


AT FEATHER LAKE

Feather Lake has been dry for 3 months now. Actually, one small puddle remains. It is within the concrete-lined structure at the lake's outlet. Remarkably, that small, shallow wading pool appears to be all Feather Lake's resident beaver needs. The wily rodent has set up shop there and continues to harvest nearby cottonwoods.

Despite the dry conditions, we kept Feather Lake open through the weekend before Christmas, but it has been closed since then. We'll re-open when water returns.

Boy Scout Troop 4 continues to make important contributions at Feather Lake through Eagle Scout service projects. In December, the scouts cleared saltcedar along the inner berm within the basin. In January, they obtained willow and cottonwood poles from Feather Lake and planted them at adjacent Feather Lake II. Thanks, Troop 4!

With or without water, Feather Lake will be open for our next workday on **Sat., April 2**, starting at **2 p.m.** Join us to help with sanctuary maintenance. Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave.



Audubon at RIO BOSQUE WETLANDS PARK




Water deliveries ended January 9, and the park is

WEST TEXAS NOW HAS A WILDLIFE TRAIL MAP!

In 1994, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) published the nation's first wildlife-trail map,

covering the state's Central Gulf Coast. By 2000, maps were also available for the Upper Coast and Lower Coast, completing the Great Texas Coastal Birding Trail. The wildlife-trail



concept proved hugely successful and has been emulated throughout North America. By 2004, a series of 8 trail maps covered all of Texas...with one exception. That exception was Far West Texas.

Now, thanks to a cooperative effort of the Texas Mountain Trail and Texas Pecos Trail regions of the Texas Heritage Trails Program and TPWD, that gap has been filled. Published in December 2010, the Far West Texas Wildlife Trail map features 10 driving loops and 57 individual sites that highlight the unique wildlife of our region. The sites are found from El Paso to the Permian Basin, from the Guadalupe Mountains to the Big Bend.

The new Far West Texas map and the other 8 Great Texas Wildlife Trail maps can be purchased through the <u>Texas AgriLife Exten-</u> <u>sion Bookstore</u>. Individual maps are \$2 each. Or you can purchase the entire set of 9 maps for just \$10. You can view online versions of the maps on the <u>Great Texas</u> <u>Wildlife Trails page</u> of the TPWD website.

Field Trips

Sunday, February 13, 2011 Sod Farms, Sunland Park Area and Upper Valley



The sod farm is known for great winter birds, from Sandhill Cranes to many small birds, such as the uncommon Grasshopper Sparrow and Baird's Sparrow.

We will be looking for birds that spend the cold months in grassland habitat. In the Sunland Park and Upper Valley area we will be looking for overwintering water birds and land birds.

Bird Area, where we will look for shore birds, waterfowl, gulls and raptors. Recent sightings have been scoters, Red-breasted Merganser and Red Phalarope. Also owls have been seen there. Afterward, we will picnic and bird at the Alamogordo Zoo and Park. A stop at Dog Canyon on the way back is possible. Meet at Lowe's parking lot, 4531 Transmountain Road behind Taco Bell at 7:30 a.m. Bring lunch, binoculars, water and a scope if you have one. Beginners and nonmembers are always welcome. Saturday, March 19, 2011 Percha Dam, Caballo Dam & Swan Pond

We will travel to two New Mexico birding hot spots that offer some of the best birding in southern New Mexico anytime of the year. We will be looking for riparian winter birds such as both Eastern and Western bluebirds, Cedar

Waxwings and various raptors.

We will also check out the lake for gulls, grebes and waterfowl. Rare sightings of gulls recently have



been the California and Mew gulls. We will return to El Paso via old Highway 85 for stops at the Arrey Dairy and Swan Pond. Meet at the Shell Station and Dairy Queen at the intersection of Transmountain Rd. and I-10 at 7:30 a.m. We will carpool from there. Bring lunch, water and binoculars.
