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
NATIONAL CONFERENCE - The 17th Core Knowledge National Conference was held in Anaheim, California, November 20-22, 2008. The keynote address was delivered by Dr. Ruby Payne. ART AND MUSIC – Classical guitarist and art collector Christian Thomas Lee returned to Lubbock in November 2008. He made presentations to 7th and 8th grade students in the creative writing and intermediate art classes at J. T. Hutchinson Middle School. Mr. Lee spent most of the presentation time sharing original art and historical documents. He also responded to student questions related to the art and artifacts. The Hutchinson students will use selected art pieces as writing prompts in their class. Their writing pieces will be reviewed and considered for inclusion in the award winning J. T. Students from Iles and Murfee elementary schools attended the dedication ceremony.

ROMAN STUDIES - Murfee Elementary 3rd graders completed their unit on Ancient Rome with a PTA program entitled, *When in Rome*. The students revealed the many things they had learned about Rome by playing their own version of Jeopardy, complete with Julius Caesar serving as the game show host. The program incorporated the music, art, and language arts strands as well.



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INTERNATIONAL CULTURE DAY - Waters Elementary students traveled around the world and back in time during their International Cultural Day. Students experienced cultures through their visitations to other classrooms. Each class was responsible for sharing knowledge about other countries and/or time periods through a variety of interactive presentations. This included Native Americans (K), Ancient Egypt (1st), China (2nd), Ancient Rome (3rd), and Europe during the Renaissance (4th). The 5th grade presented a living museum highlighting famous people in history. A highlight of the day was a visit to the Museum Gallery (provided by the TTU K-12 International Educational Outreach Center and Dianne Crowley)

where students were able to explore treasures of 14 different countries.

STORYTELLING – Jim Weiss will again travel to Lubbock to enhance students' language arts experiences through storytelling. He will make presentations at elementary and middle schools in December. Mr. Weiss is an award winning storyteller and recording artist based in Charlottesville, Virginia. Recordings of his stories and books on tape are available through *Greathall Productions*.





HISTORICAL PRESENTATIONS – Bill Perryman of *History In Person* will be in Lubbock to make presentations in March. He will enhance the study of social studies topics through his portrayal of historical figures. Mr. Perryman will visit several elementary and middle school campuses performing as William Travis, Paul Revere, Ben Franklin, George Washington, and Abraham Lincoln. Mr. Perryman is a former classroom teacher and educational consultant. He is based in San Antonio and makes presentations to students and educators at schools and conferences throughout the state of Texas.
