Adult Education Opportunities

Starting in August you will notice that there are three options for adult Sunday School on the back of the Footprints insert. I would like to take a poll on what people seem more interested in for an initial class for adults (this will include high schoolers who are

considered adults in our church and confirmation students are recommended to join as well). Our three options are: Understanding the O.L.F., Walking through the Bible, and Enneagram Workshop.

Understanding the Order of Lutheran Franciscans. This class will take us four weeks to complete. It will be a discussion based class that focuses on the Evangelical Counsels and worship practices of the OLF. The Evangelical counsels are: Poverty, Obedience, and Chastity. We will read from the General Rule of the O.L.F. and then discuss what this means to us personally, as a church, in our families, and as a community. We will then have a final class that discusses the importance of worship, prayer, penitence, work, and vocation. I know it seems like a lot to cover in one last class but we will be able to cover them quite painlessly. You will be able to read an introduction and background from Brother Ryan as our guest writer in this Newsletter. My hope is that through this course I will also be able to field any questions or concerns you may be holding onto or harboring about having a new Lutheran Pastor who is taking vows in a Franciscan Order.

Walking through the Bible. This opportunity will be focused around the synods Bible study. We will read and discuss the passages of the day, and potentially the week prior, as we journey through the gospels. This is a wonderful opportunity for us to connect more personally with the stories of Jesus, familiarize ourselves with the bible, as-well-as have an opportunity for discussion and questions with me! Through this conversation we can listen to our fellow members, and Pastor, as to how different parables have impacted our lives and resonate with us in the 21st century.

Enneagram Workshop. Now this one is quite new to many people and you may be sitting there thinking, "What is an Enneagram?" The Enneagram is a nine tier spiritual typing system to aid us in not only our understanding of ourselves, those around us, and our relationship with those around us, but also our spiritual journey and relationship with God. In more simple terms it is a spiritual Myers Briggs. Although it is by no means as simplistic as Myers Briggs, it does help us understand ourselves better. This enneagram Workshop will take us through the book Mirror for the Soul: A Christian Guide to Enneagram by Alice Fryling. This book is a great jumping off point to understand the Enneagram and we will be taking it one chapter a week for a total of 12 weeks. If this becomes something of high interest for our congregation, I not only have more enneagram books that we could do together, but we could look at hosting a workshop with spiritual directors who work with the enneagram and, help not only ministers but lay members, understand the ways that we are called into holy living with God.

I look forward to seeing what the majority interest is and after this class we will revisit and discuss what other options may be of high interest as we go forward!

Order of Lutheran Franciscans

Following the Simple Way of St. Francis

Hello, First Evangelical Lutheran Church! I am Brother Ryan W. Roberts, OLF, the Minister Provincial for the Eastern Province of the Order of Lutheran Franciscans, meaning that I am the primary organizing officer for our order east of the Mississippi River. Pastor Tucker asked me to write to you to share a bit about our order on the eve of his imminent profession of vows in the first week of August. There's much to say, and as Pastor Tucker progresses in his formation, he'll be able to answer more of your questions, but he asked me as his more experienced sibling to help build a common foundation for As Lutherans, we are possessions. The Order of Lutheran Franciscans (OLF) called to be "always reforming", a life is the first religious order in the Evangelical that fits seamlessly Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). We with the Franciscan follow in a much longer tradition, however, charism to "rebuild drawing on the experience of the Order of Ecumenical Franciscans (formed in 1983) and God's church". over a century of Franciscans in the Scandinavian Lutheran churches and the Anglican communion. We also walk in a path trailblazed by the Deaconess Community of the ELCA, a group in our own church committed to a common way of life for well over a century. Franciscans in general have a much longer history, of course, tracing our roots back to Saints Francis and Clare of Assisi in the 13th century in central Italy. While we follow the simple way of these famous saints who lived as part of the Roman Catholic church, we are also deeply grounded in our Lutheran traditions. I summarize the OLF walk this way: I think about God with Lutheran theology, and I experience God with Franciscan spirituality. As Lutherans, we are called to be "always reforming", a life that fits seamlessly with the Franciscan charism to "rebuild God's church".

