



THE LORD'S PRAYER

Matthew 6: 9-13 Our Father which art in heaven, Hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil: For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever. A men.

OUR FATHER WHICH ART IN HEAVEN: God is our Father, to whom all reverence is due. Mark 16:19 tells us that when Jesus was received into heaven that He sat on the right hand of God. Therefore, God as a being is in heaven, but God knows all and sees all and so is everywhere. Jeremiah 23:24 "Can any hide in secret places that I shall not see him? saith the Lord. Do not I fill heaven and earth? saith the Lord."

God, being our Father, deserves and expects all praise and adoration to go to Him in that He is our maker and Lord and should come first in our life above any other person in the world. Matt. 23:9 "And call no man your father upon the earth for one is your Father, which is in heaven." Heb. 12:9 Furthermore, we have had fathers of our flesh which corrected us, and we gave them reverence: shall we not much rather be in subjection unto the Father of spirits, and live? We consider it a moral obligation to pay respect to our earthly fathers. So much more then, should we give our Heavenly Eather all respect and honor.

HALLOWED BE THY NAME: Hallowed, according to the dictionary means blessed or consecrated. God expects our praise unto Him. Man, with his finite mind, could never express with words, the praise and adoration that rightfully belong to God and yet God expects us to praise Him as much as we know how. The Psalmist David saw the need of praising the Lord as the Psalms are full of praises unto our God. Psalms 103: 1-2 "Bless the Lord, O my soul: and all that is within me, bless his holy name. Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits:" When, instead of always asking for things, we can give praise unto God, then things in our way that seem like mountains can become as nothing because, we know that our God is just as big as we praise Him to be and just as big as we give Him credit to be.

THY KINGDOM COME: When Jesus came to this earth he came as a king to set up a kingdom in the hearts of mankind. People weren't looking for a king and kingdom in the opiritual, but in the natural, therefore, many did not accept Him. Luke 17:20-21 "And when he (speaking of Jesus) was demanded of the Pharisees, when the kingdom of God should come, he answered them and said. The kingdom of God cometh not with observation: Neither shall they say, Lo here or, lo there: for, behold, the kingdom of God is within you." It is because of the fact that God sets his kingdom up in the hearts of people that we need to pray for the kingdom of God to be established, and not only in our hearts, but in the hearts of others.

THY WILL BE DONE IN EARTH AS IT IS IN HEAVEN: The Father's will is being done in heaven and he wants His will to be done in the hearts of mankind. God's will is being wrought in heaven because there is no one there rebelious to His will. Psalms 103:20 "Bless ye the Lord, ye his angels, that excel in strength, that do his commandments hearkening unto the voice of His word." Jesus is in the will of God as He is making intercession for us. Jesus was also in the will of God while He was on earth. John 4:34 "Jesus saith unto them, my meat is to do the will of him that sent me, and to finish His work. In order for Christ to finish His work for God's will to be wrought, there is a necessity that people let Christ work in their heart now. Jesus prayed in his example prayer, Thy will be done in earth. This means in our earthly bodies. It speaks in I Cor. 15: 47-49 of man being of the earth earthly. It is in the hearts of mankind that God wants His will to be done. There is an unlimited number of things that God expects of us but it is important, most of all, that we obey His commandments. Mark 12: 30-31 "And thou shalt love the Lord

thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength: this is the first commandment. And the second is like, namely this, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thy self." There is none other commandment greater than these. If we obey these two commandments then we will be in the will of God and all other commandments will be obeyed.

GIVE US THIS DAY OUR DAILY BREAD: God has promised to supply our need. Phil. 4:19 "But my God shall supply all your need according to His riches in glory." Jesus didn't tell us to pray for bread to last the whole week but he said to ask for our daily bread. God expects us to have enough faith to accept each day as it comes and not worry needlessly over future days. Matt. 6: 30-31 "Wherefore, if God so clothed the grass of the field, which today is, and tomorrow is cast into the oven, shall not He much more clothe you, O ye of little faith? Therefore take no thought, saying what shall we eat? or. What shall we drink? or, wherewithal shall we be clothed?" Matt. 6:33 "But seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness: and all these things shall be added unto you."

