





Sorting Cards & Mats

Introduction

Students may use these self-checking study cards to learn more about the plants and animals the African savanna. You may make one or two sets of cards and use them at a center, as a free time activity, or with the supervision of a classroom volunteer, or you may make enough sets so the whole class can use them in small groups at the same time. They may be used with



the sorting mats to help students learn more about classification, and characteristics of savanna plants and animals. The cards come in 3 levels and are colored coded: PS-Grade 1, Grades 2-3, and Grades 4-5.

Here are some ways to work with them:

- Select an appropriate sorting mat and the cards that work with it. HBirds the students look at the back of each card to find where that item belongs on that particular mat. Once they learn the characteristics of the items, they can sort the cards and use the back to check their answers. They will quickly learn some difficult concepts using these materials. Focus on one concept at a time for instruction.
- Use the cards in a Venn diagram designed by you or the students.
- HBirds students select a card for further research.
- Students may randomly select cards to use as characters or props in a writing assignment.
- List ways the plants and animals adapt similarly, and how they are different in their types of adaptations.
- Students may also research other plants and animals, and make cards to add to your collection. A Microsoft Word® Template is included for this purpose. Print out the directions (page 5 of the Word Document) and laminate them. Keep them by your computer for student use.

Preparation:

- 1. Run off on photo paper (for best results), cover stock, or heavy white drawing paper, 2 sided. Make sure you feed the pages through the printer so the answers on the back face the same direction as the images on the front of each card. (Print these pages back-to-back: 2-3, 4-5, 6-7, 8-9, 10-11, 12-13, 14-15, 16-17)
- 2. Laminate.
- 3. Cut the cards apart on the dotted lines on the back of each sheet.
- 4. Store in manila envelopes or zippered baggies. Use the image (above) to label the envelopes.

Make as many sets as you wish.



Students will use the sorting mats and the "Savanna Safari Sorting Cards" to learn more about the plants and animals of the African savanna. Three sets of cards and mats are included, appropriate for: Grades Preschool-First, Grades 2-3, Grades 4-5. The sets are color coded so that you may use multiple levels in one setting, if you wish, but you only need to print the set needed for your grade level(s). Each mat features a study of plants or animals on the following subjects:

Animal Classification—Sort animal cards into Birds, Mammals, Reptiles, Amphibians, and Arthropods. Diurnal or Nocturnal—Sort animal cards by their times of activity.

Plant Adaptations—Sort plant cards by ways they've adapted to life on the savanna. (Not included in PS-1.)

Savanna Seasons—Sort plant cards by how they appear during the dry or wet seasons.

Where It Lives—Sort plant and animals card by where they live on the African plains.




Students may use the cards to learn the information needed to make the sort by turning them over to see the "answer", or they may use the cards to test themselves on information they have already learned, as the cards are self-checking.

Preparation:

- 1. Run off the mats you wish to use on photo paper (for best results), cover stock, tag, or heavy white drawing paper. Only run the mats needed for your grade level(s). One copy should be enough to place at a center, but you may make more if you wish. You may want to run them on "fast" or "draft" print mode to conserve ink. If run on photo paper they usually look very good at this print level.
- 2. Letter sized mats must be put together. Trim the inner margins, carefully line the two sides up, and tape them on the back. They will be near 11X17 in size, but not quite that large.
- 3. Laminate.
- 4. Trim.
- 5. Place in your museum or classroom center.

Uses:

- Students may look on the back of the sorting cards to learn new information about the plants and animals.
- Students may test themselves on previous or new learning.
- Use the mats as a setting for a story created by individuals, small groups, or the whole class.
- Draw cards from a pile to select "characters" for student created stories or reports.
- Select a card to do research and write a report.
- Play 20 Questions with the cards or mats.




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


