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Valentine's Day is Just Around the Corner!

February 14th first became associated with romantic love during the 14th century in England by the famous British author Geoffrey Chaucer. Ironically, today, we might call this a stalker! Evidently, back then, women only had one suitor.

My favorite example from this period was the story of Don Quixote celebrated in the play and movie Man of La Mancha. In it, the knight professes his adoration for a street urchin. We all know a bit of the story from listening to the words of the song, To Dream the Impossible Dream.

In 18th-century England, Valentine's Day evolved into an occasion in which lovers expressed their love for each other by presenting flowers, offering confectionery, and sending greeting cards, known as "valentines." Since the 19th century, handwritten valentines have given way to mass-produced greeting cards.

My wife still has the letters I wrote her when we first dated. Yes, they were in cursive ... and yes, my penmanship was actually pretty good. Nowadays I guess people just text each other using emoticons $\odot \Psi$. Somehow that just doesn't cut it. The act of composing and writing letters seems lost. Now we search for a card that expresses appreciation, or in some way lifts the spirits of the recipient. I do get concerned that our ability to communicate is on a dangerous decline. Now that we use our phones instead of our computer keyboards, we have a new style of shorthand. Texting has created a whole new vocabulary. POS can mean Parents Over Shoulder or a very derogatory description. Things have gotten cryptic and I fear expressions of undying love are no longer as meaningful as they once were. Poetry seems completely gone. What does seem different today is the acceptance that a man can be kind, gentle, and romantic and still be a man. Today, men can cry and express emotions previously considered a sign of weakness. Maybe the best thing we can all do this Valentine's Day is to face the person/people we love, hold their hand, look into their eyes, and let them know how much you value them. That is my wish for you.

Today I meet with women in their homes and work with families who just need an American friend to help them sort out mail, school issues for their children, or need an occasional ride to an appointment. I have "adopted" so many of these amazing families! As our family continues to 'grow' so does my heart and my pride in these amazing friends! 




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District One Update Bill Rosenfeld & Pat Soltys





a women's singing group. And, there was a Santa Shop for children to 'shop' in for their loved ones.





This is very frustrating, and often is how the 'buts' begin. This article may help you eliminate exercise 'buts'. I have written up a list of alternatives to the complaint that you would exercise, but....

If it is too cold to exercise outdoors, or the weather is bad ... have you seen Northlake Mall recently? It is fairly empty compared to years past. Put on your walking shoes and circle around the remaining stores for 30 minutes. Just don't end up at the food court. Sam's Club, Costco, Walmart and Ikea are similar big box stores you can walk in. Many malls open early to allow people to come walk. Also, try indoor exercises or classes at your local gym or workout studio. I recently heard that the gym behind Mountain Park Baptist Church is open and is free. Go check it out. You can walk and work out there!

Do you have bad knees, bad hips or painful feet? Walking may still work, as long as it is on level ground and you get your shoes right. A recumbent bicycle (stationary or outdoor), elliptical or rowing machines are other alternatives. If you are using a recumbent outdoor bike, just remember, you are lower than many cars and are harder to see. Pool exercises: either running or walking in the pool (mid chest deep), swimming, or water aerobics are great year round regardless of the weather. Mountain Park has an outdoor lazy river that I used to jog in. In the winter, I went to the one at Bethesda Park Aquatic Center. It is indoors. You can also do this chest deep in any of the pools around. Just walk the pool, side to side so you stay at the same depth, against the water pressure and swing your arms underwater. It is great exercise!

Back problems? A stationary bicycle or elliptical machine will help. If you ride outdoors, you will get a better workout if you don't use all the gears. I have friends who are in love with their spin class! If you have a serious back problem, work out your upper body. Or, water aerobics may be for you. You do not need to know how to swim, as during most of the exercises you will use floatation belts and work against water resistance.

If you have balance problems and weak legs: Silver Sneakers or a personal trainer may help you. There are great balance exercises and many that will help strengthen your legs.

No time? Fifteen minutes twice a day is just as good as a 30-minute work out. Or—several studies have even suggested three 10-minute workouts work. Just do something!

No motivation to go? Ask around in your neighborhood, job or extra curricular activities. Someone just like you may be longing for an exercise partner. My best buddy-regular exercise partner moved away last year. I recently connected with someone else I knew and can walk at least once a week with her. Joining an exercise class may even open the doors to new friendships. The group thing really does help! techtalk Instapot: What the Heck is It?

It seems that every store I visited this last Christmas season was selling something that sounded like or was in fact called an Instant Pot. There are brand names and knockoffs and it is almost bewildering to try to sort all this out.

