SAVE YOUR FORK-SOMETHING GOOD'S COMING!

A woman was given three months to live. So she invited her pastor to her house to discuss her funeral. They talked about hymns, Scripture readings, even what outfit she wanted to be buried in. Everything was in order and the pastor got up to leave. "There's one more thing," the woman blurted out. "What's that?" The woman continued. "I want to be buried with a fork in my right hand." The pastor was surprised. The woman explained, "In all my years of attending church socials and potluck dinners, I always remember that when the dishes of the main course were being cleared, someone would inevitably lean over and say, "Keep your fork." It was my favorite part because I knew that something better was coming...like velvety chocolate cake or deepdish apple pie. Something wonderful, and with substance! So, I just want people to see me there in that casket with a fork in my hand and I want them to wonder, "What's with the fork?" Then I want you to tell them: "Keep your fork. Something good is coming."

There are 4 primary measuring tools that are important in understanding church growth: 1. Average Worship Attendance, 2. Average Christian Education Attendance, 3. Average Nursery Attendance and 4. Parking. Statistically, if any of those 4...ANY...are over 80% of their capacity, church growth is inhibited. Why? Because once you exceed 80% capacity, human nature says that something is full. Did you know that we are exceeding 80%- at some level- in THREE of those four?! Parking...it's pretty obvious! Christian Education- maxed out! Worship? Room to grow at 8AM...but OVER 80% at 10:15AM.

So what do we do? Back in September, our Sunday morning sermon series focused on where our church was headed. On September 13th, I preached about worship and what was on the horizon. Well...we have reached the horizon! At the April Administrative Council meeting, a new Sunday morning worship service was approved. That service will officially launch on Sunday, September 11- the Sunday after Labor Day! It will feature electric guitar, drums and bass and will be the most contemporary in style of all of our worship opportunities.

The new Sunday schedule will look like this:
8AM-9AM- Current Worship Service- NO changes
9:15AM-10:05AM- NEW Worship Service and Sunday School
10:30AM-11:30AM- Current Worship Service- NO changes except the 15minute change in start time. (continued on page 3)

His Name is Jesus


WHAT: Rev. Mark's Tuesday morning Bible Study

Because only when you come to the end of yourself can you begin to experience the full, blessed, and whole life Jesus offers. The remaining weeks of the series look like this:

Sunday, May 1- Empty to be Filled (Psalm 23)

What's in your jar? (Job 14:7-9, Acts 1:3-8)

Sunday, May 8- Helpless to be Empowered (1Samuel 1:21-28)

The end of me means the beginning of Him. (Deuteronomy 31:6, 1John 4:1-6a)

Sunday, May 15- Disqualified to be Chosen (Luke 19:1-10)

Sometimes, the resume' is a little thin. (Jeremiah 29:10-14a, John 15:13-16a)

Sunday, May 22- Weak to be Strong (John 13:34-38, 18:25-27, 21:15-17)

Our weakness creates holes for God's strength to shine through. (Psalm 34:17-20, 2Corinthians 12:7-10)

On that same day, April 3, we started a new 8-week series at The Point- our Sunday evening worship experience, called **Ripped From the Headlines**. Each week, we are talking about something that is currently at or near the top of the front page of the newspaper. We will see how that "current event" impact us - as both humans and Christians- and what the Bible has to say about it.

WEDNESDAY NIGHT FELLOWSHIP WRAPPING UP FOR THE SEASON


