And with that, thank you so much to everyone that has been involved in this edition of the newsletter and I wish you all a wonderful, merry festive period.



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

Where possible we encourage you to use decorations made from natural materials such as wreaths, wood and real plants and small trees (under 2ft). We are committed to reducing the use of plastic in our churchyards, so please avoid plastic items, if possible.

UNITED PARISH GIFT DAY

The four churches of our United Parish of Chinnor, Sydenham, Aston Rowant and Crowell support the local communities by providing regular services, weddings, baptisms, funerals and other events. The current cost of continuing such support is circa £144,000 per year for maintenance, heating, lighting and insurances.

The income to cover these costs comes mainly from the regular giving of the church congregations. This is currently borne by circa 170 regular worshippers and supporters. The congregations in total regularly give £80,000 per year, so the remaining £64,000 income per year required to meet the remaining costs has to be sought elsewhere. The clergy and congregations are committed to keeping our churches open, so the United Parish Gift Day is an opportunity for the wider community to recognise the role of the churches and enable the continuation of the full range of services by providing monetary gifts to help meet the full income requirement each year.

CONTINUING TO MAKE OUR CHURCHES AVAILABLE

In the light of the rising number of Covid cases, I've consulted with the ministry team and our churchwardens and at the moment Sunday service arrangements are going to remain broadly as they are. So, please do remember to bring a mask with you and to sanitise your hands as you arrive and leave. We will return to picking up a pot containing the communion wafer as you arrive, to reduce the amount of movement around the church and to shorten the service. Please also continue to socially distance yourselves from other households as much as possible. Hopefully we won't need them. Throughout the pandemic we have shown that we are a careful and responsible community who is respectful of each other.

OPENREACH HIGH SPEED FIBRE BROADBAND TO PROPERTIES

It is great news on this front, as the Central Government (DCMS) has approved the Sydenham scheme for delivery and allocated the necessary funding. A big thank you to everyone for validating their vouchers, as this means that Openreach will undertake the project at their commercial risk together with the Government funding. As a result, Openreach will now be moving into delivery mode, so you should see Openreach vans in the village doing surveys over the next few weeks, hopefully culminating in delivery in the second quarter of next year. It has not been an easy process over the last 9 months and as a result of some complications with Openreach, we ended up referring the project to their Chief Executive. This ended up assisting in us getting an accelerated approval through DCMS. As a result, this has been very fortunate as we now believe that approvals have slowed down considerably due to budgeting issues at DCMS.


THE JAYS FOOTPATH TRANSFORMATION

Work has finished on the upgrading of the Jays footpath/bridleway, which most of you will know has become almost impassable during some of the winter months. Huge thanks to Garth Weston - the landowner - for making this happen, with the support of the Parish Council.

Paul Grafham has done an outstanding job in reprofiling the footpath and recreating a drainage ditch and then Paul & Harry Grafham, Dave Wilkins, John Church, Nigel Lamb and Duncan MacDonald did a brilliant job with a digger, dumpers and a roller to lay and compact 80 tonnes of hardcore supplied by Garth. While country footpaths by their very nature are never going to perfect, we hope this will now mean that The Jays footpath can be used throughout the year that no one has a need to consider using any other unauthorised routes.

Thanks everyone for your huge effort and we hope you enjoy using the footpath.

PLAYING FIELD AND DRAINAGE DITCH

WA very successful working party tackled strimming and weeding to tidy up the perimeter - many thanks to the volunteers. The hedges have been cut, and a stretch of 20-30m plus infill marked for replanting in February.

The fencing around the drainage ditch adjacent to the playing field has been in place since the drainage works on the corner of Sewells lane. During excavation, the contractor came up against a number of utilities that were not identified during the trial pit investigations phase last year. Unfortunately, these utilities were at the same level where the new pipe was to run. This meant that the pipe had to be directed under these utilities to ensure adequate fall. Because of this, it meant that the level of the out fall into the ditch was a lot lower than it should have been.

