Greetings from Pastor Matthew



Grace...

Lutherans like to talk about grace. God's grace is God's unconditional love for all people and for all of the Cosmos made known through God's good creation and known most fully through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ the Son of God. Christians toss around the word "grace" like a Frisbee with a heart on it as though everyone knows what grace is. When ordinary people hear the word grace, most likely they think about a ballet dancer or figure skaters in the Olympics dancing gracefully across the ice. The way American Christians talk about Grace gives me a sense that Grace is some kind of privileged class, a ticket on the "A" Train, an all-you-can-eat buffet, a vague sense of God's unconditional love for those who believe in Jesus and maybe for everyone else, we're not sure, a smug sense of "being saved" although we're not sure what we are being saved from or for. We tend to assume we are pretty good people compared to everyone else, and other than a few specific sins that prick our consciences or because of a doctrinal belief we learned in Confirmation class, we don't really feel we need much grace at all. God loves us and we're saved, so we go about our ordinary lives. But Martin Luther's understanding of Grace is more specific.

Luther pondered the text from Romans, "The righteous shall live by faith." Luther was taught to believe in a Righteous and wrathful God. He understood the phrase, "The righteous shall live by faith" to mean that one had to become righteous in order to live by faith. But no matter what Luther did, confessing, praying, making pilgrimages and performing rites of contrition, nothing could assuage Luther's conscience. He asked, "How can anyone stand before a righteous God?" Luther's breakthrough came when he realized that one does not have to become righteous in order to live by faith. Rather, God imputes upon us God's righteousness so that we can live by faith. God gives us God's own righteousness. God makes us right in God's eyes through God's gracious love shown most fully through Jesus' willing suffering and death on the cross, and by his glorious resurrection. Because of God's love shown through Jesus, we are made righteous by God's grace. We live by faith. Even though we know we are still sinners, we also know that our sins are covered by God's grace. And so we are free from fear, death and the power of evil. Yay!

As we celebrate Five hundred years of living by God's imputed righteousness which we accept and trust and live day-by-day by faith. In other words, living by God's grace, we are now free to love God, love our neighbor and care for the world God made.

Just as Luther nailed 95 statements about how the church needed to be reformed onto the door of the Wittenberg Cathedral, so now, we ask ourselves what needs to be reformed in the church and world today. We cannot continue to sustain our present way of life without serious consequences on the environment and on our health. So, just as Luther's insights into God's grace produced profound change in church and society, so also, our awareness of God's love for all of humanity and all of Creation moves us to change the way we live. By God's grace we can live into an Eco-Reformation.

Now, one danger, of course, in putting forth an Eco-Reformation is that one might fall into the spiritual trap of self-righteousness. We might find ourselves congratulating ourselves for our small acts of Creation care, and judging others for their choice of cars, for not recycling, and so forth. Our attention might rightly turn to a public outcry against major sources of industrial pollution, as well. This is necessary, as we realize

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that all the recycling and individual conservation efforts we do will not even put a dent in the carbon and other pollutants of major corporations. We will need to be careful not to fall into the sin of self-righteousness and judgment of others and so lose the true faith that relies only on God's unconditional love for us. We must remember this basic revealed truth of Luther. That we do not become righteous by our own works in order to live by faith. Instead, God imputes God's righteousness to us, so that we can live by faith. Only by living in grace by faith through Jesus Christ alone can we then, in response, to God's gracious love, and by pure concern for God's creation and the well-being of our neighbors, live into the new Eco-Reformation that is the work of the next five hundred years.

You speak of Faith. Faith in You? That I have not seen nor heard. Yes, it must be faith, faith to believe in the unseen and unheard. To be still and to listen for the sound of Your voice in the softest of a breeze, or the roar of rolling thunder. To feel Your touch on my face with the warmth of the sun. I see a sunrise, a new beginning to the day. Watch a butterfly struggle as it emerges from its cocoon. I look into the face of a young child and see the wonder in that innocent smile. I marvel at an animal's eye, how it works, how sight is possible. That it is possible to live without all of our organs that we were born with. To see a mighty ocean and small pond, that You have made. Your wonders are all around us.

