School Year Opening Ceremony

The pencils are being sharpened, the notebook paper has been bought, the school has been cleaned and swept, the summer projects there are complete. The school is ready for the first day when students walk in that front door.

The Amana Elementary will host their school year, opening ceremony on Monday, Aug. 26 about 8:15 a.m. round the flag pole as new trees planted this year will be dedicated and the efforts of longtime Amana School bus driver and custodian Pat Kellenberger will be recognized. Seven large shade trees were donated to the Amana Elementary School by Whirlpool and were planted on the front lawn, north side in honor of the seven Amana villages.

This is an opportunity to welcome all new and returning students, teachers and staff members and to start the school year off on the "right foot."

Homestead Welfare Club Celebrates 100 Years

An open house will be held, Saturday, September 7 from 1 – 4 p.m. at the Homestead Welfare Club in Homestead to celebrate the club's 100th anniversary.

The Homestead Welfare Club was formed in 1919 by a group of Homestead residents as a social service organization for the residents of Homestead. For years they met monthly (or more often if necessary) in the basement of the Homestead Church where they organized all sorts of events and projects for the village. Everything from 4th of July picnics and Christmas parties complete with visits from Santa Claus to art exhibits and rug weaving competitions judged by Grant Wood were set up by the busy volunteers of the Homestead Welfare Club.

In 1949 the ladies of the Homestead Welfare Club contributed recipes they knew by heart from the days of Amana's communal kitchens to a cook book they called "Amana Colony Recipes." These were "family sized" recipes of those recipes meant to feed 40 people. All Amana cooks post 1932 had done some paring down and resizing of recipes as Amana relearned how to cook for four instead of 40.

The Homestead women wisely understood that if the recipes weren't written down the recipes might be lost and they surmised that these Amana Colony dishes they loved so well would be of interest to the many visitors who were coming to dine at Amana's new restaurants. The resulting "Amana Colony Recipes" has been a popular cookbook ever since and has been reprinted many times. Profits from the sale of this 1949 cookbook have paid for many things including the paving of Homestead's street (the first paved street in the villages other than Highways 6, 220 and 151) and the first village sewer treatment facility.

The Homestead Welfare Club has a very unique place in Amana's history. Formed years before the Great Change of 1932 (when the communal era ended) it's interesting to consider whether the club helped to bring about the change or if it added years to the communal system. On the one hand the club provided residents with a taste of those so-

cial events already so popular in middle American thus hastening the call for modernization and social change. And its leaders became the leaders of the movement that called for change in Amana.

On the other hand, the HWC provided a creative outlet and a social framework in which residents could express themselves and interact. The club was "an outlet" for the young and the young at heart, it released pent up longing for those contemporary things and ideas and thus perhaps prolonged, for a bit, the communal way of life as it gave residents a place to grow, learn, express themselves.

In any event the Homestead Welfare Club is part of Amana's story. It has endured, changed and evolved these past 100 years and is now Amana's oldest civic institution. Meanwhile the club has offered a site for private parties, group events, meetings, Cub Scout, Boy Scout and Y-Teen meetings, 4H meetings, Oktoberfest practice and more. For years Homestead funeral lunches were held at the Homestead Club House.

1939 PHOTO

Exactly eighty years ago in 1939, this group photo (below) was taken by William Noe, with the new high school auditorium as a backdrop. It was summertime and Supt. J.R. Nevelyn had just hired a new inexperienced staff member. Doris H. Blome, born in Victor, became the first kindergarten teacher in the new four year high school district. This eager group of five and six year olds became the initial kindergarten class in the summer of 1939. Since regular school was not in session, all twenty six met in the now converted high school class room also known as the South or Science Room. Those born in 1933, about half shown here, later became AHS Class of 51, only attended a few months before moving on to First Grade that fall. The remainder had an additional full year of kindergarten. Not all students were present on this photo day. See how many you can recognize. Next week's Bulletin will publish their names.

A small group of now senior citizens recently held joint 67th and 68th class reunions, namely the Class of 51 and 52, the same ones in the photo. Teacher Miss Blome, married William Salzbrenner in 1946 after meeting in her adult evening English class. She died in Brooklyn on 22 Nov 2013 at the age of 97.

Florence was born September 8, 1919 in Middle Amana, Iowa, the daughter of William Carl and Emilie Murbach Zuber. She graduated from the Amana High School in 1938. She was united in marriage with George Walter Schuerer on August 31, 1943, while George was stationed in California with the U.S. Army. During George's time in the service, Florence formed a special friendship with Miriam Bell, while in Louisiana working for the war effort. Following the war, George and Florence returned to Iowa and made their home in East Amana.

Florence's first job was working for the Middle farm department, where her father was the farm manager. Following high school, she accompanied her brother Bill Zuber and his wife Connie to help care for their children as Bill played baseball in the Major Leagues around the country. Additionally, she worked at Bill Zuber's Restaurant, the Amana Meat Shop, and the Grapevine Winery, their family-owned business. Florence enjoyed traveling, bird watching, listening to music, and cheering on the Hawkeyes. Most of all, she loved taking care of and spending time with her grandchildren. Florence was a member of the Amana Church Society.


