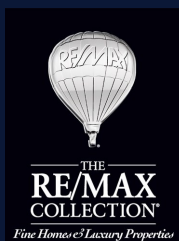

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**MINUTES OF HBPOA MEETING,  
COAST GUARD BUILDING  
April 4, 2019 @ 7 PM**

The meeting was called to order at 7:10 PM by Kathy Frase, Pres., who then lead all present in the Pledge of Allegiance. She welcomed all in attendance, including several new members as follows: Burt Correll, Michael Senker, Gordon Wolf, and Terry and Melly Martin.

Since Toby Wightman, one of our Directors, has moved away from Hernando Beach, the Board has approved asking Kelly Reeve to serve out the remainder of his term. Upon her agreement to accept the position, Wayne Dukes was asked to come forward and install Kelly, which he happily did!

Our speaker for the evening, Keith Kolasa, who is the Waterways and Aquatic Manager for Hernando County, began his presentation with several slides that basically laid the groundwork for much of his talk, the first of which listed the Hernando County Aquatics and Waterways responsibilities:

1. Waterways, Boat Ramps, and Navigation Aids
2. Waterway Hazards and Maintaining Navigation
3. Derelict boats/oil spill containment
4. Dock/Seawall Permitting, including having staff come to the homeowner to let him/her know if what is being requested is permitted without variance and also to give help with the actual application.
5. Lake Management (most recently Hunters Lake)
6. Marine Resource Program

The second slide was a rather lengthy list of recent accomplishments (2016-2019), including some that are in the process/planning stage. Keith pointed out that he recognized a number of community members present, including Wayne Dukes, who have been involved in many of the projects that will be listed and he emphasized that this kind of involvement and participation at the community level is crucial to successful outcomes. These projects will be listed with an overview.

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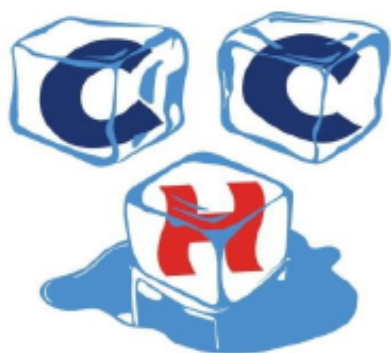
1. Bendickson Reef Expansion
2. Shallow Reef Arrays – Reef Balls
3. Volunteer Reef Ball Construction
4. Hunters Lake Tussock Removal  
(Successfully cleared 16 acres of material, opening up some deeper pocket for access for fishermen.)
5. Oyster Reef Deployment (This was a huge community effort last year whereby 2600+ bags of oyster shells were packed by volunteers and transported to Centipede Bay, near Hernando Beach where a reef was created with the goal of attracting live oysters to the reef. This effort also involved a team from UF IFAS Extension.)
6. Shoreline Stabilization – March Grass Planting (Ongoing)
7. Coastal Kayak Trail (Bayport to Linda Pederson was completed with more planned).
8. Hernando Beach Perimeter Channel Speed Zone (Speed was changed from fast speed to an idle speed in the narrow perimeter channel that goes along Gulfview Circle.)
9. Marine Area Strategic Plan (They partnered with the UF, this two-year effort being important because it helped define the methods to do the

Restore-funded projects, administered by EPA requiring a lot of science, monitoring and research.)

10. Research Partnerships
11. Boat Ramp Master Plan (This is currently underway whereby improvements to all of our coastal boat ramps are being looked at as well as exploration as to how some of the Restore money can be spent towards this effort.)
12. RESTORE Grants and Project Planning (This is a big part of what Keith and his staff do, filling out grant applications for many of the projects.)
13. Bayport Courtesy Dock (This has been replaced.)
14. Lake Townsen Boat Ramp (They just received a grant for \$91,000 and they are putting in a concrete ramp.)
15. Wreck Deployment – “Ghost Ship” (This is one of the more exciting projects that is ongoing.)
16. Hernando Beach Channel Dredge Mitigation Project (This project is in its eighth year. The channel was dredged in 2012 and Keith’s department was required to do mitigation. They are still waiting for the “powers that be” to release their mitigation sites so that more dredging can be

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done when needed.)