Now I see You are in all things. You were always there, You gave me what I needed, not what I wanted. I understand now that there is only one thing that truly matters in life and that is our relationship to You. Oh God, how could I have questioned You?

Excerpts taken from A Spirituality of Fundraising, by Henri J.M. Nouwen

"How do we become people whose security base is God and God alone? How can we stand confidently with rich and poor alike on the common ground of God's love? How can we ask for money without pleading, and call people to a new communion without coercing? How can we express not only in our way of speaking but also in our way of being with others the joy, vitality, and promise of our mission and vision? In short, how do we move from perceiving fundraising or pledging as an unpleasant but unavoidable activity to recognizing it as a life-giving, hope-filled expression of ministry?"

"Pledging or fundraising is proclaiming what we believe in such a way that we offer people an opportunity to participate with us in our vision and mission. It is precisely the opposite of begging. When we seek to raise funds we are not saying, "Please, could you help us out because lately it's been hard." Rather, we are declaring, "We have a vision that is amazing and exciting. We're inviting you to invest yourself through the resources that God has given you—your energy, your prayers, and your money—in this work to which God has called us." Our invitation is clear and confident because we trust that our vision and mission are like "trees planted by streams of water, which yield their fruit in its season, and their leaves do not wither." (Psalm 1).

- ___Personal computers and related items: Laptops, Desk top computers, monitors and printers, Computer cables and key boards with mice


Items will be accepted on Sunday mornings before and after our service and on Wednesdays, between 10 am and 2 pm.


Reformation 500

We have been celebrating the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation all year long. We viewed the <u>Luther</u> movie, the Wednesday Women's Bible Study viewed Rick Steves' movie on the Reformation, we have heard stories, we have read, we have discussed, and we have partied. Our culminating party is scheduled for November 5 following worship. We have a resource section in the library of our Luther collection. The 200 section (religion) has blue stickers over the call number of those written by Lutherans. We have looked at the Reformation through the historical lens and through the present-day lens. Now the question remains, What next?

One of the resources some of us are using is <u>Day by Day We Magnify You</u>, daily readings for the entire year compiled from Martin Luther's writings, sermons, and table talks.

From Tuesday's (10/24/2017) devotion: Christians Save the World 2 Corinthians 6:10 and his sermon on John 14-15, Luther Every individual Christian is a human being such as the Lord Christ himself was on earth...If there were no Christians on earth, no city or country would enjoy peace: Everything on earth would perish in a single day. That grain still grows in the field; that people recover from an illness; that they have their sustenance, peace, and protection – all this they owe to the Christian."

I had forgotten this. Then I remember that Abraham negotiated with the Trinity for the safety of Lot and his family. It was because of the *believers* that Sodom and Gomorrah would not be destroyed. Abraham negotiated that number down to ten and Abraham knew any less than that would not save the cities. There were not even ten believers in the two cities. The Wednesday Women's Bible Study Reformation study lifted up the Body of Christ. As a Body, the world survives. But what about all the atrocities, abuses, and annellations that have happened and continue to happen in the Name of Christ?



Seeds for the Parish arrived. This ELCA magazine shares resources for congregational use. One resource now in our library is:

<u>Salvation Story</u> by David R. Froemming is a Biblical Commentary on Human Violence and Godly Peace. He introduced me to *mimetic theory: namely that we learn through imitation yet enter into rivalry with those who are too much like us.*

The premise of the book: mimetic theory provides the key to the understanding of our human nature that is being encountered in the bible.

Romans 7:14ff: the Apostle Paul writes *I do not understand my own actions*. For *I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate*. I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate.

Maybe this book just might shed some light on this conflict.


