identity with activities that are fun and that reinforce Jewish ethics, values and culture. The campers and counselors create a community where kids find joy among their peers being a kid and being Jewish.



Camp Shalom



Place:

Camp is held on the campus of Harvey Mudd College in Claremont. Set among the towering Eucalyptus trees, the campers use all of the centrally located facilities:



- the large, air conditioned Platt Center for indoor games,
- a huge, on-site swimming pool,
- manicured fields for outdoor activities,
- and a recently constructed athletics center.



Camp is divided into two-week sessions. Each session revolves around a lewish theme that culminates on Friday at a special Kabbalat Shabbat, where campers present their projects and enjoy the Jewish community they've built.



The formal day begins with an "opening circle" where everyone gathers for lewish and camp songs and games. From there, each child has three half-hour activity periods within his or her own age group. The morning ends with "chuggim" where campers pick an area of interest to focus on for the week. Projects in chuggim all relate to that one area, cooking for example, and the age groups are combined. Lunch is relaxed, where children have time to play and interact informally prior to the two hours of swim time. Finally, camp ends with group time and closing circle.

The hallmark of Gan Shalom is our innovative programming. Programs such as drama, music, arts-and-crafts, athletics, games, nature projects and special guests

are all part of daily camp life and all directed at helping your child develop his or her unique talents.



lield Trips:

Wednesday of every week is travel day, and the entire camp goes on a field trip to some exciting place in the Los Angeles area. These excursions change each summer, but some trips that were made in

previous summers have included the Long Beach Aquarium, the California Science Museum, the beach, and Scandia. There is no charge for any of the field trips.

Staff:

Camp Gan Shalom staff is carefully selected based on their experience working with children, their specialized talents, and their passion for camp. Our dedicated counselors and specialists help your child have a safe and memorable day camp experience.

All staff are required to be certified in first aid, emergency and CPR training prior to the beginning of camp. They also get additional intensive workshops on group management and creative program development, before beginning their summer.

Parents may drop children off at 7:30 a.m. and pick them up by 6:00 p.m. Campers attending extended care will participate in games and art activities led by counselors and will be provided with a snack.

Transportation:

For those campers on the western side of the San Gabriel Valley, a certified bus will be provided to and from the Harvey Mudd campsite at no extra charge. The bus will pick up campers at Pasadena lewish Temple, leaving at 8:45 a.m. and returning at 4:45 p.m with one stop in Arcadia at Congregation Shaarei Torah.



Fees and Registration Information:

The camp fee of \$280 per two week session covers the cost of all programs and activities, snacks and a camp T-shirt. Families enrolling siblings in camp will receive a 10% discount for the second child. There is a \$50 non-refundable registration fee for each child.
