

Grace & Peace from the Pastor's Desk

"Therefore we were buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we also might walk in newness of life." Romans 6:4

Again, we are experiencing the season of Lent. It comes around every church year after the season following Epiphany. It is a time of drawing nearer to God with repentance and celebrating God's grace given to us through his Son, Jesus Christ.

The word "Lent" means "spring". Spring is a time of renewal, a time of waiting for the days to grow longer, for flowers to bloom, and trees to blossom. For the calming, refreshing, lifegiving spring showers. Lent is a contrast between the lifegiving waters and the dry desert times in the life of our Lord. It reminds us that when we are in those wilderness places there is always a baptismal hope, that through the waters of baptism we have been received into the family of God.

In seminary, my friend Molly used to like to describe baptism as being in a boat in the middle of a calm pond, jumping out of that boat and watching the ripples extend from you to the shore. There is the moment of your baptism, followed by experiencing the waves of grace throughout your life.

Another way of thinking of baptism is a death of the old life followed by the new life. This is significantly demonstrated when the baptism is by immersion (which I've never done), but the principle can be applied. When we are under the water we are surrounded like the tomb that surrounded Jesus in his death. Then when we break through the water we are brought to new life, like the resurrected Jesus.

As we journey together through this season of Lent we will be reminded of the seasons of the dry desert and the refreshing waters of baptism and rebirth. Water will be used to heal a man born blind. Moses will strike the rock in the desert and water will gush forth. Jesus will meet with a woman at a well. We will be reminded that our faith is not private; it may be personal but it is meant to be shared.

There was a revival of faith going on at Asbury University last month. It began as a few persons remained after the scheduled worship service to continue worshipping. And it didn't stop. It went on for about a week, with people from all over the world coming to the college to pray, repent, be renewed in their faith, or find faith for the first time in their lives. It was unscripted, no worship leader or praise band. People would stand up as they felt led to read scriptures, start a song, or pray. The only reason they came was to worship. This spread across the country and into Africa. Perhaps it is the beginning of another great awakening. We can only hope so.

As we experience Lent, let it be an experience. Allow worship to touch you. Open yourself to the presence of the triune God. Expect a great awakening to happen in your spirit.





The Lenten Study - "On the Road to the Cross"

Using his imagination Rob Burkhart creates scenes that could be interactions of the lesser-known biblical characters who interact



with Jesus in the book "On the Road to the Cross". This interesting study which includes scenarios from the lives of the leper, the high priest's servant, the centurion, Cleopas, Nicodemus and more, along with their scriptural references, will be hosted by Pastor Karen beginning at 6 p.m. Ash Wednesday

(February 22) and continue each Wednesday during the Lenten season in the 'kindergarten room'. Everyone is invited to attend.

LENTEN DJSCJPLJNES

- On Ash Wednesday Christians are reminded that, as disciples of the Lord Jesus, we are called to struggle against everything that leads us away from love of God and neighbor. Repentance, prayer, fasting, and works of love—the disciplines of Lent—help us wage our spiritual warfare.
- These disciplines are not ways to influence God. Our relationship with God is established by grace. God's love through Jesus Christ is a gift. But the disciplines can deepen our relationship to God and God's people. They shape our lives and keep us in the real world where God has placed us to carry out our daily ministries. Each brings its own gracious gift.
- The disciplines also enable us to make Lent (which means *spring*) a time of renewal as we prepare for the Great Three Days of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter. Our need for renewal and God's call to struggle against sin make the disciplines things that are right for us to do.
- From the suggestions that are listed, pick one or more that can make Lent a season of renewal for you. Or take on others that would be meaningful for you.

Prayer for the good of your soul

Prayer is living and doing all that we do in the conscious awareness of God.

