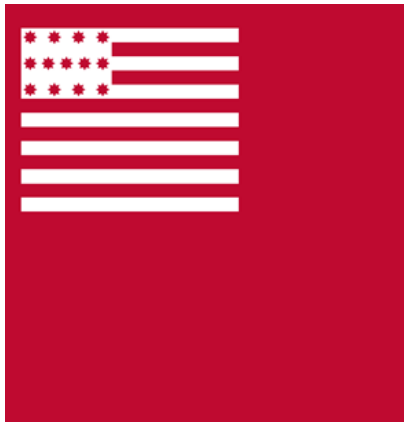
NEWS FROM THE SAL...

The History of the American Flag

The Brandywine Flag

On September 11, 1777 the 7th Pennsylvania Regiment's Company raised this flag at the Battle of Brandywine (also known as the Battle of Brandywine Creek), near present-day Chads Ford, PA. Fortunately this flag still exists and is displayed today in the Philadelphia Independence National Historical Park. This is undoubtedly the closest resemblance of the Stars and Stripes during the Revolutionary War era. The field is solid red with the canton containing small red and white stripes with thirteen red stars.

The flag is unusual in its design, the original is square 52"x 52".

On the morning of battle, 15,500 British Red Coats engaged the Continental Army containing 14,000 troops, 1,000 of whom were militia from eastern Pennsylvania. The British forces routed the Continental Army and forced them to withdraw, first, to the City of Chester, Pennsylvania, and then northeast toward Philadelphia. Brandywine was the single largest battle during the American Revolution engaging more than 30,000 troops. It was also the longest single-day battle of the war, with continuous fighting for 11 hours.

George Washington committed a grievous error in leaving his right flank unprotected and his army was nearly annihilated, they lost 11 of 14 canon pieces and over 1,000 casualties.

Captain Robert Wilson carried this banner at two other Pennsylvania battles; Paoli on September 21, and Germantown on October 4, both considered minor skirmishes allowing the Continental Army to escape and fight another day.

So why isn't this flag remembered as the first American flag? The Brandywine flag was in fact, one of the first American flags with stars and stripes, but it was only a militia flag, not an official standard of Washington's army.

Final Note: The British continued to advance and encountered a greater force of Continentals behind the stone walls on the Old Kennett Meetinghouse grounds. The battle was fought at mid-morning around the Meetinghouse while the pacifist Quakers continued to hold their midweek service. One of the Quakers later wrote, "While there was much noise and confusion without, all was quiet and peaceful within".

Flag Facts

Q: Where did the phrase "Old Glory" originate?

A: William Driver, a sea captain from Salem, Massachusetts, received on his twenty-first birthday a twenty-four-star flag from his mother. When he first hoisted the banner and it unfurled in a brisk wind, Driver was moved to name it "Old Glory."

Later on, Driver moved to Tennessee with his family. They found the old tattered flag and Driver's wife and daughters removed the old stars and sewed thirty-four new ones on to it. On May 7, 1861 Tennessee seceded and the Driver family hid the flag away by sewing it inside a bed quilt.

Twice during the Civil War Confederate partisans came to the Driver home and demanded that he surrender the flag. He adamantly refused, saying, "If you want my flag, you'll have to take it over my dead body."

On February 25, 1862, federal troops occupied Nashville. Driver celebrated the event by liberating Old Glory from inside the quilt and took it to the Tennessee State Capitol Building.

In December 1864, Confederate General John Bell Hood tried to retake the city and Union troops under Gen. George H. Thomas defeated Hood's army. "The morning of battle, December 15," Mary Roland wrote, "my father hung Old Glory out the third-story window, in plain sight."

Now sixty-one years old, Driver left his family to defend the city at Fort Negly, he "called together the entire household and said, 'If Old Glory is not in sight, I'll blow the house out of sight, too.'" The nickname stuck. Today the original Old Glory is on display in the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History in Washington.

Flag glossary of terms

- Banner: A flag or piece of cloth bearing a symbol, logo, slogan, or message.
- Canton: A rectangular area, usually at the top hoist corner of a flag. Sometimes contains a symbol of national unity.
- Colors: A flag, ensign or standard born in an army or fleet. A country's national flag.
- Emblem: A graphic design used as part of a flag.
- Ensign: A flag, banner, or standard showing office, rank, or nationality, especially of an army or ship.
- Flag: A piece of cloth often flown from a pole or mast. Used symbolically for signaling or identification.
- Field: The backdrop color to a flag. The portion of the flag not including the canton.
- Finial: A distinctive or decorative ornament at the top of a flagpole.
- Fly-end: The free flying end of a flag, opposite the hoist or heading.
- Fringed: A flag or banner containing decorative fringe around all or part of its perimeter.
- Ground: A plain surface (excluding the canton) to which a decoration is applied.
- Half-mast or half-staff: The position of a flag approximately half way up a flag pole. Used in mourning, distress, or as a symbol of respect.
- Halyard: A rope or tackle for hoisting and lowering the flag.
- Heading: The reinforced vertical part of the flag to which the lanyards are attached; part of the flag which uses grommets.
- Hoist: The vertical height of the flag. The side used to attach the flag to a pole. To raise the flag.
- Jack: A small flag flown at the bow of a ship, usually to indicate nationality.
- Lanyard: Devices or line used to attach the halyard to the flag, usually by connecting a device or rope to the grommet holes on the flag's hoist end.
- Standard: A conspicuous object formally carried at the top of a pole; to serve as an emblem. The personal flag of the head of state. An organization flag carried by mounted or motorized military unit.
- Storm flag: The smallest United States flag, flown at many army posts and on Navy and Coast Guard vessels in stormy weather.
- Truck: The device that covers the top of the flag pole, holds the finial in place, and may contain pulleys to which the external halyard is attached.
- Vexillology: Is the study of the history, symbolism and usage of flags or, by extension, any interest in flags in general.