If you are like me, I shop on Amazon and use the customer ratings as a guide to what seems the most reliable and reasonable. But, the first question you probably have is: why do I need another kitchen appliance? Fair enough, and perhaps you don't if your slow cooker keeps you blissfully happy.

However, if you do not have a pressure cooker, this may be the life-changer since pressure cooking can do what no other appliance in the kitchen can. If you didn't get one for Christmas, here are some tips that may help you decide which is right for you.

An Instapot is a pressure-cooker. Pressure cooking is much faster, seals in moisture and flavor, and foods can be cooked directly from frozen.

Unlike pressure cookers of old, which could be dangerous, this new pressure cooker has 10 proven safety mechanisms. I've never worried about burning myself while using my new Instapot.

Additional uses include:

- rice cooker
- yogurt maker
- steamer (veggies and more)
- saute pan
- hard-boiled egg maker
- slow cooker/crock pot

There are 3 sizes of Instant Pots.

• Two to Three (2-3) quart is considered the "mini" for dorms, RVs, and other smaller needs. These also work perfectly if you are only cooking for yourself.

• Six (6) quart is the standard size that easily feeds 4-6 people and can cook a meat-loaf, cheesecake, or a small chicken or roast.

• Eight (8) quart is for if you are cooking for a larger family. It takes a bit longer to come to pressure but the extra size is handy.

There is a LOT you can do with one Instapot, so much so, that it's a little overwhelming at first. Doug Reynics recipe for making yogurt, below, is just one example to help you get started. Happy Cooking!

Instant Pot Yogurt

Did you know you can easily create your own yogurt in your instant pot? It only uses a few ingredients and is ready overnight.

It's best not to alter this recipe. It's also a better set if you don't try to create a "fruit on the bottom" type yogurt. Follow this recipe for a good set.

1/2 gallon Fair Life milk (or milk that must be ultra pasteurized)

4 Tablespoons of Skyr, or Oui or Phage unflavored yogurt

1 can sweetened condensed milk

1 large bowl

Pour about a cup of milk and the starter, whip until well mixed.

Pour in more milk and add sweetened condensed milk and a heaping Tbsp of vanilla extract Mix well.







That Zumba toning class? I am ready to start back at the beginning again! No 'buts' about it!

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Pour in rest of milk and mix. Take 7 jelly (8 ounce) and 7 half jelly (4 ounce) jars. Fill and screw on tops loosely. Pour about 1-2" water in inner pot (NO trivet). Place the 7 jars around/ in the center of the pot. Stack the half jars on top. Close pot (does not matter if it's on seal or not). Press Yogurt button (it should read 12). Store in fridge. Will keep for 2 weeks.

Skeptic About Your Septic?

Living in the area that we do, septic tanks are a given. And, unfortunately, when they're malfunctioning the tanks can be a real pain in the rump for homeowners. During the holidays and the period where we were getting so much rain, we had one of those pains. One night we noticed water coming up through two drain holes in our basement. In speaking with a plumber, we were told "not to worry about it as long as it was just water" and that they were receiving a lot of calls about this due to the water table* being so full-- i.e., the table was so full that the water had to go somewhere. I wasn't comfortable with this advice; however, knowing that we had just had our tank pumped out a year ago and our lines flushed out too, I went along with it. My gut was telling me otherwise.

Well, through years of experience, I have found that the gut usually trumps logic so I regret not acting more promptly. Two days later, we had more than just water in the basement, and quite a mess to clean up. In the meantime, we had a septic tank company come out and inspect the tank. It needed pumping. Note: In general, a tank needs to be pumped every five to seven years. And, some plumbers/industry pro's on this subject, will tell you that tanks never need pumping. Well, some version of these two opinions is probably more true if your tank is functioning properly; i.e., there are no clogs, blockages, broken pipes, roots in the pipes, or disruptions in your drain field. Our tank had a clog so it was not draining properly.

* Did the water table impact our tank? "Rainfall has a direct relationship to the groundwater level, and time seems to not be a major factor, though the longer the time between rain events and their magnitude does seem to change things," said Ryan Tidwell-Davidson, our local (Smoke Rise) meteorologist. "This December we had 12.02 inches of rain at Dekalb-Peachtree Airport; we usually average 4.16 inches." Ryan did some research and looked at the groundwater tables. "As we had rain after rain every weekend or so, the ground water went from an average of near 7.5 feet below the surface to almost 6.5 feet below the surface. Not incredibly high but still higher than the median value recorded over the last 34 years. The water table would have to be pushing five feet or less from the surface to have a significant impact," Ryan explained.

