Ox Yoke Inn's New Cookbook

Sharing Recipes and Stories Since 1940, the Ox Yoke Inn in Amana has been serving food family style.

"Now after 84 years we want to tell our story the best way we know how – through our food. We've collected 67 of our recipes, from our rhubarb meringue pie to our pickled ham, in this first ever Ox Yoke Inn cookbook, Our Recipes Our Story," said Bill Leichsenring, owner of the Ox Yoke Inn.

Filled with recipes from the restaurant and the Leichsenring family, the text was written by Emilie Hoppe. Designed by Deanna Roberts, To the Letter Type and Design, it is illustrated with photos from the Ox Yoke Inn, Ed Kempf, Impact Photo/ Joe Photo along with historical photos and illustrations from the Amana Heritage Museum, the Milwaukee Public Library and from the Leichsenring family.

The book shares stories about William and Lina Leichsenring, good memories of friends, family and co-workers, stories of Amana and its past and the growth and changes Amana has experienced.

"Decades ago, I was able to interview William and Lina several times for Willkommen." said Hoppe. "So when Bill asked me to help with this project, I got out those tapes and notes. I talked to friends and family. Bill shared his stories and he is the best story-teller. He told me so many stories ... about the day the place almost burnt down, about how he took on the job, Bill was barely 20-years-old when he became the restaurant's full-time manager, the day the wall fell down, the wonderful people who've work at the restaurant. . . so many memories."

"Here were William and Lina who grew up in communal Amana. William and his cousin, Henry, leave Amana to play baseball and see the world. They go to Milwaukee and get jobs. William worked days at the Phoenix Hosiery Company and nights at the Wisconsin Roof Garden, a huge dance hall downtown. They miss Amana kitchen house cooking so they gravitate to the German restaurants in Milwaukee where William became friends with the restaurant owners, the Maders and Karl Ratzsch. William dreams of owning his own restaurant. He returns to Amana, marries Lina in 1932 and they made their dream happen."

"They worked really hard. They made their future possible and isn't that our Amana story post-Great Change? Our grandparents had to make their way in the world, dream big, take risks. The Amana we know today exists as a historical site, a visitor attraction and a place to be proud of, because the generation post Great Change, post World War II, did not give up. They saw something here worth preserving and building upon."

Pamela Geiger, Pat Zuber, and maybe Gayle Baumgartel and I were the tallest. Oh, sure, there was Jimmy Furman, and maybe Russell Ehrman who were taller, but they were boys, and who counted boys?

Well, we marched and marched and marched. It got boring fast, so Mrs. Hall had us divide up and march in different lines. This was getting tricky. She had us marching all over the room, and we were getting upset, so we started pushing and giving each other orders. Naturally, no one listened. She finally had us go back to our seats and resume our studies. The next day was a repeat. It just went on and on until our parents came to see us perform. Well, the parents were impressed and even clapped. We figured then that our marching was now over, and life could return to normal. Fat chance because, in second grade, not only did we have to sing "America" every single day, but President Eisenhower declared a change in the Pledge of Allegiance so now we had to insert the words "under God." Then, in fourth grade, we had a MAN for a teacher, and he had the nerve to teach us Roman numerals and fractions. School was getting harder. Who knew what would come next! B.S.H.

"THE ACLUD CORNER"

Did You Know?....

It is OK to use pressure-treated lumber for typical Amana-style post and board fencing. However, use brown pressure-treated lumber (Cedar Tone), not the green pressure-treated lumber. Over time, the color in the brown lumber will wash out/bleach out and it will get that grayish tinge just like cedar wood. But the green lumber will never achieve that same look.
