Son of God' (a Savior to be trusted completely) is made known through an epiphanic experience. In all of the cases too, even though there is a withdrawal leading to a great revelatory high point, there is also a 'return' to one's routine work. This is typical of hero journeys too, that a leader will retreat for the purpose of returning (though changed-gifted with something to bring back), yet returning with greater focus and mission to share more than before, with other people. Recall that Peter wants to camp out and stay on the mount making tents, but Jesus walks them back down the hill. And in the case of the sea storm revelation here, Jesus and the apostles do make it to the shore again to resume their mission work (same with Paul). But now the leader is refreshed and renewed to take up the cause of the Kingdom again. So, also our time away with Jesus is meant to make us better! Daily prayer does that in small ways, but days of recollection can offer us even more, as an attempt to rediscover what we are doing everyday. I pray the summer allows everyone an opportunity to 'retreat' and 'return' refreshed and renewed, for our daily missions! Peace, Fr Brian