Discussions with the contractor, resulted in the only real option being to install a crate system at the end of the new pipe and a large perforated 300mm pipe along the extent of the ditch connected to the crates. This will give plenty of capacity during rainfall and will act as a large soakaway which will slowly soak. The ditch will then be reinstated over the top to bring the ditch back to its original level. The only thing you will see once complete is a chamber at one end of the ditch which will be for maintenance access.

The works are due to commence on Monday 13th December and whilst traffic management measures will be in place there will not be a road closure.

CHICANE ON B4445

Chinnor PC are in the process of installing traffic calming measures at the entrances to the village. After much communication this includes looking positively at incorporating the proposed chicance on the B4445 on the Chinnor side of the Emmington junction to this project. This will use funding the PC have already secured.

VILLAGE MAINTENANCE

Now the field hedges have all been cut the ditches will be cleared ready for the winter rains. The pipe that runs from the village green, which was blocked last year and resulted in the reinstatement of the village pond on the green, is due to be cleared too.

20'S PLENTY

Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) is one of the first counties to consider widespread changes from 30mph to 20mph. The plan is to roll out 20mph over the next three years. Initially there are five trial sites, Cuxham, followed by Wallingford Central, Wallingford North, Kirtlington and Long Wittenham. The reason for the test is to determine the success of just replacing existing signage with 20mph. The pilot tests will measure traffic speeds before and after the signage change. If there is very little change then OCC will consider low-cost traffic calming which measures developed with the local community.

Sydenham Parish Council has applied for the Parish to be included in the scheme. We have a history of measures to help reduce speeding in the village, including the recent installation of traffic calming measures, and need to continue with such initiatives to be considered for the scheme. Once accepted we will communicate with villagers as to how they can help to reduce speed through the village.

A VISITOR TO OUR SERVICE

On Remembrance Sunday, I attended the service outside St Mary's Church in Sydenham. I live in the North-West on the Wirral and have been researching my family tree for several years. I had always intended to visit Sydenham because my mother's maiden name was Mundy and the research traced my family back to Sydenham with births, marriages and burials at St Mary's. What was great about visiting on this day was that there were local people outside the church and I was introduced to villager, Val Mundy. She was so helpful!

A bit of further research on Ancestry.com revealed that I am related to Val's husband, David Munday- we are 4th cousins and whilst that may seem a little distant, we share so much of the history of Sydenham. Val showed me round the churchyard where I could instantly spot the names of the Munday's, Chowns and Quaintons that are in my family tree. David and I shared a common ancestor called Stephen Munday who lived in Sydenham between 1802 and 1875. He's my 4th Great Grandfather and David's 3rd Great Grandfather. My branch of the Mundays (now Mundy) moved to Liverpool for work in the 1880s and there are lots of us spread across Liverpool, the UK, Canada and USA with branches in NZ and Australia. Fiona Kermack kindly showed me the Book of Marriages at St Mary's where I instantly found the marriage record for my Great Grandfather Benjamin Munday.

In Sydenham, my Mundy's lived in Brookstones and on the High Street and at Waterloo Farm, probably now lost. They were agricultural labourers, lacemakers and were in service at Shirburn Castle. Going back further than our common ancestor Stephen Munday, I have traced the tree back a long way. I can trace Sydenham/Chinnor Munday's back to 1563 with Robert Munday my 11th Great Grandfather.

These are also David's common direct lines. I can get back 6 more generations to 1400 and those 6 generations came from High Wycombe so not that far away.

The most notable Mundy was my 13th Great Grandfather Sir John Mundy. He was born in Wycombe, son of John Munday. He purchased the manor of Markeaton in 1516 as well as Mackworth and Allestree, which are all now parts of Derby from Lord Audley. In 1515 he served as a Sheriff of the City of London. Seven years later he became the Lord Mayor of London and was knighted in 1529. He died in 1538 in Derby. He was a Goldsmith.

The photo is myself and Val by one of the Munday gravestones. It was an unexpected bonus to actually meet a living relative on my trip. Can I thank Val and Fiona for their interest and time on the day and if anyone else has any Munday information or knows where Waterloo Farm was, could they let Val know, to pass on to me.


