
Sunday Message

THE WORD

I lived in a Redemptorist community many years ago with an old confrere I will call Jack. Jack was a very holy man, but he always looked dour and never smiled. He had a long, sombre face, and he suffered from scruples. He was constantly worrying about his sins and anxious to go to confession.

Then one day, Jack had a visit from a childhood friend, who reminded Jack of a funny incident that had happened in their school days. Suddenly Jack's face lit up, and he began to shake with laughter, his eyes sparkling, his facial features more alive than I had ever seen them before. It was like looking at a different man, like I had seen his real face for the first time.

In today's Gospel, Jesus shows his real face. He takes his three closest friends up a hill, and something extraordinary happens. Jesus is transfigured. He changes. He is revealed in his heavenly glory as he really is - the beloved Son of the Father.

That's the literal meaning of 'transfiguration' – to change one's face, to show one's true face. And that's what happens on the mountaintop. The disciples see Jesus' real face; his transfigured, glorified face, and they are awestruck. Peter gets so carried away that he wants to erect three tents, to freeze the moment forever.

The reason the transfiguration takes place at this time in Matthew's Gospel is to give the disciples a boost. Jesus knows there will be tough times ahead. He knows what will happen to him in Jerusalem and that life will get difficult for his followers. The transfiguration is a little glimpse of heaven. It shows them who Jesus really is, and gives them a foretaste of what awaits them if they remain faithful to their Master.

DO

On the mountaintop, the three disciples saw Jesus in his radiant glory. Try to see the Godgiven beauty in all you meet.

PRAY

Pray that you will always see the good in others.

SAY

"Lord, keep me faithful to you at all times. Never let me lose sight of you. Amen."

LEARN

Peter, James, and John were so transfixed by their mountaintop experience they wanted it to last forever. It couldn't, not this side of the grave. They had to come back down to earth once more. The lesson is to always live in the moment, to live every moment fully. Attune yourself to the manifest signs of God's presence all around. Live each moment in a way that points to your heavenly destiny.



REFLECT

he transfiguration story offers (at least) three lessons.

First, it holds out a promise for people of faith. It is not easy to be a Christian today or to remain faithful when so many others have walked away. The transfiguration offers us a glimpse of our destiny, our heavenly glory, as followers of Christ.

Second, the Gospel challenges us to see people differently, to see their real face. It's so easy to judge or dismiss people. We can let an unpleasant encounter with someone colour how we see them. Or we meet someone going through a difficult time and judge them based on what they are like now rather than who they really are. The challenge is to see their real face, their best side, to see their God-created beauty, no matter how difficult.

The Gospel also challenges us to see ourselves differently, to see our real face. Many people find it hard to see themselves the way God sees them. We can focus on the negative – our flaws, our failures - and think we don't measure up, and our self-esteem suffers. When we look in the mirror, we see only our faults.

But our faith tells us that God has created us in God's image, that God has counted every hair on our head, and God doesn't create failures. We must see ourselves as God made us, our real face.

What a different world we would have, and what different people we would be if we could see ourselves and others the way God sees us – our true face.
