SUPERINTENDENT REPORT

Hello Patrons,

As we are heading into October, and with the colder weather in front of us, I thought it would be a good time to update everyone on the plans to turn heat on in the building. As of right now, we only have gas running our domestic hot water system. Several wheels are in motion to ensure we have hot water heat throughout the building this winter.

Normal Heating System: All planning leads to having a functioning Liquid Propane system as it was intended to be used from the initial design. Parts for the underground tank have been ordered and we are awaiting their arrival and installation. Further plans will require the underground installation of drainage tile running parallel to the tank to avoid water seepage into the man-access area where the propane leaks are occurring.

Interim System: Carrier's will install LP valves from the two 1,000 gallon tanks they previously placed allowing them to be filled with liquid propane. LP lines will run to the vaporizer and feed the system just like the big tank would. The big drawback is that we are limited on the amount of propane which can be fed to the system. This will lead to increased visits by a propane truck and the inconvenience of spot checking the remaining amount of propane in the tanks on a daily basis. Please drive carefully on 3rd Avenue behind the school and keep the access to the "Propane Corral" clear of parked vehicles during the business day.

To ease the usage of propane on the interim system, we need to make adjustments to how much propane we use on a daily basis. In order to ration our propane, I have instructed Mr. Farris to set all thermostats to no more than 67 degrees. Please dress your students for the weather as it changes, keeping in mind that rooms will not heat above the 67 degree set-point.

The ACT test will be given in *Scobey* ONLY on October 28 and December 9. There are other national test dates available just not given at our school. Check the website for registration information and fees. Due to the district volleyball tournament on Oct. 28, the test will be given in an elementary classroom.

The PSAT test provides students and educators with the chance to check in on progress toward college and career readiness and success. It serves as an excellent way for students to preview and practice for the ACT. The PSAT test will be October 11 for those juniors who signed up with me last spring. The cost is \$10. The test will be given in the library this year.

The ASVAB interest inventory will be given to juniors on October 4. This is an interest inventory to help students determine areas of career interest. The test will be given in the library.

Keep in mind that the FAFSA window opens in October 1. Seniors need to be applying to colleges ASAP in order to receive the best financial aid packages available. OFFICE NOTES

Items not allowed in school

We have staff and students with allergies and sensitivities that we must take into consideration. These items cannot be included in any sort of school related activity, whether it be a field trip, ball games, or class time. In order to best protect the health of those individuals, the following items are not allowed in the school at any time:

<u>I CANNOT EMPHASIZE ENOUGH THAT</u> <u>THESE ITEMS ARE NOT ALLOWED – NO</u> <u>EXCEPTIONS!</u>

LATEX: No balloons, jewelry, gloves, rubber products, etc. that may contain latex. Mylar balloons are fine as are vinyl gloves (for emergencies and food service).

GLOW STICKS: Absolutely no glow sticks of any kind are allowed in the school.

BANANAS: Please do not bring or send into the school.

NUTS: No food or decorative items with nuts may be brought into the school. This includes peanuts, walnuts, pecans, etc.

AVOCADOS: Please do not bring or send avocados into the school.

Student Absences

We understand that it is necessary for students to miss school occasionally. Please inform the office of any absence by calling 487-2202 and speaking to Judy or Jonna. Please keep in mind that if students experience vomiting, diarrhea, fevers or rashes. If your grade 7-12 child has a medical/dental appointment, we ask that you bring back a documentation of visit when your child returns to school. Please note that this is not the same as an appointment card. The document In addition, when picking up or dropping off your child at other than the beginning or end of the school day, please check in at the office. Your assistance is greatly appreciated.

We also understand that parents need to be gone from time to time and leave their children in the care of others. Should you need to be gone and someone else is responsible for your child(ren), please call the office and let us know.

Student Illness

There are a few illnesses making the rounds in the community. If your child is ill with vomiting, diarrhea, a fever, or a rash we ask that you please keep your child home a full 24-48 hours after the last incident of vomiting and/or diarrhea or after the fever breaks or rash clears/scabs over. Encourage your child to wash his/her hands with soap and water to help decrease the chances of sharing germs.

Student Medications

In addition to every day medication needs, colds, flu, and other ailments make their way through the school population every year. <u>If your child must take</u> <u>medication during the school day, it must be</u> <u>processed through the school office. This includes</u> <u>inhalers.</u> Parents/Guardians are required to come in and sign medication forms. All prescription medication must be in the original bottle with the pharmacy label. Over-the-counter medications must be in the original bottle. Inhalers should have a label on the barrel. Students are NOT allowed to keep medications with them or in their lockers.
