We have finished up the Psalms for the year, **BUT** you could begin Isaiah on June 1st or whenever you get this newsletter....catching up a few days shouldn't be too hard. We'll be listening to God's voice through Isaiah (you know, like the Creed says..."He has spoken through the Prophets" not just to Israel, but to US!) into the beginning of August. Some of the most beautiful and uplifting passages of the Bible are right there in Isaiah! Where do you think so much of Handel's *Messiah* was inspired?! And you are only reading one chapter a day, what a way to start your morning or end your evening!

Think of what God says through Isaiah's powerful poetry and how it speaks to us today in families, churches, governments... **EVERYWHERE!!** If you say, "I read it during catechism...or in college, or tried it once...too boring." Try another version (The Good News, The Message); our church library has LOTS of different Bibles. God may speak to you in a different way at this time in your life. The "secret" ingredients of good stewardship



APPLE DUMPLING BAKE

Ingredients:

2 medium Granny Smith apples2 tubes (8 oz. each) refrigeratedcrescent rolls

1 cup sugar

1/3 cup butter, softened

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

3/4 cup **Mountain Dew** soda Vanilla ice cream

Directions:

- 1. Preheat over to 350°. Peel, core, and cut each apple into 8 wedges. Unroll both tubes of crescent dough; separate each into 8 triangles. Wrap a triangle around each wedge. Place in a greased 13 X 9-inch baking dish.
- 2. In a bowl, mix sugar, butter and cinnamon until blended; sprinkle over dumplings. Slowly pour soda around the rolls (do not stir).
- 3. Bake, uncovered, until golden brown and apples are tender, 35-40 minutes. Serve warm with ice cream.

Theological Education

There is a legend that when the medieval Gauls were baptized by Christian missionaries in a river or stream, they would hold one arm high in the air as the missionary dunked them under the water. Well, here we are into summer, unofficially. Now my days are filled not only with the usual daily activities...dishes, laundry, dusting, sweeping, planning and fixing meals, etc. Now add mowing, weeding, trimming, and Paul repairing the mower! Aah! The joys of the change of the seasons. The scent of the lilacs, though, wafting through the open windows of our home is delightful. What I do miss however, now that I am home from Florida, is the time I don't have for reading.

However, before I write about books, I want to warn those of you with the newer cars. The side mirrors that light up when a car is in your blind spot can be a little scary if you rely on them completely. Some MOTORCYCLES AND MOTORBIKES DO NOT REGISTER. Just be careful.

Now to the books. One book I finished for my HBG (<u>H</u>urley <u>B</u>urley <u>G</u>irlies...a reference to a line from <u>Macbeth</u>) book club, a group that connects Toledo, Defiance, and Findlay. One member suggested we read <u>The Power of the Dog</u> by Thomas Savage, originally poorly-received when first published in 1967; yet, for some reason, the book was revived in 2001 and became quite popular. The narrative is loosely based on the life of Thomas Savage and takes its title from Psalm 22 "Deliver my soul from the sword; my darling from the power of the dog."

Two brothers work side by side on their family farm in 1925 Montana. George makes a very bold move when "out of the blue" he marries a woman from town. Phil thinks Rose is a gold digger and begins a relentless campaign to destroy his brother's new wife, just as George is destroying their working relationship. I am not yet certain about "the power of the dog" and what this novel is all about. I will know more after the next gathering of members. I also need more time to think. I will keep you posted.

The other book I am working on is <u>The House on Mango Street</u> by Sandra Cisneros, the selection for June's church book club discussion and originally published in 1984. Each chapter, while loosely connected to the chapter before and after, is really set up as a vignette. Cisneros describes <u>House</u> as a "jar of buttons," story fragments; the reader doesn't need to know what came before or after. She also feels that "the last sentence of each vignette must ring like the final notes at the end of a mariachi song." Cisneros was an automatic choice when schools in the late eighties were attempting to add more multi-cultural selections to the literature classes. I look forward to reading it again.

I just finished book number 7 of Louise Penny's Chief Inspector Gamache novels. The number of murders in tiny Canadian Three Pines would make most people move! Finally, number 8 moves out of Three Pines. People can sleep better now in Canada. J

I have also just started <u>Faith and You</u> by Terry Pluto, 28 essays on faith in everyday life. More later.