Per request, Keith addressed the Mitigation Bank Project by refreshing our memory on the proposed mitigation bank off Minnow Creek where they propose to close boating access up in the Centipede Bay. He was able to tell us that nothing has been decided but commended our community for staying on top of this situation. Without all of our letters, etc., to the Army Corps of Engineers, this whole project may have just slipped by before we were even aware of it. He will keep us posted on developments.

The first three items involved Artificial Reefs, which are the number one priority of the HC Port Authority for use of the Restore Fund. To that end, they work very closely with the County with an eye towards adding to existing reef locations as well as creating new ones. This is an absolutely fascinating subject, beginning with the Bendickson Reef, the initial planning and executing plans dating back to the 1990's, and continu-

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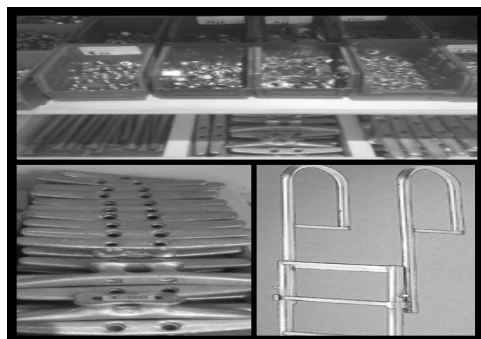


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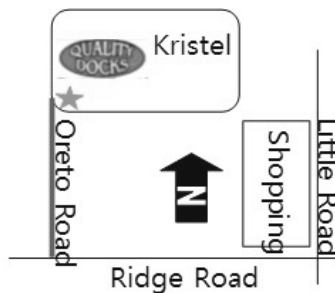

ing the Reef Ball project as well as the Oyster Reef. Keith showed several slides which documented the locations of the reefs. Reefs play a huge role in creating and preserving habitats for fish and other "fawn and flora" of the Gulf, thereby improving fishing and water quality, not to mention the recreational opportunities for divers and others. There are also educational opportunities associated with this program for young and old alike! By going to the Hernando County Artificial Reef Program website, one will find a lot of very interesting information. The value of it cannot be overemphasized!

Keith invited Mike Fulford from the Port Authority to give some insight as to what the progress is on the "Ghost Ship" project which has been a major focus of the PA. Mike shared the the PA is partnering with a nonprofit organization called HELP (Hernando Environmental Land Protectors) for the purpose of getting a derelict concrete sailboat that they "inherited" approximately 2 years ago ultimately towed out to the Bendickson Reef. There are still potential obstacles but Mike is hopeful that all will be worked out such

that the "Ghost Ship" can be towed from its current location at the HB Marina in two stages to the Reef on 4/22 @ 2:30 PM and 4/23. The PA plans on placing approximately 30 reef balls around the ship as well as a couple inside the ship once it is in place. Any donations toward this very worthwhile and exciting goal will be appreciated. More information continues to be forthcoming on NextDoor.

Keith elaborated on a number of projects, including collaboration with Sea Grant for planting marsh grasses, feasibility of oyster reefs in the Flats Area, to mention a couple. Another big project in collaboration with the Port Authority is the writing of their first Marine Resource Conservation Plan for the county, with the whole idea being to look at ways to enhance and conserve our fisheries. Keith has also been working on ways to protect our hard bottom habitat and seagrass (interesting to note that our seagrass bed is the second largest in our nation). He emphasized how important it is to document the species and varieties of fish in case there should ever be another oil spill so that we could get our share of any money that the oil company might

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be forced to pay. Keith finished his presentation by showing how the Restore Act money to which Hernando County is entitled might be allocated for the best interest of our waterways/coast. Throughout his presentation, he entertained and answered a number of questions and, overall, gave an incredibly comprehensive overview of so much that is going on relative to HC Waterways and Aquatics.