Not only should we pray, give us our daily bread in a material sense, but we should pray for spiritual daily bread. Matt. 4:4 "But he answered and said, It is written, Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God." By no means should we think or suppose that we can stay in contact with God in a complete way on a once a week visit with Him or a few minutes a week studying His word. Daily, we need the Word and the power of God to guide and direct our lives. We would die physically if we relied only on one meal a week, so will we die spiritually if we rely on the spiritual bread only once a week.

AND FORGIVE US OUR DEBTS AS WE FORGIVE OUR DEBTORS: We find in the dictionary that the words: debt, trespass, and sin, all have the same meaning. God will forgive us of any sin that we commit because He loves us. God expects us to forgive others when they do us



YOU - - THE TEACHER ARTICLE NO. 5

You prepare to teach by knowing your purpose. Just what do you hope to accomplish by teaching next Sunday's lesson. WHAT IS YOUR PURPOSE AS A SUNDAY-SCHOOL TEACHER.

Your class is part of the Sunday school The Sunday school is part of - - - not apart from the church. The church's purpose, therefore, is the Sunday school's purpose.

The church is the body of Christ; but this body, the Bible tells us, is made up of people. "A peculiar people," that is, a different people . . people who are different from those about them.

This difference is that they are baptized believers in Christ as the divine Son of God, often referred to as church members. The church is made up of people who are baptized believers in Christ. . .and who are busy at work carrying out His instruction. One must be a worker for Christ if he is to be a Christian.

The church, then, is a body of believing, obedient workers for Christ.

What is this work He wants His body, the church, to do? It is the purpose of the church, of the Sunday school of you as the teacher. WHAT IS IT?

The Lord sums it up in what is known as the great commission. A commission is a task committed to one's charge. The great commission is the task committed to you and to me. It is given in Matthew 28:19, 20; Mark 16:15, 16; Luke 24:47, 48; and Acts 1:8.

It is most complete as given in Matthew, as follows:

"Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of

the Holy Ghost:

"Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you."

Notice that it is a twofold commission. Two tasks are mentioned. Both pertain to teaching.

Jesus said: "Teach. ... baptizing."
This is the teaching of recruitment.
You are to recruit for Christ.

He then said: "Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you." This is the teaching of conservation. After we have recruited, or converted one to Christ, we are then to teach that one how to grow as a Christian.

Jesus in His final appearance to a group on this earth, gave His final message in two words. They were: "Teach . . . teaching."

You are the teacher. To carry out the Lord's commission is your purpose, and this purpose is twofold.

Purpose No. 1. "Teach all nations, baptizing them," is the teaching of evangelism. The teacher is an evangelist, a soul winner. As a teacher you have the responsibility of trying to win to Christ every pupil in your class. Not only that, but you are to "teach all nations"; you are to go beyond your present class. The teacher is to be a class builder; she is to try to get as many into her class as possible.

Purpose No. 2 "Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you," is the teaching of conservation. The teacher is a conservationist: her job, "the perfecting of the saints." It is one thing to win a pupil to Christ; it is another thing, and equally important, to build that pupil into a lifetime Christian. The teacher is expected to do both.

"And God hath set some in the church, first apostles, secondarily pro-

phets, thirdly teachers." (I Cor. 12:28). This puts you high up in the list of God's chosen workers in His program for the church.

As teacher, you have a divine commission, a special assignment, a tremendous responsibility and a heavenly opportunity. Now let us consider the two parts of your commission, your purpose.

You are to Recruit For Christ

You are to be an evangelist. An evangelist is one who converts sinners. To do this means you are to be a salesman, a salesman for Christ.

