## The Wheat & Weeds Among Us

Of all God's attributes, Wisdom praises God's "lenience," though "power, whenever you will, attends you" (12:18). Regarding God's expectations, Wisdom



considers one indispensable: "Those who are just must be kind" (12:19). But doesn't God sometimes seem too lenient, content to ignore the weeds, when a glance at the world or

even the Church suggests a little gardening is long overdue? Well, God is in luck. We, God's willing servants, can see the weeds clearly. We'd be delighted to clean things up thoroughly and quickly.

Don't our private reflections sometimes sound like that? Paul acknowledges, "We do not know how to pray as we ought" (Romans 8:26). Rather than praying that we become more like God, we demand that God become more like us, thorough and quick. But God, shrewd householder indeed, knows our zeal but wisely distrusts our discernment. We're zealous, yes, but judgmental too. What looks like weeds to us may be wheat in God's eyes. Thus God patiently defers judgment, postpones punishment.

Moreover, aren't we missing one of the parable's important points by casting ourselves solely as willing harvesters? Aren't we still growing ourselves? Which are we then? Wheat, weeds, or both at different times? Would we want anyone as zealous and judgmental as

we are deciding definitively whether we're wheat or weeds before we've had time to grow to full maturity? Rather bemoan a world or even a church with weeds growing among the wheat, let us praise God's



gracious patience toward that slowly maturing, mixedbag field that, after all, includes us.

This week, what can I do to be a mustard seed or a bit of yeast, doing a little good in a hidden way, making a little difference?

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### MARTHA, JULY 29<sup>TH</sup>

Martha, Mary and their brother Lazarus, were evidently close friends of Jesus. He came to their home simply as a welcomed guest, rather than as one celebrating the conversion of a sinner like Zacchaeus or one



unceremoniously received by a suspicious Pharisee. The sisters feel free to call on Jesus at their brother's death, even though a return to Judea at that time seems almost certain death.

No doubt Martha as an active sort of person. On one occasion (see Luke10:38-42) she prepares the meal for Jesus and possibly His fellow guests and forthrightly states the obvious: All hands should pitch in to help with the dinner.

Yet, as after John McKenzie points out, she need not be rated as an "un recollected activist." The evangelist is emphasizing what our Lord said on several occasions about the primacy of the spiritual:"...Do not worry about your life, what you will eat [or drink], or about your body, what you will wear...But seek first the kingdom [of God] and His righteousness..." (Matthew 5:6a).

Martha's great glory is her simple and strong statement of faith in Jesus after her brother's death. "Jesus told her, 'I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in Me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in Me will never die. Do you believe this?' She said to Him, ;'Yes, Lord. I have come to believe that You are the Messiah, the Son if God, the One Who is coming into the world" (John 11:25-27).
