As you may have heard, recently my family and I had the opportunity to move closer to St. Paul's. There were a number of motives for this move. The biggest reason was to be closer to all of you and therefore to be closer to our ministry base in Southern Maryland.

How one pastors a church is rapidly changing. Once upon a time, America was at least a '<u>Christian-ized'</u> nation. People connected with local churches more easily. People accepted a general belief in God and knew their behavior counted against eternity. Those days are gone.

Recently a number of my family have been looking forward to Awesome Con comic book convention coming to Washington DC later in April. That's no big deal. Comic books have been around for a long time. But it's scheduled for April 18-20. Do you understand the significance of those dates? This huge event is scheduled over Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Resurrection Sunday.

Don't get me wrong. They don't need to change their dates for me. The promoters are free to pick whatever dates they choose. Nor am I advocating any special government protectionism.

What concerns me is the reasoning <u>behind</u> the choice of the promoters, staff and vendors. While it's an assumption on my behalf, these dates seem to indicate the promoters have little concern for Good Friday or Easter Sunday. Little concern for those days possibly means little concern for Jesus and the Gospel. This essay is not an act of critical judgment, but an act of regret that perhaps Jesus Christ is a forgotten or unknown person in their lives and so this weekend may mean nothing to them.

Organizations today schedule all sorts of events no matter the day or time. What concerns me is the reasoning <u>why</u> they would set soccer, baseball or other activities as greater priorities over worship and spiritual formation in Jesus Christ. Obviously Jesus is of little concern to many people. Instead we live in a secularized society founded on the principle God doesn't matter.

This is the task ahead of us. As secularism is quickly on the rise, many people are not hearing about Jesus Christ. Southern Maryland is more like Acts chapter 17 than ever before. Many voices are competing to be heard and people are listening. They

are distracted by all sorts of religious ideas, theories, as well as sports, activities and philosophies of life. All of these voices are diverting people away from the truth of the Gospel.

The Apostle Paul understood his own times and mission well. Paul knew why Jesus had sent him out as a preacher of the Good News of the Gospel in Acts 26:18, "to open their eyes, so that they may turn from darkness to light and from the power of Satan to God, that they may receive forgiveness of sins and a place among those who are sanctified by faith in Me."

At one time churches put almost total emphasis on Christian formation in terms of worship, Sunday School, youth groups, and Bible studies. Little emphasis was put on evangelism and outreach. However as more people have questions and doubts about God, they are no longer flocking to a church to find their answers. Instead they turn to the Internet, books and movies.

<u>Therefore, we need to be the ones who go to them</u>. We need to see ourselves as missionaries to Southern Maryland. Every time you step out your door you are representing Jesus Christ and His Gospel. How you work and socialize and shop all reflect back on your public faith in Christ.

Jesus clarified the missional aspect of our Christian discipleship in John 20:21 – "*Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I am sending you.*"

In our day, spiritual formation and evangelism both need equal priority. It is our mission to go and share/live the Gospel so that people may repent, believe and be baptized. As the Letter to the Romans logically explains, how can people hear about Christ unless we go to them? We can no longer assume that people will come to us, we need to enthusiastically go to them.

Too many churches are shrinking and closing. One of the main reasons is that congregations are sitting inside their buildings waiting for the people to come inside. Jesus' model is that we are to be empowered by Word and Sacrament and go outside to the people.

Larger numbers are deluded in the reasons for staying away from church. *In their case the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers, to keep them from seeing the light of the Gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God. For what we proclaim is not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord*. (2 Corinthians 4:4-5 ESV)

If humanists and the new atheists are organizing themselves to promote their message, St. Paul's ought to be even better organized around the Gospel. The Father has given us the Good News of the Son not to keep it to ourselves, but to announce it any way we can.

As this Easter season of 2014 rolls around, I want to encourage you to be thinking about how Jesus loves the people around you. I want you to remember how they are temporarily blinded to the love of Christ. I want you to remember the message of mercy and grace that saved you is on the lookout to save others around you as well.

God planted St. Paul's in Mechanicsville/New Market over 100 years ago to be revitalized at this very moment. Why? To be a force in Southern Maryland in the power of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We are here to see this total region changed spiritually, culturally and socially. We are here not for our agendas but for the mission of Christ – to preach the Gospel and see the prisoners set free.
