James O. Dewey

Chaplain Jim Dewey was born at the Naval Academy into a Marine Corps family. Jim's father was a gate quard at the Academy and later retired as a Master Sergeant with 23 years of service. Jim was commissioned in 1996 after graduating from Tulane University in New Orleans, Louisiana. He was a supply officer who served in Quantico, Camp Lejeune, and Parris Island. In 2004 with over 8 years of service he resigned his Marine Corps commission and started his studies at Beeson Divinity School in Birmingham, Alabama. Jim was commissioned as a Navy chaplain in 2008 with his first tour taking him to Irag with 2D Radio Battalion out of Camp Lejeune, NC. He subsequently deployed with the 22nd MEU to Haiti in the aftermath of the 2010 earthquake. Follow-on assignments took Jim to San Diego for two overseas deployments aboard the USS BUNKER HILL, a tour at 8th & I with Marine Barracks Washington DC - the Oldest Post of the Corps, and in the Pentagon on the staff of the Navy Chief of Chaplains. Jim is currently serving as the chaplain with Coast Guard Sector Detroit and Sector Sault Ste. Marie (East). He will retire at the end of 2020 with 21 years of active service.

The Chaplain is called upon to offer invocations and prayer for meetings, initiations, installations and for ceremonies. He/she requires the support of the membership to keep the Chaplain informed of situations and issues of need within the detachment.

HISTORIAN'S CORNER

PROJECT 100,000 - PART TWO

When you joined up, you took the Armed Forces Qualification Test (AFQT). This test was used to determine one's ability to learn military skills and weed out those who could not. There were 100 questions and you had an hour to complete the test. Here are some examples;

- 1. Bob wants to buy a wagon. He has 5 dollars and needs 5 dollars more. How much does the wagon cost?
- A. \$10
- B. \$15
- C. \$25
- D. \$55
- 2. If 12 men are needed to run 4 machines, how many men are needed to run 20 machines?
- A. 24
- B. 48
- C. 60
- D. 80

Through some complicated math your score placed you into one of five categories, which corresponded to an IQ level and you could score in Category I (very high IQ) to a Category V (very low IQ). Prior to the implementation of PROJECT 100,000, only Categories I, II, & III were accepted into the Armed Forces. When PROJECT 100,000 was enacted (October 1, 1966 to December 31, 1971) all Category IV and some Category V were acceptable for induction.

Our military leadership and Congress was not at all happy with this, but ultimately had to submit to the program. Included in this plan was Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara's insisting that the lower Category IV & V inductees be given remedial reading, writing, and math education to bring them up to speed with the rest of recruits. None of our Armed Forces had the funds in their budgets to add this into the basic training curriculum.

From October 1, 1966 to December 31, 1971, 354,000 men (all under Project 100,000) were inducted into the Armed Forces, most Category IV and some Category V. Some of the ways Category V persons

became Category IV were outrageous. Changing the scores, having others take the test again for those that scored low, and a loophole called "Administrative Acceptance" was used.

Say for example you finished high school or had some college and you purposely tried to score low. You were deemed a faker and accepted. If you were truly "mentally slow" and had a Category V score, clerks could deem you smarter than you appeared on your test. How could the mentally deficient know they were being railroaded? Many never heard of Vietnam, or could read or write!


