



Save-the-Date - Diocesan Men's Conference!

Please mark March 20, 2021 in your calendar for the Annual Diocese of Harrisburg (Virtual) Men's

Conference. Theme: Catholic Men: Called to be Defenders of the Faith!

Speakers: Dr. William Donohue, President of the *Catholic League*, The Most Rev. Ronald Gainer, Fr. Frederick Miller, Fr. John Szada, and Mr. Tony Devlin. There will also be Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament with Benediction led by Bishop Gainer, as well as outstanding music. This conference is one of the largest annual events in the Diocese every year. The cost this year is just \$10 per man. It is open to Catholics and non-Catholics alike. If you are not able to watch it livestreamed on March 20, you'll still want to register since all registrants receive a link to the conference several days after its completion. Online registration will be available on the Diocesan website shortly. If you are a man in the Diocese of Harrisburg, you do not want to miss this conference!

Guidelines & Restrictions on resuming Mass in the Church.

Only the front double doors will be used for *entering* the Church. Upon *leaving* the Church, the downstairs parishioners will exit the front double doors, the balcony parishioners will exit down the right side ramp and leave thru the side door, nearest the pulpit.

Please maintain proper social distancing while at Mass. Please do not sit in pews that are blocked off.

Parishioners must continue to wear masks when in the Church buildings. Congregational singing is still restricted.

The donation box will be placed in the lobby of the Church. Restrooms near Mary's Kitchen and the restrooms in the social hall can be used. Please do not gather in the social hall.

IS 40:1-5, 9-11

Comfort, give comfort to my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and proclaim to her that her service is at an end, her guilt is expiated; indeed, she has received from the hand of the LORD double for all her sins.

A voice cries out: In the desert prepare the way of the LORD! Make straight in the wasteland a highway for our God! Christmas 2020 at Our Lady of the Visitation Catholic Church - Shippensburg, PA

For our celebration of Christmas this year to be safe, organized, and beautiful, we are adding one extra Mass and reserving seats for each Mass as well.

The Christmas Mass schedule will include three Christmas Eve Vigil Masses on the 24th, at 2:00 pm, 5:00 pm, and 8:00 pm respectively*, and one Christmas Morning Mass on the 25th, at 10:00 am.

With the current seating restrictions, our church building only holds a maximum of 140 people safely for each Mass. Therefore, <u>you will need a ticket</u> in order to attend any of these Masses.

- You can reserve your tickets beginning at 8:00 am on Monday, November 30th, and you can do this by either calling our office phone at 717-532-2912 or emailing Tracy Plotner at tplotner@hbgdiocese.org.
- One other essential step in this process will be to pick up your tickets before the end of the workday, at 4:00 pm on Monday, December 21st. If you do not pick up your tickets before this date, then your seats will be opened to others looking to reserve seats.
- The tickets will be put in envelopes and **will be available for pick up beginning on Monday, December** 7th **at 9:00 am at the door to the Church Office.** The church office is closed for meetings, but it is staffed from 9:00 4:00 pm, Monday through Thursday.
- If you cannot pick up your tickets during our office hours, please contact us and we will find a way to distribute the tickets to you.

Finally, thank you for being patient with this process. If we did not do this, the church may end up being overcrowded or we may have to turn some people away! By reserving seats, we are trying our best to plan for the attendance that may be coming this year and try to do so safely and securely. If all the Masses fill up, then we may add additional Masses this year to account for these numbers.

May we prepare our hearts for Christmas, and allow Jesus to come more fully into our souls and our lives! God Bless you!
