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
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From the Pastor...

The new year is seen as a time for resolutions and new challenges, but I would suggest it is a time to discern what God is calling us to be and to do at St. Paul's. We completed a congregational assessment last

year and the results didn't really tell us anything new.

The document suggested that we wanted: new members, to grow our children's programming, to grow the Duke Lutheran ministry, to have more assets, to have a plan for the Paschal property and to not change much.



This sounds like a plan, but is it? We did not really answer the how portion of these wants. We really did not call on God to guide us in a meaningful way. We did put a planning team together that is working on what to do with the Paschal property and we did begin to communicate with one another more fully and that needs to continue.

I begin this new year thinking about ways to help the congregation council find more ways for us all to understand how the councils work and their determination to help the congregation grow together and invite others to come grow with us.

To this end, I am working toward a reintroduction of once a month time with the pastor for conversation during the Sunday School hour and will invite various council members to participate in these forums. These will be in addition to our regular Sunday School adult offerings. I hope to, with council's blessing, institute a monthly question that we ask one another and spend time in discussion. Let me explain that a little. For example, I'd like us to think this month: what questions would you ask the worship and music committee? What questions about worship do you have? We could also spend one month asking: what do we want to know about what the council is doing? There are many more questions we could ask and then we can spend some time at the beginning of worship and on Wednesday evenings answering these auestions.

In addition, I'd like us to be in prayer for one another, the congregation, our Synod, the ELCA and for God to open us to what God is calling us to be. I plan to prepare a Lenten series that will help us be people of prayer and discernment.

I want us, together with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, to make 2016 a year of goal setting and planning. We need to think about who we are, whose we are, and what God is calling us to be in this place. Then we need to plan how to achieve our goals and prepare to achieve them.

I hope 2016 will be a year in which we truly trust in the Lord and let the Spirit guide us.

Year's traditions of looking both back and forward fit with these ancient traditions.



Lydia, Dorcas and Phoebe are three New Testament women about whom we know very little and yet they played important and pivotal roles in the development of the early Christian church.

Lydia (Acts 16:6-40) appears in Acts as a business woman dealing with the manufacture and sale of purple cloth and living in Philippi. The formula for purple dye was a closely held secret known only to members of the Dyers' Guild and the cloth was purchased by the rich. Lydia owned a large home and employed servants so we surmise she was successful at her craft. The Gentile Lydia worshiped the one God of the Jews and on Sabbath mornings joined other women to pray by the river. It was here that she heard Paul and Silas proclaim the Gospel and was baptized, becoming

the first convert to Christianity on European soil and the first member of the church at Philippi, the church that later lent great support and comfort to Paul; he called it his joy and crown. Lydia opened her home to Paul and Silas, followed the Christian religion despite any ill effect it may have had on her business, and we can only guess what messages she might have sent out while living at the crossroads of business between Europe and Asia. Lydia would have served on our Evangelism Committee.

Dorcas (Acts 9:6-43) was a Christian woman living in Joppa on the Mediterranean coast and she has just died when she is mentioned in Acts. The widows of town, and there would have been many due to seafaring accidents, had bathed her body and laid her in an upper room to await burial. However, two men from Joppa rushed to Lydda ten miles away to fetch Peter. Why? Were they hoping for a miracle? Did they want him to pray over the body? In any case, Peter travels straightway to Joppa. The women show him the many cloaks and robes Dorcas had made for the poor and they mourn the loss of one so loved. Peter had all leave the room and then, in the fashion of Jesus raising Jairus' daughter, he held the woman's hand and proclaimed, "Tabitha, arise." (Dorcas-Greek, Tabitha-Aramaic are the same name meaning "gazelle") and she did! Dorcas was a loving woman who had a talent - sewing. She saw a need and did something about it. For this, the writer calls her a disciple – the only woman so-called in Scripture. Dorcas would have been a member of Tongue and Thimble.

