THIS DATE IN HISTORY

June 27, 1950 President Truman announces that he is increasing the military aid program for Vietnam

that he initiated earlier in the year. This includes a military mission and military advisers.

Aid is to be funneled through the French

June 1, 1954 Colonel Edward G. Lansdale (USAF) arrives in Vietnam to assume the duties of chief of

the Saigon Military Mission. Lansdale, actually a member of the CIA, has been sent to Vietnam to run covert, political psychological operations aimed at disrupting the North

Vietnam government.

June 24, 1957 The U.S. Army's 1st Special Forces Group is activated in Okinawa. This unit will send

advisers to Vietnam to help organize and train the initial contingent of South Vietnamese

Special Forces at the commando training center in Nha Trang.

June 17, 1965 Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, while admitting the complexities of the situation,

urges Americans to support President Johnson's policies.

June 1, 1966 The U.S. 3rd Naval Mobile Construction Brigade (Seabees) is formed at Danang to support

navy and marine operations in I Corps.

June 12-26, 1967 Troops of the U.S. 1st Infantry Division conduct Operation Billings, a drive into War Zone

D, 50 miles north of Saigon, in an effort to trap three Viet Cong battalions.

June 5, 1968 Senator Robert Kennedy (D-NY), a leading critic of administration policy in Vietnam, is

shot after announcing his victory in California's Democratic presidential primary; he dies

the next day.

Bill to Expand VA's Agent Orange Presumptive Conditions List

A bill that could add two new conditions to the VA's Agent Orange Presumptive Conditions List was introduced in March to the Senate. If passed and signed into law, the Fair Care for Vietnam Veterans Act of 2021 (S. 810) would require VA to add hypertension, better known as high blood pressure, and monoclonal gammopathy of undetermined significance (MGUS) to the list of presumptive conditions caused by Agent Orange to veterans serving the Vietnam War. MGUS is caused when abnormal changes happen in plasma cells and is discovered through blood tests. MGUS also is connected to multiple myeloma, a type of blood cancer. Urge your Senators to pass this bill.
