Mr. Sturm, a son of the late August and Mary Sturm, was born in Saginaw, Mich., on May 3, 1866. He moved with his parents to Pigeon when he was five years of age. They settled in a section of backwoods near what is now Sturm Road, which is about forty rods south of the Campbell Road. His early childhood was spent here, helping his father clearing the land for a farm. When he was fifteen, he obtained a job helping build the Grand Trunk Railroad which was being constructed from Caseville South.