- Begin and end each day with a prayer of thanks to God.
- Say bedtime prayers with any children in your home.
- Make a list of 40 people and pray for one each day in Lent.
- Increase the quiet in your home. Turn off the TV and radio.
- Each day pray for someone or something you've heard about in the news.
- Spend 15 minutes each day to read Matthew, Mark, Luke, or John; or read the scripture verses from the previous Sunday in worship, or the coming Sunday.
- Read a book that will enrich your spiritual life.
- Seek out a pastor or a friend to be your spiritual companion during Lent. Talk about your relationship to God and issues of faith.

*Pray Martin Luther's Morning Prayer: We give thanks to you, heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ your dear Son, that you have protected us through the night from all danger and harm. We ask you to preserve and keep us, this day also, from all sin and evil, that in all our thoughts, words, and deeds we may serve and please you. Into your hands we commend our bodies and souls and all that is ours. Let your holy angels have charge of us, that the wicked one have no power over us. Amen

Fasting for the good of your body

Fasting makes us aware that our food and drink are gifts from God. It can also be a positive action that helps others.

- Pick one habit that drags you down or keeps you from living fully, and let go of it.
- *For the 6 weeks of Lent or 2-3 times a week, abstain from a favorite food or drink, a favorite activity, a favorite snack, or a favorite television program.
- *Select one day a week when you will eat no meat, or consume only liquids. Pray for those who go to bed hungry.
- *Set aside "financial fasting" days, when you will buy nothing.
- *Give up chocolate for Lent. For Easter gifts for yourself and others, buy fair trade chocolate from Lutheran World Relief. The profit from fair trade goods goes directly to the growers or craftspeople, and they receive a fair price for their labor. (See www. lwr.org/chocolate).
- *Simplify your life in some way; for example, clean up a junk drawer, messy closet, or table top. Give good items to an organization where they'll be well used.
- *Turn off lights when you leave the room. Recycle.Buy products with less packaging. Conserve water. Be good to the environment.

Almsgiving for the good of your neighbor

Works of love are witnesses to God's love and help us serve others as Christ's disciples.

- Each time you come to church during Lent, bring an item for the food pantry.
- Give 10% more to the church than you usually do.
- Offer to help a neighbor, family member, classmate, or co-worker with a tough chore. The help can be physical, emotional, or spiritual.
- Make a meal and take it to a homebound friend or neighbor. Visit a homebound member.
- Do a good deed that no one will know about.
- Say *I'm sorry* when you have hurt or failed someone.
- Learn about a group working for peace.
- Renew an old friendship.
- Call, write, or e-mail a public official, stating your views on an issue that concerns you.
- If you have made donations to an organization, make a visit to find out more about the workers and clients. Or visit its website, especially looking at the faces of people. Pray for those who benefit from your donation.

Spring is Coming...

And no matter what the groundhog said, it will be here soon and thoughts of spring cleaning will be with us. A good question for this month is "How can we clean in an environmentally friendly way?"

Let's start with some very general ideas that can help us to reuse and/or recycle:

- 1. Swap plastic bottles for glass ones
- 2. Opt for reusable cleaning cloths
- 3. Try homemade cleaning solutions
- 4. Switch to eco-friendly laundry detergent
- 5. Repurpose old toothbrushes
- 6. Switch to natural sponges
- 7. Substitute a dryer sheet for a reusable alternative

Some items that you may already have at home are good starts for ways to clean green:

White vinegar: An antifungal that also kills germs and bacteria. Baking soda: Eliminates odors and works as a gentle scouring powder.

Borax: this is the common name for the natural mineral compound sodium borate that eliminates odors, removes dirt, and acts as an antifungal and possible disinfectant.

According to the USDA, 30 – 40% of the American food supply is wasted. The best way to avoid food waste at home is to simply not buy too much food. That is particularly important for fresh produce which can spoil quickly. Storing produce properly can help extend its life. Fruit may ripen more quickly than you can use it, especially when stored in plastic. Vegetables are sensitive to ripening gases, so a basic rule is to separate fruit and vegetables. Some produce does best on the counter; others, in a cool, dry place; and some is better in the fridge.
