

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

Epiphany of the Lord Of Power, Wealth and Anxieties

According to a report by the National Catholic Reporter, in the Republic of Congo, Africa, up to six million people have died in two decades of war and conflict. Two armed groups have exploited the



lack of stable government to plunder the rich and plentiful natural resources. In 1997 Mobutu Sese Seko was overthrown after 32 years of dictatorship. The current president, Kabila, had played a lead role in overthrowing

Pastor Mobutu. His father became president in 1997, and he succeeded his father in 2001. Since then, the 45 year-old Kabila has ruled this Central African country like his personal property. His regime was supposed to end this past December. But like many leaders, especially in Africa, he wants to extend it. This decision has thrown the country into some unrest and conflict. Recently, the Conference of Catholic Bishops of Congo stepped into the conflict to broker peace and find some resolution. Finally, Kabila agreed to allow elections by the end of 2017 and to step down.

I thought of this as I read the story of Herod and the Magi. It's a story of a man, a King, obsessed with power, wealth and material things. It's the story of a man worrying and fretting over a nonissue. Jesus was not in the least interested in replacing Herod. He's God after all. And had Herod known this, maybe he'd not have worried at all. In fact, he might have became a close friend of Jesus. But he squandered the chance. All because he THOUGHT Jesus was a threat to his worldly ambitions.

How often do we squander our own opportunities with Jesus because we presume that Jesus will take away what we have? What is it that we have that He'll take? He's the one to give me & you something we don't have. Yet, we block Him, knowingly or unknowingly.

2017 presents us with a new opportunity to NOT imitate Herod and Kabila, but to imitate the Wise Men, who left everything and went in search of the One who could give them everything.

THE NAME "JESUS" (Baptism of the Lord January 9th)

Among the Hebrew people, one's name also said something important about one's character and history. The name "Adam," for example, meant both "man" and "dirt," showing both what Adam was and what he was made from.

In the case of our Lord, "Jesus" meant "God saves" in Hebrew. The name was doubly appropriate, since Jesus was both fully God and fully human, and died to save all from their sins. This choice subtly displayed both the nature of Jesus and the mission of His life. Ironically, "Jesus" was actually a very common name for boys during this time. In having such a common name with so profound meaning, Jesus also communicated that His mission was not only for the great, the wise and powerful, but also for the common and humble throughout the world. WINTER SAFETY

Every season has its own safety challenges, but winter presents some that can have life-changing consequences.

Here are some timely reminders:

1. Inspect space heater cords before using and keep children and pets away from any units in use.

2. Make sure that furnaces, fireplaces, and wood stoves are venting properly and install at least one carbon monoxide detector in your home.

3. Keep a winter emergency kit (blanket, flashlight, water, snack bars, road salt, emergency flares, bright colored flag, shovel) in your car.

4. Shovel safely: don't overexert; do a little at a time; when using power equipment keep scarves, coats, and winter clothing away from machinery.