Phoebe (Romans 16:1-2) was considered a saint of the church by Paul and he entrusted to her the delivery of his important letter to the Romans. She is described as a "servant of the church" living in Cenchrea in Corinth. She had ministered to many and to Paul in particular. Paul instructs the Romans to aid her in any way necessary. Was Phoebe a rich woman that could afford to travel? Did she sail to Rome or go overland? Did she travel alone? Did she ever return to Cenchrea or did she die in Rome as a martyr like Paul and so many other Christians? We can't answer these questions but we do know that Paul would have chosen the best person possible to carry his epistle. Phoebe would have served on our Missions Committee.

These three women are honored by the Lutheran Church on 27 January each year. In Fowler Library the section 220.92 contains many books that describe the women of the Bible and the work they did in obeying and spreading the Word.



There are already some good things that we are doing here at St. Paul's! There are blue recycling bins for collection of paper, empty water bottles and soda cans. The brown recyclable coffee cups (in Trinity Hall) can be recycled – but please, empty any contents. The cups need not be washed. (Even better would be to bring your own coffee mug if you are a frequent coffee drinker at church.) We have a container for used eveglasses for the Lion's Club to repurpose. Women's connection has been collecting pill bottles. Lots of good things are already being done, but there are many other things that we can be doing at church and at home.

January's tips of the month:

- Use cloth shopping bags for groceries. If you do prefer the plastic or paper bags, they can be recycled
- Cut back on paper towel usage. Instead, invest in a few cotton cloths and some fabric napkins. Using the cloth alternative is just as easy as using the paper version and you only need to buy them once - plus you can help eliminate the 3,000 tons of paper towels that end up in landfills every day.

Urban Ministry Food Donations

December 2015 Update

Thank you to all who contributed food to the Urban Ministries December food drive for their food pantry. We collected 640.2 lbs. of food, which was greatly appreciated. Last year our food drive collected over 2,000 lbs. of food so you can see that we were significantly down this year. Their food pantry serves

families, which are referred to them from Social Services, ONCE a month only; however they serve 13 families per day, 5 days a week. So you can see that they are always in great need of food to share with the members of the Durham community, who are in the greatest need. If you did not contribute to the collection in December and would like to help, please consider a monetary donation. You can always place a check in the collection plate made out to St. Paul's with the line item "Urban Ministries food bank" and the money will be delivered to the Urban Ministries.

You can also drop food in the baskets by the main doors at any time. This can be any type of non-perishable foods, paper goods, hygiene items, all new and nothing past expiration date. These items are delivered to the Urban Ministries when the baskets are full, by John and Jane Hurlburt – many thanks to them for making sure our donations get downtown for us!

Like many people who come to UMD homeless, Ralph Hall is a middle-aged single man who had lost hope. For the past several months, I've seen Ralph each night in the Community Café getting ready to work with his kitchen crew to help serve and clean up after dinner. I'd tell him good evening as I headed for the parking lot. About a month and a half ago, I noticed Ralph was wearing a neon yellow shirt with the C.T. Wilson Construction Company logo on it. I asked him about it, and he said, "Yes, the man from C.T. Wilson was here at the Rebuilding Lives lunch, and he hired a couple of us on the spot!"

We shared the joy of that moment. Night after night since then, I've seen Ralph in his work shirt, beaming with pride, volunteering to help in the kitchen here after a strenuous day of construction work, and it's made me so happy to see him wearing that badge of accomplishment. Earlier this week, I asked Ralph how the job was going, and he smiled even bigger: "Man, it's going great. Matter of fact, I've been saving my money, and I've just signed the lease on a one-bedroom apartment. I'm moving out of here on Friday." He will spend the holidays and the new year in his own home, once again able to support himself. Ralph is no longer homeless for two reasons: Because he worked really hard to improve his life, and because you offered him help through UMD in the form of shelter and a connection to a job.

Your gifts give Ralph and hundreds of your other neighbors in similar situations the chance to rebuild their lives each year at UMD. It starts with a safe bed and a warm meal – but doesn't stop there. You also help Ralph and others find a job and end their homelessness permanently. In the last full fiscal year:

You provided 52,506 nights of shelter to an average of 148 people a night, including families with children

- You fed hungry people 259,793 meals in our Community Café, some 712 daily
- You distributed groceries and clothing to an average 487 households in need each month
- You helped end homelessness for 237 people. Thank you, St. Paul's Friends! Let's keep it going
