One of the needs that arose from conversations around these questions involved supporting families with young children. It's a familiar scenario: family members arrive home from work, school, and activities at the end of the day and are immediately faced with the challenge of "What's for dinner?" Social outings can also be hard to come by for young families and seem to be most available at opposite ends of a spectrum, leaving parents to choose between pre-planned date nights with the kids at home with a sitter, and taking the entire family for fast food at a restaurant chain with a play space. It can be hard to find opportunities in between that offer the welcome convenience of a nutritious meal and the chance to socialize with other families, as a family.

In February, at a meeting of the newly formed Faith Formation Committee (a combination of the Worship and Christian Education Committees), when reflecting on committee goals, Russell proposed the idea for a Family Dinner. This dinner would not have an agenda or program, its only intention would be providing the opportunity to enjoy community with others.

The first Family Dinner was planned for Thursday, March 3 and was a great success, with several families in attendance and a delicious meal served thanks to Wanda Barr and a crew of helpers. Families appreciated the time to get together and share a meal, and the kids appreciated the chance to run around and play with friends. This event was so well-received that the group wanted to try it as a regular gathering, planned for the first Thursday of

the next three months. The April and May dinners also received rave reviews! These dinners led to the suggestion that families get together for play time at the new east end YMCA. On Sunday morning before church on April 10, 11 children and their families including grandparents enjoyed time at the play structure.

Eastertime brought its own share of family fun! Thanks to the hard work and creativity of Terri Frederickson, Eastside held its first ever Community Easter Egg Hunt. In a similar vein to Night in Bethlehem, this event was offered to the public free of charge as a way to reach out and offer a time of fellowship and community building for neighbourhood residents.

Several extra trips were made to the store to pick up more Easter eggs and treats, and there still weren't enough to meet the demand of over 400 people! The final Family Dinner before summer is scheduled for Thursday, June 2 and will be a picnic at Candy Cane Park. The meal will again be provided at a recommended donation of \$5 per person or \$20 per family. We hope you and your kids and grandkids will plan to join us. These family events could not have happened without the help of many volunteers, both in their inception and their execution! have to say, I am feeling pretty good about this community of Eastside these days. It is a tough time in the church and many ministers are feeling it. We just had a friend who is a UC minister stay with us as before he went on a **Deep Coaching** retreat at the beginning of the Coaching program. This is the same program that Brian has taken, and that I am presently finishing, which I will use as spiritual direction for those who wish and just in general pastoral counselling. He plans to go into business for himself as he is tired of working with congregations who don't seem to be open to changing. He has had a series of congregations that are content to continue as they are even though the trend of declining and aging attendance is a concern.

I hear similar stories from others as well, so when I think about our community, the vibrancy, the energy, the openness to trying new or different things, along with the commitment to tradition are all things that are exciting and hopeful. I have been excited by new energy and ideas, particularly from Terri-Lynne Frederickson who is showing us what evangelism for today can look like. She organized the Easter Egg Hunt that was an overwhelming success, partially because of Terri advertising on sites I never would have thought of! She has brought three new families to the family dinner, and one has come to services. This is an example of the kind of sharing our enthusiasm and energy for our faith that is important for our time.

We can't assume that people are not interested in issues of faith or spirituality. They may not be interested in church, but they may be open to coming to something the church offers which may open them up to coming Sunday morning. Especially if they get a sense that what happens here on Sunday morning may not be like what they think! I had a talk with one young father who grew up Catholic and isn't interested in church but listens to sermons

online. According to a new Angus Reid poll, almost 50% of Canadians pray once a month or more (with 35% weekly or more). God is working in our communities, our work is to go to where that is happening, as they may not come to us in the same way. That is our present day challenge. I think we are well on our way to doing pretty well at it, and need to continue on the journey! As you move into your spring and summer routines which include travel and maybe more time with family and friends, I invite you/challenge you to have conversations about church and faith and why Eastside is an important part of your life and community!



# Eastside Kids, join us in saying "welcome back" to the bees, butterflies and birds!

Have you heard the news? Bees are in trouble! While these cool insects can sometimes seem a bit scary, they don't mean you any harm, and we need them for many of the fruits and vegetables we like to eat!

#### Plant a bee garden to help bees!


Choose a variety of plants that flower at different times so there's always a snack available for when bees are out and about. Bees have good colour vision — that's why flowers are so showy! They especially like blue, purple, violet, white and yellow. Some flowers to look for include alyssum, daisies, cosmos, snapdragons, sunflowers, and zinnias.

#### Add a Bee Bath!

Bees need fresh water to drink but most can't land in a conventional bird bath without crashing. Line a shallow bowl or plate with rocks. Add water, but leave the rocks as dry islands to serve as landing pads. Place the bath at the ground level in your garden. Refresh the water daily, adding just enough to evaporate by day's end.

# Quarterly Financial Update: January 1 - March 31, 2016

Eastside incurred a deficit of \$3,480 during the first three months of 2016 (see below). This deficit consisted of an operating deficit of \$980 less mortgage payments of \$2,500.

This does <u>not</u> include the approximately \$23,000 that has been raised to date to reduce or extinguish the mortgage. Of this amount, \$2,500 can be used for the quarterly mortgage payments, so a better measure of the deficit for the first quarter is the operating shortfall of \$980.

The deficit is a significant improvement

from 2015, however a weaker result than was achieved during 2013 and 2014.

Looking ahead to the summer, Eastside is hoping to eliminate its operating shortfall through incremental giving arising from the pledges that have been received for increased giving for operations.

Members of the congregation who have not yet responded to the mortgage and operations fundraising drive are respectfully asked to consider what they can do in this regard!
