The surprising part of today's gospel reading is witnessing Jesus as being openly aggressive with the traders and operators of the Temple.

Huge sums of money exchange hands as official inspectors certify that the animals brought into the Temple are flawless. Temple priests create a system of trade that no owner of animals outside the Temple can compete with. It's no wonder Jesus angrily breaks the law and swings into action. God's house is being desecrated. This whole business is degrading to true religion. Jesus feels deeply the insult to his Father's house. Where there was peace, he brings total disruption. Where there was business as usual, he brings hostility. Jesus moves into the arena of the chief priests to work against the power that devalues his beliefs.

There is no politeness or subtlety about this scene. Jesus makes a whip to drive out the traders and cattle out of the temple. Knocking over tables of money. He raises his voice. Could we describe Jesus as aggressive? Perhaps. Certainly, there is an element of anger and impatience driving his actions. The bystanders and friends of Jesus are possibly surprised and taken aback by the change in his personality. If Jesus is worried about being arrested for disturbing the peace, no one could guess that from his behaviour. Jesus is consumed by zeal, by a passion that shows itself in positive aggression. The holy place is then reclaimed for the worship of God, but soon enough as John tells us, the Temple will be replaced by a new sanctuary where people can meet God in the person of the risen Jesus himself.

REFLECT

n the world of sports, especially team sports, you often hear it said about certain players, "he's a lovely fellow off the pitch, but on it, he's a nightmare." Some players go through a personality change as soon as they put on a jersey and take the field of play. There can be no talking to them, any attempt to reason with them as the game progresses, falls flat. Aggression, anger, competitive instinct, the need to conquer the opponent, the desire to win at all costs, usually means the best players become captains and leaders in their respective sports. Aggression is seen as a positive force, to be used for the benefit of the

It's often the case that today's Gospel reading has us looking at Jesus in a negative light. We see him bursting through the Temple like a hurricane, we never witness him lose control like this before. This doesn't look like the Jesus we have grown to love. But there is nothing negative about what happens here today. His actions are for the advancement of God's kingdom, and no other reason. He's aggressively fighting for his Church. God is not to be pushed to the periphery of the Temple but should remain at the heart of everything we do.

Some would say that the survival of our Church today depends on us, the people of God, taking on the mantle of leader, and using our own aggression for the advancement of God's kingdom.

May we honour Your presence in our bearts, and offer pure worship, free from all distraction.

LEARN

The Temple was a sacred place reserved for worship and prayer.

Jesus' actions underscore his authority as Son of God.

Jesus is the new temple, embodying the presence of God among humanity.
