

Junior Mineral Reports

Pyrite by Meridith, age 8

Pyrite is the most common sulfide mineral. It is commonly found in ore deposits along with quartz in metamorphic and sedimentary rocks. Pyrite is found as large crystals or granular lenses and is gold in color, with a shiny surface.

Pyrite may be formed from all types of rock. Pyrite can be easily found in the Crater Lake and Hunters areas of Oregon, and along the middle fork of the Snoqualmie River in Washington.

Turquoise by Sawyer, age 9

Turquoise is a blue-to-green phosphate of copper and aluminum. Turquoise gets its blue color from copper and its green color is associated with iron. It was first brought from the country of Turkey and comes from the Greek word "Turkois."

Turquoise is December's birthstone. It can symbolize prosperity, happiness, success, and good fortune.

Turquoise is formed by a chemical reaction caused by water coming through cracks in rocks that have aluminum and copper in them. Turquoise is my mom's birthstone and is a beautiful color.

Copper by Sage, age 8

Copper is a metal element with the symbol Cu. Copper is usually found in volcanic rocks and in veins. It is soft and ductile and is useful in a number of applications including electrical wiring. It is often found as a copper (ll) salt that has a greenish hue and copper used for industrial purposes often weathers, or oxidizes, into a green color. It was one of the first metals to be used by early man for weapons and implements, one of the first to be cast into forms and one of the first to be used in alloys.

When combined with tin, copper forms a much harder metal called bronze that was useful for making weapons and armor. Cobaltocalcite by Nadine, age 12

Is a pinkish purple calcite! Calcites hardness is a 3 to 3 and a half. The Cobaltocalcite is called Cobaltocalcite because it has Cobalt in it which is what creats that incredible color that the stone has! Cobaltocalcite is Facetable (which means you could cut it to be a peice of jewler but it is hard to facet because it is a exstremely soft stone. The plus side of when you Facet it is that there is so much Calcite to practice on!

Cobaltocalcite is the more populare type of calcite because a lot of people enjoy its rich color and how large they get.

Cobaltocalcite is found throughout the world and normally found in Limestone and Marble. Which is also very common. Another chemical that the Cobaltocalcite has in it is CaCO3 which is also in Aragonite! Calcites comes in all soils of shapes it is commonly found in matrics (with other minerals like copper, quartz, malicite, and other minerals), it also comes in huge blocks of its self, and spiky speicimen peices!

Cobaltocalcite is a truely intresting stone to look at and lean about! Maybe there are other stone like it to learn about.