So, indeed, we did have a lot of rain and the water table was higher than norm but, our woes were of another nature and not from the crowded table. Logic is good but in the future, I'll be a skeptic and listen to my gut on matters of the butt (pain in the rumps....LOL!)!

City of Tucker at Your Fingertips

It seems we can never finish all our daily tasks. How do we manage to get everything done? Even if you consider the potential for its abuse, online technology is arguably a tremendous aid to many of us. I know my family can't live without some of the conveniences of computers. That definitely includes online services (and computer games, smart phones and our "smart" TV too).

The World Wide Web provides a communication platform, and generally can help make our lives easier. For example, we can access information and entertainment, fill out forms, make purchases, and even pay bills – online! However, I do recommend a healthy dose of caution when exchanging sensitive information online (either personal or business). But, you may be pleasantly surprised what you can accomplish online - once you get past the paranoia phase.

For example, you can apply for a homestead exemption, report a code violation, search for current job openings, or apply for water and sanitation services. You can also find out about upcoming public hearings, submit an open records request, report a code violation, or get caught up on other local news happening in your community.

The City of Tucker has always offered new business license applications online, and now, it has a brand-new service in place – online business license renewals! City officials hope this new online feature eases the burden on staff and business owners. The city's new software allows users to input and process all information through the site. Are Home Repairs Keeping Your Home From Selling?

If you have made the decision to sell your home this spring, you will want to take inventory of its condition and make sure it is ready to bring the highest possible price and quickest sale. One of the main causes of buyers canceling their contracts before closing is due to the repair conditions that are discovered when the buyer has a professional inspection on the house. Even if defects are discovered and negotiated for repair, the sellers can still end up paying much more for those repairs than they could have beforehand. When the buyers discover undisclosed defects, they are likely to want to dictate the choice of contractor or materials used. If you are not sure of the condition of your home or have not kept records of the age of systems and updates it would be wise for you to hire a professional home inspector prior to putting the house on the market and go ahead and make any discovered repairs before you list it for sale. The list below summarizes some of the most common repairs that are discovered by professional inspectors.

- 1. Electrical: Electrical codes change over the years. You are not required to update an electrical system but if you do any modification it must be done to current code. Lack of Ground Fault Circuit Interruption (GFCI) outlets in wet areas is one of the most common problems, along with loose electrical wiring that is not in a junction box and double taps into the electrical panel.
- 2. Siding issues are common. Even some of the more recent concrete sidings can have missing caulk at the joints.
- 3. Chimneys are susceptible to many issues. Flashing to prevent standing water, missing boards and cracked chimney caps are common problems on older homes. Roof issues can include flashing defects around gables and porches, missing or cracked shingles and damaged vent stacks. Soffits and gutters are carefully looked at for loose connections, wood rot, moisture intrusion and holes in gutters.
- 4. Decks should be inspected for any issues that could make them unsafe, including rotting boards and loose rails.
- 5. Wood rot and missing caulk around windows and doors, and front steps that have settled are often noted. Any uneven steps or broken concrete can be considered "trip hazards' and will be in the report.
- 6. Most reports have several small items such as doors that don't latch or lock, loose faucets, ceiling fans that are not level. One of the most often noted is rocking toilets that are not securely fastened to the floor.
- 7. Plumbing and water: Inspectors are careful to check for any water leaks and note the obvious causes, such as leaking sinks or condensation drips from air conditioning. Current or previous water penetration in crawlspaces or basements will be noted.

Many of the needed repairs can be taken care of by your local handyman and will go a long way toward forming the buyer's impression of the condition of your home which, of course, affects the price he is willing to pay.

Morning Glories Learn to Garden Inside in January!

Many of you have heard and enjoyed Mickey Gazaway every Saturday morning on Walter Reeves' The Lawn and Garden Show on WSB. Mickey is an employee of Pike's Nursery for over 25 years and is a Georgia Master Gardener and a Certified Arborist. She is a plants-woman extraordinaire and a delightful, interactive speaker. Her topic for our January meeting was house plants and she brought a broad array of plants for us to admire and study.

She offered a wonderful tip on selecting the proper house plant for your home based upon available light levels. House plants are categorized by light level: high, medium or low. You can gauge your home light level by raising your hand 6" over a flat surface with normal light in the room. If your hand shadow is distinct, you have high light. If it is blurred, your light is medium and if you cannot see the shadow, you have low light. Very few plants will survive in that low light level. A great example is the Sansaveria or Mother in Law's Tongue.

