BECOME A LAKE GEORGE CITIZEN SCIENTIST

Lake George Association (LGA) Citizen Scientists are dedicated Lake Protectors – concerned citizens from around our community who volunteer their time to monitor water quality, invasive species, harmful and concerning algae growth, and local wildlife. All the data they collect supports the LGA and NYS Department of Environmental Conservation programs that help keep the lake clear and clean. No experience necessary, just a love for Lake George. Here's how residents can help:

Algae Watch: Use visual observations along a section of shoreline to document algae growth throughout the spring, summer, and fall.

Aquatic Invasive Species Monitoring Event: Over the weekend of August 19 - 21, survey a section of shoreline for aquatic invaders, including plants, mussels, snails, and fish.

Water Assessments by Volunteer Evaluators (WAVE): Collect macroinvertebrates from a stream near you to help assess the quality of water entering Lake George.

Citizen Science Lake Assessment Program (CSLAP): Collect water samples and document lake conditions for early detection of water quality problems.

Loon Monitoring with the LGA: Join the LGA in counting loons on Lake George as part of our annual monitoring program aimed at determining the relative health of the population of this signature Adirondack bird.

ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS - 6/23/2022

The Zoning Board of Appeals meeting of June 23, 2022 was canceled due to a lack of applications. ■

PLANNING BOARD - 7/7/2022

Chairperson Dick Frasier, Pam Peterson, Judy Gourley, and Meg Haskell were present along with ZEO Matthew McGee and Acting Secretary Cathy Clark.

ROBINSON (25.1-1-1.2 & 25.1-1-1.11) 366 and 376 West Hague Road (OCI)

The applicant is proposing a subdivision of two abutting parcels. Currently Mr. Robinson owns a lot (Lot 1), which is 4.13 acres and another lot (Lot 2), which is 4.41 acres. If approved, Lot 1 would be 5.64 acres and Lot 2 would be 2.9 acres. All of Mr. Robinson's outer buildings along with his house would then be on Lot 1. Because this is a subdivision, (defined as lots greater than ¼ acre), a public hearing was held. No one spoke for or against the subdivision. The application was deemed complete and was unanimously approved with no conditions.

FUHRER (26.10-1-26) 65 Friends Pt. N (TR-1R)

The applicant would like to construct an addition to an existing house. The new construction would be within 100 feet of the lake. An existing stone landing is 86.8 feet from the lake and the new deck would be 86 feet from the lake. The application indicates a 43% increase in the structure footprint. The property is within Sewer District #2. The plans provided indicate a loft that the applicant does not plan to build. A site visit will be scheduled once the board receives updated drawings.

REYNEN (93.16-1-39) 40 Sabbath Day Pt. Road (TR-IR) SP 05-22

The applicants are proposing to construct a new four-bedroom, two-story single-family house on a vacant lot. The structure footprint will be 2,500 sq. ft., have a maximum height of 31.8 feet, and will be 51-3/4 feet from the lake. Septic permits have been applied for. Water will be supplied by the Sabbath Day water system. A site visit was scheduled.

MILLER-FAYOLLE (26.14-1-8) 11 Birch Point Drive (TRIR) SP 01-18

The Planning Board approved the extension to an existing deck and relocation of its stairs on May 3, 2018, and extended their approval on June 16, 2020. The owners have not been able to complete the project and are now requesting another two-year extension. A two-year extension was unanimously approved.

THE FIREHOUSE/ Ginn-DeLarm (43.5-1-3) 8979 Graphite Mountain Road

The applicants are requesting a modification of their Planning Board approval of June 1, 2006, to include the use of food trucks, which are proposed to be parked in the front of the building. The board had numerous questions. The application was tabled until the August 4th Planning Board meeting because no one was present to represent the applicants.

MITCHELL/MADE IN HAGUE (59.20-1-6) 8461 Lakeshore Drive (TRI)

The proprietors of the Made in Hague retail shop are requesting Planning Board approval for operation of the retail store in the north side of the Silver Bay Post Office. Parking and traffic impacts were discussed. The application was unanimously approved for the 2022 season and the application could be revisited as early as the November 2022 Planning Board meeting. ■

TOWN BOARD - 7/12/2022

REGULAR COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Administrative/Assessor/Justice: The assessor's office will conduct a town-wide property assessment.