As a soul-winning salesman you need to meet these three vital requirements:

1. First, you must have a personal assurance of your own salvation. In other words, you must believe what you teach. This means (I Peter 3:15) that you must be prepared to tell others, in "meekness and fear," how you account for the hope that is in you.

2. Having a personal assurance of your own salvation, you next must have a consciousness that people are lost in sin. You are to believe with all your heart that "there is none righteous, no, not one" (Romans 3:10); and


How Others Do it

that "all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23).

3. Assured of your own salvation, and convinced that everyone is lost and needs a Saviour, you must have faith in Christ as the only Redeemer of man (John 14:6), and that His purpose in coming to this earth was to seek and to save the lost (Luke 19:10).

As a salesman for Christ you first would learn the product or the Bible and become enthusiastic about it. This is very vital because without being enthusiastic about Salvation through the Atonement of Christ you cannot begin to win souls to Him.

Next you learn about the market. Where are the customers to be found. As a salesman for Christ your market is unlimited. Everyone needs Him and no one needs money, health, position, or education to obtain Him. God's grace is free to whosoever will accept it.

You must then be convinced that your product is the one your prospective customer needs. Usually there are many similar products from which to choose

but in your field, there is only one available. Anyone wishing salvation must accept Christ or be lost and doomed to the lake of fire. Your purpose, therefore, is to teach the pupil that he is a sinner and that he is condemned to death; that he can be saved; that Christ is the Son of God, and that Christ came to save him.

Field of Recruiting

Where are you to begin as an evangelist? Where do you begin recruiting?

- 1. In your own class. If your pupils are old enough, you are to win them to Christ and to active participation in the local congregation. If they are under age, your responsibility is to teach them to know God as Father, Jesus as His Son, and the Holy Spirit as the third person of the trinity and the other facts of Scripture.
- 2. In the homes of your pupils. Parents, brothers, sisters, and other relatives of every pupil are prospects. As the teacher you do not teach them directly, but through your pupil you win them to the Sunday School and church.
- 3. Among the friends of your pupils. Your responsibility is to train your pupil in evangelism, winning the friends through the pupil.
- 4. The community. Your evangelistic field is your community.
- 5. The world. By giving your students an understanding of missions, of their responsibility for helping win the world to Christ through either support,

prayer for missionaries, or being a missionary.

How do you carry out this divine responsibility as an evangelist, recruiting for Christ?

- 1. By your teaching. You are to "teach for a verdict." Every lesson whether you teach Beginners or Adults, must have an evangelistic application.
- 2. By your prayers. As a teacher, you are personally concerned about every pupil in your class. You should keep a notebook with pages devoted to information about each pupil. Your prayers are to be for these pupils, naming them one by one in your appeal to God. Become so deeply concerned about them that you cannot rest until they are right with God.
- 3. By talking with the pupil. Personal, confidential, conversational instruction is most effective.
- 4. By co-operation with the church's evangelistic program. Encourage them to attend revivals, youth meetings, etc. and then provide the workers of these with a list of unsaved in your class, or in their homes, or among their friends. You can pray for those unsaved in your class until you see them won in Christ.

It is in childhood and youth that most people are saved, most of them between ten to fifteen years of age.

The Tongue

Have you ever made a study of the tongue? Let us look at a few scriptures and a few conditions that each of us must meet. Jame 1:26.

If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's of us must meet. James 1:26.

(2) If any man offend not in word, the same is a perfect man - - - - -.

(5) Even so the tongue is a little member, and boasteth great things

(6) And the tongue is a fire, a world of iniguity: - - - - it defileth the whole body, and setteth on fire the course of nature: and it is set on fire of hell.

(8) But the tongue can no man tame: it is an unruly evil, full of deadly poison.

I have selected over fifty words that are employed by the tongue, used in different manners and places, some necessary, many of them good, and lots of them bad, some very bad. I know you can add more words to this list, for I have not tried to search them out, only as they have come to me. Let us look at them for a few minutes.