Mickey noted that fertilizing and watering are the other keys to successful house plants.



In fact, she noted that every plant has very specific water requirements and most want very little water especially during the winter months. Many houseplants can be moved outdoors from April-October into shady areas with morning sun only. The last day of frost in the Atlanta area is typically April 10th, so don't move them too soon. Fertilizing is dependent on the type of plant. If it is a plant grown for foliage like Pothos or Dracaena or Corn Plant, you need a fertilizer with 10-2-4 mix. If it is grown for flowers like the African Violet, it should be 8-14-8.



One last tip that will help anyone who received an orchid this holiday season. She noted that once the bloom stalk has completed blooming, you can

cut it off to the first node on the stalk and it will bloom again. Try it!

February signals that Spring is just around the corner. Lawns are greening, trees are budding, daffodils are popping up and, indeed, we are

turning our hearts toward love and..... American Presidents! When I was in school, we honored both Lincoln's birthday on the 12th and Washington's on the 22nd. Then, in 1971, as part of the Uniform Holiday Act, which created a 3-day weekend for the nation's workers, the third Monday In February was chosen as President's Day, honoring all US presidents and providing an excuse for President's Day sales.

I began to wonder what the favorite foods of some of our presidents might be. With a little research and delving into my favorite "First Ladies' Cookbook", I was expecting to find that President George Washington's favorite food would naturally be Cherry Pie. While I did find that many presidents had a fondness for pie, I learned that George's favorite food was mashed sweet potatoes (easy on the wooden teeth) and President Lincoln's was his mother's gingerbread. Washington had a fondness for all types of fruit, which adds even more intrigue as to why he cut down that cherry tree! Virginia Ham was one of the top favorites of presidents, as was seafood, cakes, mutton chops and ice cream. Squirrel soup also made the list. Georgia's own President Jimmy Carter, I presumed, would have a fondness for peanut butter pie but, alas, his southern roots prevailed with the simple and humble favorite of grits and cheese. On the other hand, President Donald Trump is said to always have peanuts available as a frequent favorite snack, proving once again that food is the common experience that brings us together!

By now you have guessed that this article is heading toward recipes for pie, beginning with a cherry pie in honor of the Father of Our Country. "Easy as Pie" didn't quite fit the definition of cooking a pie for me until I discovered Pillsbury Pie Crust. It is in the dairy section near the canned pastries and the box has two precut rounds. With many products I don't mind trying the store brands, but this is one product that I insist on. It has the flaky texture that tastes homemade and is quick and easy to use. Take it out of the fridge about 20 minutes before you use it. My favorite frozen pie crust can be found at the Dekalb Farmer's market.

Quick and Easy Deep-Dish Cherry Pie

1 box Pillsbury Pie Crust (or you can make it from scratch) 1 can cherry pie filing

1 can dark sweet cherries (undrained)

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar

4 tablespoons butter cut in small pieces.

Mix undrained cherries and cherry pie filling, add sugar. Place one round of dough on board and roll slightly with a rolling pin. Place in lightly greased deep-dish pie pan or dish. Add mixture of cherries. Dot top with butter. Add second pie crust (also rolled) on top of pie and crimp edges all around pie dish. Cut slits in top crust around center of pie for steam to escape. An impressive lattice top is easy to learn, and I am sure there is a you tube video with directions. Lightly sprinkle top of pie with 1 tablespoon of sugar for a crispy crust. Bake at 350° for 45 minutes or until crust is golden brown. Cool pie in pan. Serve warm with vanilla ice cream or whipped cream.

You know that recipe card that you can barely read because of all the spills and grease on it? Well my Coconut Buttermilk Pie is on just such a card. This one goes back many years and never fails to be a favorite. It really is "easy as pie" because can be mixed in one bowl and you can multiply the recipe if you want to make a bunch of them to freeze.

Coconut Buttermilk Pie

1 stick melted butter 1 ¹/₄ cup sugar 3 eggs – lightly beaten 1 tsp vanilla ¹/₂ cup buttermilk

6 oz sweetened flaked coconut

Melt butter and add sugar. Mix well but don't beat with electric mixer. Add vanilla and buttermilk. Add eggs last. Fold in coconut. Pour into unbaked pie shell and bake at 350° for 30-35 minutes until pie is set.

Double recipe will make 2 deep dish or 3 standard pies. NOTE: when doubling recipe cut sugar by ¹/₄ cup.
