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¡BIENVENIDOS, CHIHUAHUAN MEADOWLARK!

On August 3, the 63rd supplement to the American Ornithological Society's (AOS's) Check-list of North and Middle American Birds was published in the journal *Ornithology*. The supplement, prepared by the AOS's North American Classification Committee, summarizes changes the committee made in the check-list between April 25, 2021 and April 25, 2022. As has often been the case in recent years, a bird found in Trans-Pecos Texas figures prominently among the changes.

Based on whole-genome data and song analysis, the Eastern Meadowlark has been split into two species: Eastern Meadowlark (*Sturnella magna*) and Chihuahuan Meadowlark (*Sturnella lilianae*). The Chihuahuan Meadowlark consists of two former Eastern Meadowlark subspecies, *Iilianae* and *auropectoralis*. The *Iilianae* subspecies breeds from northern Arizona, northern New Mexico and western Texas south to northern Sonora and northern Chihuahua. In *The TOS Handbook of Texas Birds*, Lockwood and Freeman describe it as "an uncommon resident in the mid- and upper elevation grasslands of the central Trans-Pecos west to northeastern El Paso County."

The *auropectoralis* subspecies breeds in Mexico from southern Sinaloa and Durango south along the coast to Nayarit and in the interior to Michoacán.

With this split, the status of Eastern Meadowlark in the El Paso checklist area changes dramatically. We have just one record of Eastern Meadowlark as currently delimited: a bird found at McNary reservoir in Hudspeth County on October 14, 2020. The Eastern Meadowlarks that we considered rare localized breeding birds, casual in fall and winter, were of the *lilianae* subspecies. Now, they are Chihuahuan Meadowlarks.



AT FEATHER LAKE

With the start of the irrigation season in early June, Feather Lake began receiving modest intermittent deliveries of excess irrigation water. During June and July, the basin was partly flooded, but not to great depth and not for very long. With the irrigation season about to end, this source will also end. So far this summer, there have been no storms of sufficient size to send runoff to the basin. That could, of course, change in an instant.

Our next workday will be **Sat.**, **August 13**, starting at **8 a.m.** Water conditions will dictate whether we work in the basin or the surrounding uplands. Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave.

Late June brought quite a surprise at Rio Bosque. After being around for 3.5 years, the park's resident



beaver decided the time had come to build a dam. It is located along the old river channel, ~0.5 mile upstream of the Wetland Trailhead. We appreciate the beaver's good intentions, but the dam does present some water-management concerns: high water levels upstream of the dam and reduced flows downstream. In an effort to coexist with our industrious friend, we've installed flow-control pipes designed to pass water through the dam without the beaver realizing it – a beaver deceiver.
