DO


Organise a meeting of your parish pastoral council and reflect on how your faith community responds to the needs of people on the margins of society.

REFLECT

A s a priest working in a parish, it's lovely to see the various components of parish life coming together week after week. To witness people working together in prayer groups or team ministry must be the greatest goal of the Church. To bring about God's Kingdom here on earth or here in the community!! A recent funeral of someone opened my eyes to some of the unseen charitable work people do in their lives. A lady whom I met in a nursing home once a week for the past year died and I attended her funeral, which took place in a different parish. As I sat there on the sanctuary listening to the Eulogy and Homily, I came to learn very quickly that the lovely, quiet, gentle lady I had been saying hello to and attending mass with was in fact a nurse with vast experience of working in Calcutta, India, and then after her long career, returned to Ireland to work voluntarily in a cancer hospice, where she cared for the sick and the dying. I always knew when I met her that she was a person of faith, a person filled with love for others. But it wasn't until her funeral mass that I learnt of a life rich in beauty. The greatest commandment of loving God and loving our neighbour is the gateway to God's Kingdom. For some people in our communities, they do so with great ease and with a gentle spirit.