Accuse - to charge with a fault.

Address - a manner of speaking to another - - a lecture .

Adduce - to bring forth an argument that bears on a case.

Betray - to lead into error, sin or danger.

wrong. If we cannot forgive others then God cannot forgive us. Matt. 6:14-15 "For if ye forgive them their trespasses your heavenly Father will also forgive you: But if ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." God forgives us because He loves us and we forgive people because we love them. If at any time we will not or cannot forgive someone of anything that they have done to us, we are not in the will of God as we cannot be in His will if we do not love Him and we do not love Him with all of our soul, heart, mind, and strength if we do not love our neighbor as ourself.

AND LEAD US NOT INTO TEMPTATION: God does not tempt us. James 1: 13-14 "Let no man say when he is tempted, I am tempted of God: for God cannot be tempted with evil, neither tempteth He any man: But every man is tempted when he is drawn away of his own lust, and enticed." When we pray, lead us not into temptation we are saying Lord, help me to resist temptation. Temptation is not sin until we have yielded to it and we cannot blame God if we do yield. The building of a Jewish homeland.

The destruction of European Jewry during World War II has by now become part of the past. In it is a finished chapter and catastrophe from which Jews can scarcely hope to recover. The physical and spiritual heartland of a two thousand year old civilization had perished forever. Yet, the further we move away from Auschwitz in time the closer we move toward making it part of our consciousness. Not only is it hard to get away from the fact that the murder of six million Jews is of such magnitude, but also because the events surrounding it are still in a very real sense humanly incomprehensible. No one can possibly understand how mass murder on this scale could have happened or how it could have been allowed to happen. To remember what happened and to know more about what happened assuage somewhat the acknowledged failure to comprehend what did in fact happen. Only now, with a full generation's distance from the Nazi gas chambers, do we seem ready to make the fate of Europe's Jews part of the western historical experience, part of what the twentieth century has meant.

"It was this century," as Andre Malraux has said, "which killed man."

It is difficult to try and understand how a regime of 12 short years could so totally unhinge a whole structure of traditional western values. The Nazis did no less than that. They forced their victims to undergo a completely new order of human experience.

For the first time in history, human beings were processed into matter, and the processing began while they were still alive.

In Hitler's Germany, a highly developed people devised the rationale and methodology for exterminating six million human beings — over a million of them children — and for converting them into fat for soap, hair mattresses and bone for fertilizer. For the Nazis, Jews became part of the non-human universe — the objects of functional exploitation, undifferentiated from other non-human matter in nature, and requiring the same detach-

ment. The world of Auschwitz was incredible, and might now be considered a new type planet. "There will be wars," Nietzche had written, "such as never have been raged on earth before. I forsee something terrible. Chaos everywhere. Nothing left which will be of any value." How true were the words which turned into prophecy by the noted German philosopher.

Hitler's decision to invade Russia was made sometime during the winter of 1940-41. At the same time he decided to annihilate the Jews of Europe. Jews were led like lambs to the Nazi slaughter. Before long the Jews realized no matter what they did or where they tried to go, they were doomed. The extermination of twothirds of Europe's Jews was not inevitable. The Jews of Europe were victims, in a sense, in an unequal contest. The German plunge into "a world without limit" made possible the process of human beings into matter, to create unpersons, and seemingly reached a peak of meaningless in history.

Starvation was one of the ways the

Nazis used to employ torture to the Jews. Following is some diet information comparing the average German, Pole, and Jew before the actual extermination began.

Their fate could not be compared to the hardships of other peoples in captivity. In fact, systematic genocide as it was practiced by Germany has no precedent in modern history and nothing of such magnitude in recorded history. It is sometimes said if Germans could lend themselves to near extermination of a whole people, other nations are similarly capable .Perhaps, but these speculations beg the question. Mass murder of a people on the scale reached in Europe under Hitler has never happened before. And, it did happen to the Jews.
