Eucharistic Revival in the Catholic Church:

Weekly Bulletin Articles

The Catholic Church in the United States has been on a 3-year process of Eucharistic Revival, and we are now in the 2nd year and focusing on revival at the parish level (see this website for more, https://www.eucharisticrevival.org). In addition to trying our best to celebrate every single Mass reverently, attentively, and prayerfully, one effort we will be making is **to write a small bulletin article every week for a year** in order to help all people understand the Catholic Mass more fully. Not only can this help us understand how each prayer and symbol and movement has deep meaning and symbolism, but all the prayers, symbols, and movements should also lead us into the reality of Christ's love on the Cross and His grace poured out from the Resurrection and how we can encounter Him present to us today throughout the entirety of the Mass! Please consider reading along each week with these bulletin articles to help you better understand the history, meaning, beauty, and reality of what we celebrate every weekend as Catholics. This can help us to have a Eucharistic Revival at our parish, and to know, love, and serve Christ more fully every time we attend the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass here at OLV.

Bulletin Article #1 = The Sign of the Cross

Most of these bulletin articles will be rather shorter and straight to the point, but today I wanted to give you a bit more background as we get started. We will not be able to cover every single part of the Mass throughout these next 52 weeks, but we will be able to go much more deeply into understanding so many of the prayers and gestures we participate in week after week. For example, we are already skipping over the entrance procession and the entrance antiphon (to name only two of the many we are skipping over), but one of the prayers and gestures to discuss and understand is the first prayer we make each and every Mass; the sign of the cross. The sign of the cross developed into a common practice among early Christians throughout their daily lives such as the great early Church father and theologian Tertullian declares in the early 200s, "In all our travels and movements... we mark our foreheads with the sign of the cross." The cross went from the brutal method from the Romans of torture, humiliation, and execution, to being a common symbol and prayer to say and to trace upon your body for thousands and thousands of people who found faith, hope, and love in Jesus' death on the Cross for our sins.

The sign of the cross is even foreshadowed in the Old Testament prophet Ezekiel who encouraged the faithful people in Jerusalem to mark their foreheads, which seems to be the Hebrew letter *tahv* and would have appeared in the shape of an X or a cross (Ezekiel 9:4-6)! We call upon God's name as Jesus teaches us (see Matthew 28:19) and also remember our Baptism when we make this sign across our entire bodies, and finally, we ask God to be present with us and the power of His Cross to help us as well. St. John Chrysostom in the 300s summarizes this belief beautifully when he says, "Never leave your house without making the sign of the cross. It will be to you a staff, a weapon, an impregnable fortress...It has vanquished death, destroyed sin, emptied hell, dethroned Satan, and restored the universe. Would you then doubt its power?" This small prayer is something we can do and pray many times throughout our day, but it is the perfect way to begin the most important moment of our week; to launch us into the encounter of Christ during the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass!

The Word of God Alive: Discussing the Readings w/your children

In today's Gospel, we hear Peter asking Jesus a particular question: "Lord, if my brother sins against me, how many often must I forgive him? As many as seven times?" Seven times seems like a lot. If my sister hits me once or twice, I may be able to think that it was an accident, but not seven times. That's a lot of hurt. Jesus tells Peter to forgive not seven times, but seventy seven times."



Do you think Jesus meant to stop forgiving on the seventy-eighth time? This was a way of saying keep forgiving, never stop.

Why would Jesus say such a thing? Look at the parable for today about a debtor. To be in debt means to owe someone. Usually that debt is money. The debtor owed the

king a huge amount of money, more than everything he had. When the kind wanted his money back, the man begged for mercy, The king, having compassion, forgave the entire amount. How do you think the man felt? The king is like God. God feels our pain and has mercy on us. There is no sin that God will never forgive if we ask him and are sorry.

To go on in the parable, someone else owed the man money. He did not forgive him but had him sent to prison. When the king found out, he was very angry and punished the debtor.

Each time we go to Mass we pray the Lord's Prayer: "forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us." Another way to say that is "forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors". We know God wants to forgive us and so we ask for his help and his compassion to forgive others. We know God offers us grace to do that. We find it most especially in the Holy Eucharist, God's very self.



Living our Faith: Take time to talk to God this week, so that he may grant you forgiveness from your sins and you can forgive others for what they have done to you.



The next book of the month is going to be *Gratitude and Grit: The Life of Blessed Solanus Casey*, which is a beautiful and inspirational little summary of one of the great Saints in the history of the United States of America. Growing up in a big Irish Immigrant family who were farmers in Wisconsin along the Mississippi River, Bernard Casey showed his toughness but also his compassion, faithfulness, and love through a life as a Franciscan simplex priest that brought so many people dramatically to Christ. He started as a simple porter or door man, but he ended up being a type of celebrity and known miracle worker, even though his entire approach was simply dedicated prayer, time, listening, and humility for those he encountered day after day. Learn about the source of thousands of miracle reports and the man who cooperated with God's plan in this rather short but beautiful book about his life. As in recent months, you will need to purchase this book yourself if you would like to read it (please contact Fr. Ben if you don't have the means to purchase it online), but even if you don't get a chance to read through his story, Fr. Ben will give a presentation on Blessed Solanus Casey and this book on **Wednesday, November 8th in** our Church Social Hall **from 7:30-8:30 pm!**
