Parish Council: Meets on the Monday evening after the third Sunday of the month. Chairperson: Richard Califano



OF FREEDOM, GOOD, and EVIL



An Atlanta father who reportedly wanted to be "child free" left his 22-month old son in a car in 92 degrees weather for a whole day. While his son was dying he was sending explicit messages and pictures to an underage female. He and his wife (who, evidence show, to be complicit) pleaded not guilty. Sometime ago, the media was filled with news of Ariel Castro

years. At least, he pleaded guilty to 937 criminal counts of rape, kidnapping, and aggravated murder. He was sentenced to life in prison and he committed suicide by hanging himself with bed sheets in prison.

From one end of the world to another, from one generation to another, atrocities caused by us humans abound and they range from simple to complex, ordinary to bizarre, and from all walks of life and trade. The words of Micah come to mind, "What sorrow awaits you who lie awake at night, thinking up evil plans. You rise at dawn and hurry to carry them out, simply because you have the power to do so" (Micah 2:1).

Next come the perennial questions, "Why is there so much evil in the world?" and "Why does God allow terrible things/evils to happen." Well, Micah gave us a hint to the first question - because we have the power the power of choice and freedom. And the Gospel reading of today, Matthew 13:24-43, specifically the part about the sower and good seed and the enemy and the weeds, answers the second question.

God is very much aware of the evil in our world. It is indeed the price of freedom. I remember when I farmed back at home. Of course we knew there'd be weeds sooner or later. But that didn't stop us from planting. And while we weeded our farms, those that plant wheat dare not weed their farms because both (wheat and weeds) look alike until harvest. Still, does knowing that stop them from planting? No, because they know that despite the weeds, they will always harvest enough wheat by harvest time. Thus, the farmer remains patient and awaits harvest time.

Not to feel righteous, but thank God our choices are not as bad as the ones above, hopefully. Still, Jesus challenges us to examine how we use our power and our freedom to choose. The sensational cases above didn't start off with one huge choice. If that father is eventually found guilty, it will mean that while he baked his son in the car, he plotted another evil - sexting an underage girl. Only God knows how the new evil plot would have ended.

Yes, there is, and there will always be weeds/evils in our lives. However, we must never ignore but fight them. First we must fight them in us, then among, and around us and elsewhere!. May the Lord, who is ever patient with us, give us the grace we need to do so. Amen.

MARY MAGDALENE JULY 22ND



Except for the mother of Jesus, few women are more honored in the Bible than Mary Magdalene. Yet she could well be the patron of the slandered, sine there has been a persistent legend in the Church that she is the unnamed sinful woman who anointed the feet of Jesus in Luke 7:36-50.

Most Scripture scholars today point out that there is no scriptural basis for confusing the two women. Mary Magdalene, that is, "of Magdala," was the one from whom Christ cast out "seven demons" (Luke 8:2) - an indication, at the worst, of extreme demonic possession or, possibly, severe illness.

Father W.J. Harrington, O.P., writing in the *New Catholic Commentary*, says that "seven demons" "does not mean that Mary had lived an immoral life - a conclusion reached only by means of a mistaken identification with the anonymous woman of Luke 7:36." Father Edward Mally, S.J., writing in the *Jerome Biblical Commentary*, agrees that she "is not … the same as the sinner of Luke 7:37, despite the later Western romantic tradition about her."

Mary Magdalene was one of the many "who were assisting them [Jesus and the Twelve] out of their means." She was one of those who stood by the cross of Jesus with His mother. And, of all the "official" witnesses that might have been chosen for the first awareness of the Resurrection, she was the one to whom that privilege was given.

COMMENT: Mary Magdalene has been smiling at her "mistaken identity" for over twenty centuries. Yet she would no doubt insist that it makes no difference. We are all sinners in need of the saving power of God, whether our sins have been lurid or not. More importantly, we are all, with her, "unofficial" witnesses of the Resurrection.

STORY: Today's Gospel (John 20:1-2, 11-18) shows Mary at first not recognizing the risen Jesus in the garden, then knowing Him as He spoke her name. Her great love bursts forth, echoing the first reading, "I took hold of Him and would not let Him go" (Song 3:4b). Jesus says, "Stop holding on to Me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father" (John 20:17a). The meaning probably is that there is an entirely new relationship now - a much deeper one, resting in faith rather than the former relationship that was possible because of His visible body. Saint John may also be stressing the fact that Jesus' exaltation at the right hand of the Father is the completion of the Resurrection.

At first, the apostles did not believe Mary. Christ's followers, even today, meet disbelief in their witness to the Resurrection.