Highway: The culvert on Pudding Island Road is almost completed and the road will be paved. The state will pave Rt. 9N from the boat dock north to the county line after Labor Day. Warren County DPW will repave Summit Drive from Rt. 8 to the intersection of West Hague/New Hague Roads.

Museum/Historian: Ginger Kuenzel reported 30 local authors will be at Silver Bay from 5 – 8 pm on July 22, 2022 for a book signing and children-friendly activities.

Personnel: Bast stated that having Eric Kramar as Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP) Operator Trainee resolves many short-term and long-term issues and will cover regulatory requirements.

Planning/Zoning/Storm Water: Zoning Enforcement Officer (ZEO) Matthew McGee is doing a town-wide property maintenance review, the plan for which was adopted by the town board on 5/13/2003. For details, click [HERE](#).

Town Park/Beautification: Ramant reported that the Music in the Park with food trucks is going well. He thanked Highway Superintendent Donnie Smith for setting the park up.

Ramant provided a plan and pricing from Garden Time for the pavilion at the town park. He presented five letters from adjoining or close property owners to the park that stated they were in favor of placing the new pavilion near the lake on the side by the boat launch. Discussion ensued about where the pavilion should be placed. Another option from Woodlot Woodworks, LLC was provided by Patchett. A third option, to add on to the existing structure, will be examined.

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FIREHOUSE RESTAURANT THIS SUMMER

After being open for 17 years, the Firehouse Restaurant in Hague is trying a new model this summer, using food trucks and pop-ups. The pop-up folks can go inside the restaurant.

Sheri and Cris were motivated to try this because of staffing issues. They had a chef, but needed at least ten other people just to staff the kitchen. Those people were simply not available.

Sheri believes COVID contributed to this in that babyboomers retired, which opened up positions. Workers in lower positions filled those jobs, and the service industry was left without workers. She said that service industry people also chose to go into different better-paying careers. She also blames the fact that millennials are waiting to get married and have families and that the birth rate is down, so the pool of possible workers is smaller.

This is the general schedule for the food trucks:

Monday – Closed
Tuesday – Caribbean

Wednesday – Crab Shack
Thursday – BBQ
Friday – Greek
Saturday – Hot dogs, hamburgers, and more
Sunday – Closed

An updated list is posted at haguefirehouse.com. They also put up messages on their Facebook page daily.

The food truck owners get 100% of the money they take in, while the Firehouse makes its money on the drinks that are purchased. The food truck owners have been pleased and say they really love the friendly people of Hague. But the Firehouse needs more people to come and they need more drinks to be purchased if this is to be a profitable summer for them.

Folks who have gone for an evening or more at the Firehouse this summer have reported that it was great food, great drinks, and great fun. Let's all get behind Sheri and Cris and frequent the Firehouse Restaurant this summer! They are looking forward to seeing us! ▣

Sewer District #1 & #2: Bast reported that one EDU Appeal is being addressed by the committee and a recommendation will be provided to the board at the August 9th meeting.

NEW BUSINESS:

Permission for Matthew McGee, Cathy Clark, and Josh Patchett to attend a conference in Lake Placid on October 6th on Short Term Rentals was unanimously passed.

Because the Town of Hague is still working on the pavilion/bandstand design and cannot meet the Glens Falls Foundation's criteria for the project at this time, the town board authorized the supervisor to return the \$15,000 grant monies it had received.

Ginger Kuenzel noted that there is a banner on a home that she feels is offensive and wanted to know if there are any regulations governing its removal. Frasier will talk with the ZEO. ▣

These are the items you can bring:

- Aerosol cans
- Anti-freeze
- Corrosive liquid (Examples: oven, drain, and toilet bowl cleaners)
- Corrosive solid (Examples: abrasive cleaners)
- Fluorescent bulbs and tubes
- Hazardous paints (Examples: oil paints, stains, and varnishes)
- Latex paints
- Liquid pesticides
- Solid pesticides

Items NOT accepted:

- Explosive waste and munitions - Call local law enforcement on how to dispose of these.
- Asbestos - Do NOT attempt to remove; contact NYS DEC or a certified asbestos contractor.
- Automotive oil - Recycle at a service station.
- Batteries - Recycle at landfill.
- Electronics - Recycle at landfill.
- Pharmaceuticals - Contact DEC for next scheduled collection or check with your pharmacy.
- Infectious waste - Consult your doctor or hospital.
- Radioactive materials - Contact DEC.