As part of this rebuilding, we participate in ecumenical coalitions and prophetic organizations. We have representation on the Joint Committee for Franciscan Unity and the Franciscan Federation. We are sponsors of the Franciscan Action Network, a partner with our own ELCA Advocacy offices. We are a Reconciling in Christ community and an endorsing partner of the Poor People's Campaign. We also rebuild the Church by living as a fully equal family of siblings. We are an undifferentiated order composed of siblings of any gender, any ministry and occupation



(religious or secular), all of whom can serve our siblings in any role of leadership.

Pastor Tucker has been invited to profess vows as a novice at our annual gathering this year, known as a chapter. The vows we profess are ancient and known collectively as the Evangelical Counsels: obedience. chastity, and poverty. While it takes a lifetime to fully encounter these vows, they can be expressed in (imperfect) brief thoughts. Poverty is a life of simplicity

be joyfully formed by the wisdom of others. Chastity is the commitment to love all, without distinction, according to the form of relationship with each. This last one, of course, gives many hearers pause, because they are most familiar with "chastity" meaning "abstinence", and while that does

> fall under the umbrella of chastity, it is an expansive concept of love that others live out faithfully with partners and even children. This year, Pastor Tucker will be professing his initial novice vows, ones that he will be invited to renew annually for at least five years during his novitiate formation.

The OLF isn't just for those who take vows, though. In calling soon-to-be-Brother Tucker as your Minister of Word and Sacrament, you are now in relationship with the order. That could be a simple fact of your life, or one that inspires further curiosity. You could have conversation with your pastor, visit our website (lutheranfranciscans.org), or even become a Friend of the Order. When it becomes available, you could stay at our brand new motherhouse in Houston, St. Francis of the City, and spend a week serving the multicultural community gathered in its neighborhoods. I invite you deeper into relationship with lesus through the window that has been opened in your congregation. May you be blessed by this new strand of connection, just as we are blessed by your presence in this church always under construction.

Been reading enthusiastically this past month. First off, for the HBG reading group, the four of us tackled This Isn't Going to End Well by Daniel Wallace, who writes an account of his brother-in-law who was Wallace's boyhood hero. Trying to understand the man's later life, Wallace reads his hero's journals and learns more than he ever should have known. The controversy in the club's discussion centered around his right to publish parts of those journals. Wallace had promised the hero's wife that he would destroy them, then promptly snuck them out and read them before he destroyed them. One Club member stated "I am burning my journals!"

I read An Island Out of Time by Tom Horton, a nonfiction book suggested by the church book club's reading of the novel The Invisible Husband of Frick Island by Colleen Oakley. The Frick Island has no available technology aside from one phone. The same was true of the Smith Island that exists in Chesapeake. An Island... written in 2008 covers the church, the food, the kinds of people, the traditions, and ancestors of the real space. quoted from it on "Blue Bloods") The author follows a journalism assignment after the man she loved died of a terminal illness. She learns to shepherd, explores the land the wide-open spaces. Her conclusion, which truly oversimplifies, is "true solace is finding none; it is to say, it is everywhere."

Then, for some unknown reason at

this time, I have begun reading accounts of some who have hiked the big trails. The Trail by Ethan Gallogly chronicles the hike of a young man and his dead father's hiking buddy. They hike the John Muir Trail in California, a length of 211 miles with an elevation change of 47,000 feet. The trail, which honors John Muir, an early naturalist and conservationist, covers the Sierra Nevada Mountain range, passing through Yosemite, Kings Canyon and Sequoia National Parks. The journey includes some very wise observations on life.

And then there is The Last Hike by Lee Lovelace, all about the trail I dreamed of hiking, and that is the Appalachian Trail. A mammoth undertaking is hiking the 2190+ miles. About one in four of those who start actually complete the trail. The southern terminus is at Springer Mountain, Georgia; the northern terminus at Mount Katahdin, Maine. The hardest climb of the AT is Katahdin for it is the greatest sustained ascent on the AT with steep boulders and ledges above tree line. If you have a chance, check out websites. Even the pictures are breathtaking.

Paul and I used to hike many trails. Our honeymoon included day hiking through the White Mountains in Vermont and the Adirondacks in New York. (My limit was usually 12 miles a day.) And then one vacation centered in Virginia in and around the Damascus/ Abingdon area. We day hiked several times on the AT. It was a dream come true. Why don't we hike so much anymore?...let's just say 8 grandchildren are a lot of fun,