Keith ended his presentation by thanking Commissioner Dukes and the Port Authority for all the help they have lent to the various projects. He also made us aware that due to severe budget cuts, he has already lost one staff member and fears that more cuts could come. He asked for our help in expressing our appreciation for his department by letting our concerns be known to the county.

## BUSINESS MEETING

Kathy Frase called the business portion of the meeting back to order at 8:20 by asking for a motion to accept the March Minutes as published in

the Beachcomber. Betty McGuire moved, Cal Holland seconded, and motion carried.

Bud Frase gave his Treasurer's Report as follows: Balance on Hand as of 3/01/19 was \$23,626.78 and the BOH on 3/31/19 was \$22,722.93. Report will be filed for audit. REPORTS

Landscaping Committee.....Gladys Moore reported that the recent damage done to the Triangle has been repaired and that new plants there are thriving! She explained that the money authorized to pay for lawn cutting and trimming didn't include the Triangle and asked for an additional amount of \$65 for that purpose. She moved that we accept the proposal of \$65 per month for the Triangle cutting and trimming in addition to the already approved \$85per month for US 19 park. Susan Coe seconded her motion and it passed unanimously.

GAC.....John Paul Reeve began his presentation with a motion to allocate \$150 for the "Ghost Ship" Project. Gladys Moore seconded the motion which passed unanimously. John Paul re-

Fran Baird stated that she believed that there is actually an ordinance that prohibits this activity. To summarize all of the good advice given by residents the following is listed:

- 1) If activity is going on that is potentially unsafe

or of a really high nuisance level, call the sheriff any-time day or night and be persistent.

2) If at all possible, obtain the number of the probable code violation. One good way to do this is to access the HBPOA website where there are links to such information.

3) Call the Code Enforcement with your complaint, the code number, address of residence being rented. Even better, email all of this information to [ce@county.hernando.fl.us](mailto:ce@county.hernando.fl.us) so that you have a tangible record of your complaint.

4) Be persistent!

Note: Wayne Dukes shared that there is a bill (? #) before the legislature that addresses this issue and that it would be good to contact your representative and urge its passage.

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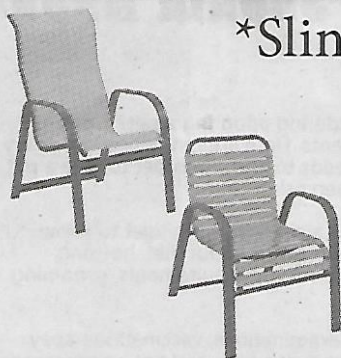

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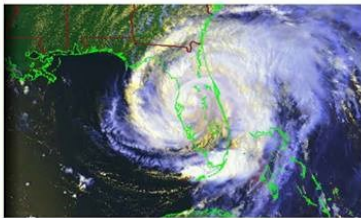
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## 2019 HURRICANE & SAFETY EXPO

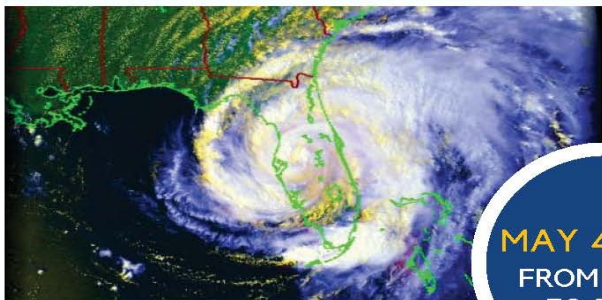

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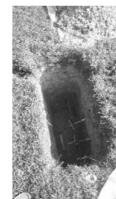
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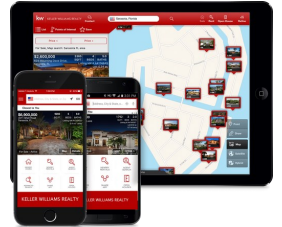
