

### Why did you apply to be a **Chapel Scholar?**

One of my favorite places to study is the Chapel basement where the Duke Lutherans office is. I was spending a lot of time in the Chapel already, but wanted to get more involved in Chapel life. I care a lot about my faith, so after

a friend recommended the program, I decided to apply.

### What kinds of activities can Chapel Scholars take part in?

There are community-building events (like the Chapel lock-in or Chapel climb) and spring break trips we can go on, and opportunities to meet with Dean Powery. He's a really cool guy.

### What have you learned about your faith through being a Chapel Scholar thus far?

When I came to Duke, I saw my faith and my classes as two separate entities. But Chapel Scholars helps us think about what it means to bridge faith and learning. It's helped me learn that faith is not just an accessory, something I just do on Sundays. Faith is part of everything I do (or at least that's the hope). # **Donating Life Insurance to the Church**

### **ARTICLE #2: Life Insurance**

When we think of making contributions to the church, we seldom think about donating a life insurance policy. Let's look into it. This can be a great way to make a contribution.

When you were younger, you bought insurance so your family wouldn't struggle if you could no longer provide for them. Older now, and blessed with a secure financial situation, the death benefit your life insurance provides may not hold the same importance as it did years ago. If this is so, consider using the policy to make a gift towards something you're passionate about. If you enjoy giving and it's an important part of who you are, donating an insurance policy to the church allows for a sizable donation.

There are two ways to donate a life insurance policy to the church.

# 1. Make the church the owner and beneficiary of the policy:

By making the church the owner and beneficiary, you get a tax deduction (your insurance company can tell you the amount. It will be very near the cash value of the policy, but for tax purposes, can't be more than 50% of your Adjusted Gross Income). The church then has the option of surrendering the policy and taking the cash value or continuing to pay the premiums (if premiums are owed) and using the proceeds from the death benefit.

### 2. Make the church a beneficiary of the policy:

If you don't want to give away ownership of your policy, you can make the church beneficiary of your policy. You do this if you think circumstances could change and you might need the cash value or death benefit in the future. You still own the policy, but you don't get a tax deduction while you're alive.

When you decide to leave a gift through insurance, ask your agent for a "Change of Ownership and Beneficiary" form. Your agent can guide you with this. If an agent isn't available to help, let our church staff know you want to make a gift of an insurance policy and we will arrange to meet with you. Thank you!

St. Paul's Lutheran Church would like to thank individuals and families who have notified the congregation that the ministry of this church has been included in their estate plans. Gifts through a person's estate are a great lasting testimony to the importance that the church and service to God has held in their lives.

St. Paul's respects requests for anonymity, but since gift amounts are not being made public, we are hopeful that publishing a list of names will be seen as a statement of faith and will encourage others. 
