WESTERN YELLOW-BILLED CUCKOO'S THREATENED STATUS CHALLENGED

In November 2014, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) listed the western population of the Yellow-billed Cuckoo as threatened under the Endangered Species Act (ESA). Extensive loss, degradation and fragmentation of cottonwood-willow riparian woodlands, large declines in cuckoo numbers, and a major contraction of the species' range in the West led to the listing. The area in which cuckoos are considered threatened covers portions of 12 western states, Canada and Mexico. Included is the Rio Grande Valley in southern New Mexico and Trans-Pecos Texas.

In May 2017, a group of livestock, resource-extraction and property-rights entities formally petitioned the USFWS to remove the western population of the Yellow-billed Cuckoo from the list of endangered and threatened wildlife under the ESA. The petition contended the cuckoo should be delisted because 1) its western populations "do not constitute a discrete and significant distinct population segment (DPS)" and 2) the USFWS overstated the threats to the species in the West because it assumed western cuckoos require "large expanses of low-elevation cottonwood-willow riparian woodlands for breeding." To support this second contention, the petition cited evidence that western cuckoos may be breeding in other habitats.

On June 27, 2018, the USFWS, in response to the petition, announced it would begin a status revue to determine whether the western population of the Yellow-billed Cuckoo should be delisted. In its evaluation of the petition, the USFWS concluded the petition does not provide substantial information to support a delisting based on an erroneous DPS analysis, but that delisting may be warranted based on the information presented regarding additional habitat use.

The status revue is now in progress. As part of the revue, the USFWS is seeking any new information concerning the status of or threats to western Yellow-billed Cuckoos. When complete, the status revue will provide the basis for a "12-month finding" on whether delisting the cuckoo is warranted.

birding events. These tours both occur during peak fall migration, a great time for birding. Please RSVP; space is limited to 10 people for each tour.

First, we will be looking for birds along the Resler Canyon Arroyo on **Saturday, September 8th from 8 to 10 a.m.** We will explore the mid-elevation desert arroyo habitat at Resler Canyon with our tour guide Kevin Floyd. We might see Gambel's quail, roadrunners, Swainson's hawks, and black-chinned hummingbirds. We will meet at Cadiz Street for the start of the bird walk. Wear a hat, sunblock, sturdy shoes, as it is rocky, and bring plenty of water. If you have them, feel free to bring binoculars and a camera. No prior bird watching experience required! The second tour will take place **Saturday, September 15 from 8 to 10 a.m.** at Keystone Heritage Park and Wetlands, where Resler Canyon ends. Here Kevin Floyd will point out several species of ducks returning from their northern breeding grounds, wading birds, and swallows. This is the peak of fall migration, a great time for birding. We will meet at Keystone Heritage Park in the parking lot. There is a \$2 donation for admission to Keystone, please bring cash. No prior bird watching experience required! 

AT FEATHER LAKE

The trend of brief, infrequent, partial flooding of the Feather Lake basin continues. We are still awaiting the first storm event in 2018 capable of putting water in the entire basin. The basin has been largely dry for 9 months now.

Our next workday at Feather Lake will be **Sat., August 11**, starting at **8 a.m.** Once again, water conditions will dictate whether we work in the basin or the surrounding uplands. There is plenty to do in both areas. Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave.

The past 2 months have brought multiple sightings of Yellow-billed Cuckoos, an immature Tricolored Heron on 24 July, multiple sightings of White-tailed Kites, and a Gray Catbird on 27 June. Painted Buntings are still conspicuous but will be leaving soon.

August 10, 11 and 12, 2018 Silver City Area

Saturday, September 22, 2018 Reservoirs Down the Valley

We'll be traveling down I-10 East to visit the Reservoirs of McNary, Ft. Hancock and Tornillo. Possible sightings would be Western and Clark's grebes, Eared Grebes, White Pelicans, gulls, egrets, sandpipers and others.

Birding Trip - South Texas

We are happy to announce this trip to one of the birding meccas in the US. The dates are **November 2-6, 2018** (these dates do not include travel days). We will offer 5 days of birding to as many of the best spots in the area as we can get to. Come for all or any of the excursions. The fall migration is wonderful and some of the birds that can be seen are: Plain Chachalaca, Least Grebe, Anhinga, Little Blue Heron, Tricolored Heron, White Ibis, Roseate Spoonbill, Hook-billed Kite, Green Jay, all three kingfishers, White-tailed Kite, Crested Caracara, Aplomado Falcon, American Oystercatcher, Dunlin, terns, gulls and skimmers, Common Pauraque, Great Kiskadee, Tropical Kingbird, "Mangrove" Yellow Warbler and many more.

Some of the areas we might visit are Bentsen State Park, Anzalduas Park, Old Hidalgo Pumphouse, Quinta Mazatlán, Santa Ana National Wildlife Refuge, Valley Nature Center, Frontera Audubon Society, Estero Llano Grande State Park, Harlingen Thicket, Laguna Atascosa National Wildlife Refuge, Resaca de la Palma State Park, South Padre Island, Brownsville Landfill, and Sabal Palm Audubon Center.

Participants will be responsible for their own travel arrangements and hotel reservations. Harlingen will be the headquarters for the trip. Costa Rica Birding Tour

El Paso/Trans-Pecos Audubon is planning a Costa Rica Tour for March 2019. The places we will be going offer some great bird watching. The estimated price will be \$1,817.51 with the field trip guide paying his own way. The optional boat trip offered on Saturday, Mar. 17, will be an additional \$30.00. The trip cost quoted is for land-based tour. Roundtrip airfare to San Jose, Costa Rica, is the responsibility of each participant.

Some of the possible birds to be added to your life list include the following; Spotted Wood-quail, Costa Rican Pygmy-owl, Resplendent Quetzal, Collared Trogon, Buffy Tuftedcheek, Ruddy Treerunner, Ochraceous Pewee, Barred Becard, Zeledonia, Golden-browed Chlorophonia, Volcano Junco, Talamanca Hummingbird, Green Violetear, Gray-tailed Mountain-gem, Volcano Hummingbird, Scintillant Hummingbird, Fiery-throated Hummingbird, Violet Sabrewing, Flame-colored and Slaty flowerpiercer, Lattice-tailed Trogon, Yellow-eared Toucanet, Streak-crowned Antvireo, Tawny-faced Gnatwren, White-throated Shrike-Tanager, Ashy-throated Bush-Tanager, Tawny-crested Tanager, Emerald and Blue-and-gold tanagers, Keel-billed Toucan, Great Green Macaw, White-winged Becard, Sunbittern, Acadian Flycatcher, and Wood Thrush. Rarities seen here on occasion include Rufous-fronted Wood-Quail, Red-fronted Parrotlet, Rufous-vented Ground-Cuckoo, Black-crowned Antpitta, Gray-headed Piprites, and Sharpbill.

Additionally, \$200 of each person's trip price will be donated to the El Paso/Trans-Pecos Audubon Society to help us fund important local bird conservation activities.
