## Exciting Changes for HSF!

Happy November from Hope Springs Farm! It's so hard to believe that summer time is over....it flew by so fast. We are pleased to have Hempfield Behavioral Health as our new agency effective 7/1/13. Since then, a lot has been happening at the farm. We have 14 wonderful staff and 45 hard working growers who have spent the summer working in the garden, learning how to can our produce, making lots of the art projects and caring for the property.

The growers have become more hands on with the daily farm chores, such as mowing and using a rota-tilla to make a cut garden for our herbs; a brand new chicken coop run with the help of a youth group from Chestnut Grove United Methodist Church; custom painting birdhouse gourds for the annual Hope Springs Farm BBQ fundraiser that was held on September 21, 2013; welcoming and

training 14 piglets, building a new permanent pergola in the garden for shade; volunteering at various food banks across Dauphin and Lebanon Counties; baking cookies on a weekly basis for the homeless; and renovating the side pasture run in for the new alpacas that will soon be joining our farm family on 11/18/13.



As we move into winter, we are excited about picking out plants for spring time gardening, as well as continuing to garden and grow fresh produce in our greenhouse. We are also looking forward to new chicks coming in to January, as well as several lambs in the very near future.
