Incidentally, Brooks is also the oldest man in the country at present. When Preschool asked, as super-centenarians often are, "What is the secret of your longevity?" he responded with these words: "Walk with God and be kind." October 3 Sounds simple enough, doesn't it? And when you think about it, walking with the Lord calendar and being kind are only just a summary of the Greatest Commandment, "Love God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength, and your neighbor as yourself." Jesus tells us that this takes in Notes About all the law and the prophets. And yet, we tend to want to be so in control of our lives that it is 4 Our Folks next to impossible to let go and let God be in charge. Let's take a short walk through Scripture to document those exceedingly rare instances of those who walked with the Lord. In the genealogy of the descendants of Adam in Genesis 5, all, Gift Card like Lawrence Brooks, lived to exceedingly advanced ages. We read of Enoch that "he became the Program father of Methusaleh (who, by the way, was the longest-lived person ever at 969 years). Enoch walked with God; and he was not, for God took him" (Gen. 5:23). What that means is that WELCA 4 Enoch's walk, his relationship with God, was so close that he did not die a physical death but was taken by God directly to heaven. So, too, in the case of Elijah. As he and his protégé, Elisha, were walking together, "behold, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of Sandwich them. And Elijah went up by a whirlwind into heaven" (II Kings 3:11). And finally, for Moses the Sale Great Lawgiver and prophet, it was said of him, "And there has not arisen a prophet since in Israel like Moses, whom the Lord knew face to face" (Deuteronomy 34: 10). 

A Note From the Choir Director

Rehearsals have once again started for the musical groups of LCHT. We successfully held rehearsal through the 2020-2021 (Sept. - May) year following CDC guidelines with no one becoming ill. Unfortunately, we have begun this year with one less member in each choir. Hopefully, after January 1, they will be able to rejoin our groups.

Anyone who enjoys music is invited to join either the Bell Choir or Senior Choir (or both!). The Bell Choir rehearses Monday evenings from 7-8 P.M. and plays approximately once a month for church services plus Christmas Eve. It is not necessary to be able to read music just the ability to READ. In addition to ringing the bells, we occasionally use other percussive techniques, such as marts and mart lifts, swinging bells, plucking along with the use of mallets to create a staccato effect as well as dowel sticks to create a sound called "singing bell". On occasion hand chimes are also used in addition to, or instead of, handbells. All Current members, in addition to the director, gladly and willingly assist new members in learning the "ins and outs" of bell choir playing.

The Senior Choir rehearses Thursday evenings from 7-8 P.M. and is open to anyone from high school age to Senior Citizens. A variety of music is sung ranging from unfamiliar hymns in The Evangelical Lutheran Worship (since there are over 800 hymns to choose from) to newly purchased contemporary anthems. Anthems are chosen that are appropriate to the church calendar year. The Senior Choir sings approximately 3 Sundays a month from September to May plus Christmas Eve and any Lenten services that is held at LCHT.

I look forward to hearing from anyone who is interested in these choirs. Also, if you know of anyone whose home church is still not worshipping "in person" and misses being a part of a group, please let me know.

LCHT MINISTRIES INFORMATION

LCHT PASTORAL CARE TEAM ALIVE AND WELL DURING PANDEMIC

Your Pastoral Care Team at the Lutheran Church of the Holy Trinity continues to function even during the restrictions and impediments of life with COVID-19. Our team of Susan Biehl, Sally Miller, Donna Kessler, Phyllis Weaver, Sue Reiber and convener, Pastor Filer, have been meeting monthly to work with individuals and families who are experiencing crises and dislocations in their lives. Extending the arm of pastoral care in the congregation, our team is receiving continuing education by reading together the book Don't Sing Songs to a Heavy Heart: How to *Relate to Those Who Are Suffering* by the Rev. Dr. Kenneth C. Haugk, a Lutheran pastor and founder of Stephen Ministries which functions in a way similar to our Pastoral Care Team. Discussing a chapter a month as part of the team's agenda, our team members have grown in their ability to minister to those in need by learning how to listen actively to those who are suffering without being judgmental or offering quick and easy answers to a problem. They have sought to become more sophisticated in their approach to caring and support by looking first at themselves and their own prejudices and coping skills. That's why every meeting begins with some time for sharing members' own highs and lows and receiving constructive feedback from other members in the group.

While selection of the Pastoral Care Team is not done by means of simple voluntary recruitment, it is possible to reach out to the pastor or a team member and express one's interest and sense of giftedness for this special area of ministry. Working, then, in concert with the team's synodical oversight committee, candidates would be selected who represent a mix of gender, age, and life experiences such that a well-rounded PCT might emerge here at LCHT. Why not prayerfully ask God if the Pastoral Care Team could be a valid way for you to live out your skills as a Christian in this setting?

FOOD PANTRY:

Our church is the distribution site for the Schuylkill Valley Food Pantry. It is a monthly distribution done on the third Saturday of each month, from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. There is an income guideline and a registration form to fill out, giving us your name and address as well as the number of family members in your household.

Also, there are brochures and information available on heating assistance, ways to conserve energy and general concerns of limited income families. Please contact the church for further information.

Due to Covid 19, distribution continues to be a drive through service.

Pre packaged boxes come from Helping Harvest .

We also pack other donated items into boxes to

supplement the Helping Harvest box.

We are steadily serving an average of 80 local families every month.

CONGREGATIONAL LEGACY & PURPOSE

I have to admit, I'm a sucker for history, especially church history. I love learning about times in the past that I'll never get to experience, in places I can only aspire to visit. I've been fortunate to go to some of those places: I've stood in churches that were 1,000 years old across Europe and marveled at the engineering, been in the cradle of the Roman Empire, lived in New York City and Philadelphia, laid down, in the rain, in the grass of monasteries from 800 years ago that is now in ruins. In all of these places, I try to imagine what it was like to be part of a community from long ago. Sometimes it's easier than others, I know something unique about a place or I know how a building was built, but the end is the same- I am in a place, remembering what I can about it, being part of its history and life.

There is a cycle to these things. Empires come and go. Leaders and rulers come and go. Institutions come and go. All of these life cycles, being born, going through a growth period, living adulthood, moving into the twilight of life, and finally, death, are all part of our lives, whether on a personal or institutional level. Part of the incredible message of Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection is that death does not have the final word. However, no matter how much we try to avoid it, duck it, or deny it, death will have a word. Jesus himself understood that the only way to resurrection was through death - after all, if there's no death before resurrection, what we are really talking about is immortality, which is certainly not the Christian message.

These "deaths" can come in many forms in the church. Maybe it's moving a worship time, moving from 2 services to 1 so that the community might be one and ministry might be effective. It may be struggling with how to do "virtual" church in the time of a pandemic. Maybe it's letting a go special ministry that the church can no longer support with financial or labor. Maybe it's giving up a building to move to a building that fits the congregation. Maybe it's merging or closing.

The truth is that none of these realities, these deaths, are easy to imagine or even embrace. There is real grief, fear, anxiety, anger, and sadness that comes with even thinking about them. It's also true that we are not alone in these decisions. We do not know what resurrection may look like, but we know that it is Christ's promise. History always seems short when we are the ones participating in it. Christ sees the long view and, I think, wondering how we can participate in trying to see that long view is part of our call as a Christian. We cannot see the end but we can think and pray about what next, faithful steps may be. As a church, we have to start thinking about what those faithful steps might be, both as individuals, as a church, and as a synod.
