#### **New Elective Tracks Introduced at ACS**

Beginning this school year, the high school students at Arthur Christian School were given the opportunity to participate in new elective tracks. The purpose of the tracks are to be more intentional about teaching students leadership skills by giving opportunities for hands-on, project-based learning where they can put these skills into practice to benefit both the students and the school. The students were able to choose between five tracks and had to interview for the tracks at the end of last year.

The Agriculture Track, taught by Mrs. Walker, focuses on Ag and other related fields. The goal of this track is learning how to do your best and how to do it all for God. Currently, this track is working on leadership development in Ag and preparing for a competition in land use. Students in the Ag tracks are also learning about shop safety rules and other things such as trades, building, and welding. Recently, ACS was gifted tools and equipment for this track,

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which they will be using for various welding and building projects.

Mrs. Walker didn't grow up in Agriculture, but learned about it and started to love it when she wanted to travel to test different kinds of foods around the country. Mrs. Walker shared how Ag is the leading employer in the state of Illinois, and how she wants her students to know where their food comes from. Mrs. Walker is excited about the future of this track!

Our third track, Worship and Ministry, is taught by both Mr. Dundee and Mrs. Reed. Both leaders have been in ministry positions

which they use to help teach students in preparation for various ministry opportunities. They are excited for what their students will accomplish this year by teaching them how to run and coordinate

#### FFA at ACS

As you may already know we have a small but growing FFA chapter. Over the past couple of years the Arthur Christian FFA chapter has tried out Multiple CDE ( Career development events) competitions, and several conferences. This upcoming month the Ag elective class will all be attending the 2024-2025 National FFA convention.



The convention is composed of several Keynote speakers including Temple Grandin, and retiring dresses from the past years national officers. There is also a large expo hall with several college and company booths. Several leadership workshops are available throughout convention weekend, as well as community service opportunities. Every night there is a FFA event, including a rodeo, concert with Megan Moroney, and a hypnotist event. We will be attending the Rodeo. We ask that you keep us in your prayers as we travel and spend the weekend in Springfield October 23-26th.

This coming year every student in the Ag elective class is required to compete in one CDE, but are encouraged to attend them all. CDE's are competitions based on certain work forces. Some that we will be attending are: Landews, Dairy foods, Agronomy, Ag mechanics, Horticulture, and livestock judging.

All students are also required to maintain a SAE ( supervised agriculture experiment ), this is a record keeping of things from science projects, paying jobs, and community service. They also don't have to be AG related. Some past proficiency winners projects included a bakery business and working at a SubWay. Throughout the year we will be highlighting several of our FFA members SAE's, including details of their project and how they continue to progress their project.

Now, because this is the first issue of the Conquering Writers, and this is the first AG article, it only seems appropriate for you to meet the AG teacher.

"Hi! I am Courtney Walker, This is my third year at Arthur Christian, and I am a JH/HS teacher, and the FFA advisor."

Q: How did you get into AG?
A: "I love to write, and I wanted to be a journalist. But journalism is a pretty broad field, and I wanted a niche, so I decided to be a food journalist. I wanted to travel the world and write reviews for fancy restaurants, that sort of thing. As a part of my major in agricultural journalism, I had to take many agriculture classes and I became especially interested in food supply issues. For the first time, I was really considering where food came from, and realizing that

many people in the world don't have the same steady access to food that I have enjoyed my entire life. Here was this whole industry responsible for every meal on my table that I hadn't thought twice about! It fascinated me, and I became more and more interested in understanding and supporting farmers and their families.

My first job after college was in agricultural

sales. I was tasked with proposing solutions to farmers depending on their needs. I quickly realized that my favorite part of the job was not trying to sell products, but learning from farmers and in turn, teaching them about different options and technologies. This realization opened the door for me to go to graduate school to earn my masters in agricultural education. Now, I have a career that marries my two professional interests: education and agriculture."

Q: What is your favorite part about working at ACS?

A: "The most important thing is Jesus. By working at ACS, I get to do what I love *for* who I love most. Before I worked at ACS, I felt like I had to be a little "sneaky" about my allegiance to Christ because I worked in a government school. I love that Jesus is front-and-center at ACS. I can boldly point to Him in all that I do."

Q: What's your favorite thing about FFA? A: "I love that FFA gives students opportunities to try out different hands-on tasks associated with different career paths. The FFA motto pretty much sums up what I believe about education: "Learning to Do. Doing to Learn. Earning to Live. Living to Serve."

Q: How do you hope to see our AG program expand?

A: "I hope more students from non-traditional farm backgrounds will give the ag program a try. I didn't grow up on a farm, and yet I've found a love for the industry that feeds the world. Ag is for everyone - whether you're going to go into an ag career, or if your connection to ag will simply be in the consumer role. Ag will impact your life, so it's important to know a little about it!"

"Agriculture is the number one employer in the state of Illinois! 25% of all jobs in the state are connected to the ag industry. And that statistic includes major city areas, so the percentage is even higher if you consider only our local economy. When thinking about what you'd like to be when you "grow up," it's important to know what jobs are available where you want to be. "