Transcripts were obtained from the Navy's Lake Champlain Underwater Laboratory which show results from their recent technological achievement demonstrating the ability to record conversations of aquatic plants. Using their Aquaphone in waters off Fort Ticonderoga, Navy divers recorded this conversation between husband and wife, Curly and Leaf Pondweed.

"Curly, wouldn't it be great if we could move out of this muddy water and find a new home? Lake George is nearby and it's clean and clear, and I really want to reproduce."

"Leaf, I love it when you talk to me that way. Reproducing is my favorite thing to do. But how are we going to get there?"

"Curly, I have a plan. Next time a fishing boat drops anchor, let's get tangled around the line. He pulls up the anchor, we stow away until he decides to fish Lake George. Then Bada Bing, Bada Boom, we're in Lake George! I hear its nice by this place called Mossy Point. I love the name, it's so green." Leaf, I'm a simple guy and this sounds risky, but anything to reproduce with you."

In case you missed it, June 6-12, 2022 was New York's Invasive Species Awareness Week. One major change regarding invasive species is that all boats entering waters in or adjacent to the Adirondack Forest Preserve must obtain certification that their boats have been inspected and any invasive species removed. These tougher rules took effect on June 8th. The Adirondack Watershed Institute lists all boat inspection stations online at: www.adkwatershed.org/boat-wash-stations.

By the way, Curly-Leaf Pondweed is an invasive species that is already in Lake George, but it is important to stop further colonies from forming. This aquatic plant can form dense surface mats that are a nuisance to recreation. When the plants die in July, the released nutrients can promote algal blooms; a critical loss of oxygen can be harmful to fish and other organisms. In addition, the dead plants can form stinky messes on beaches. Further information can be found online at

With boats and trailers it's clear. Keep them clean, drained, and dry, including fishing tackle, and especially anchors and anchor lines. And don't launch if you haven't been inspected. It's the law.

LOOKING BACK

The Silver Bay YMCA campus has hosted many dignitaries to speak at conferences and special occasions during its 100-year history. In August 1922 the speakers at Visitors' Day were Nathan L. Miller, New York State Governor from 1921 through 1922, and Adolph S. Ochs, illustrious publisher of *The New York Times* from 1896 to 1935.

As a part of the day's program, these two gentlemen, accompanied by a party of other notables, enjoyed a cruise on Silver Bay's steam launch, *Crusader*. Unfortunately, as they headed south towards Lake George Village, a rope caught fire, which forced them to come ashore. Having debarked, the passengers opted to finish their journey by other means! (Source: Silver Bay Blog of May 15, 2013)

Ochs, the son of immigrants to the United States, grew up in a poor household in Knoxville, Tennessee, and early on, at the age of eleven, was bitten by the newspaper publishing bug. He began by delivering newspapers and learning to set type at the *Knoxville Chronicle*. When he was 19, he borrowed \$250 to purchase a controlling share of the struggling *Chattanooga Times* and in 1896, with an investment of \$75,000, he bought another financially troubled newspaper, *The New York Times*. He had become a newspaperman through and through!

Adolph Ochs' speaking engagement at Silver Bay and his experience on the *Crusader*, were not his first connection to Lake George. A man of great accomplishment and wealth, in the early 1900's he purchased the "Abenia" estate from George Foster Peabody, a noted American financier and philanthropist with strong ties to the Lake George region. It is said that "Abenia" is an Algonquin name meaning "home of rest," as indeed it was for Mr. Ochs. When residing here on Lake George, Ochs made multiple calls a day to the city offices of *The New York Times*. But he also participated in golf, had an active social life with his friends and neighbors, and was a long-time

member of the Lake George Association. One of his pleasures might well have been boating, as the estate included a large boathouse. In fact, you may have dined there. It's now the Boathouse Restaurant in Lake George, where you can hear the whistle of today's steamboats as they cruise the lake!

Our readers may remember a Looking Back column in January 2010 in which we told the tale of Mr. Ochs' final days. In April 1935, at the age of 77, Adolph Ochs was apparently an ill man. In an effort to revisit his connection with Lake George, he telephoned Karl Abbott, then manager of the Sagamore Hotel, and asked him to look out his window toward the lake and describe all that he saw. In a half-hour conversation, Abbott described the sky and the

clouds, the wind, and the surface of the lake for Ochs, who instructed him not to miss a thing. This was to be his last "visit" to Lake George. The following morning the headlines announced his death. ▣
