Proposed group to provide safe, caring space for youth

For people today, especially youth, it's extremely difficult to find a place where you feel like you belong. Even more difficult is finding a place where you're supported, accepted, cherished, loved and where no matter what happens a group of people have your back. That is the struggle that far too many adolescents face in today's world.

I, like many others, have faced this struggle. It's hard to find a place or a group that make you feel like you can be completely comfortable and open about who you are and what you've been through. But hopefully, soon, we can change that. At least for some.

After facing this past year head on and accepting all the metaphorical "bricks" that have been thrown at me, I've experienced what it feels like to feel alone. I know all about the struggle to find a place where you can find true friends and support and so, through this and the struggle, I thought the best thing I could do would be to help others through what I have learned.

Coincidentally, Russell and I began talking throughout the summer about ways to improve youth ministry in church and one of the first things I remember saying was about the misconception that too many teenagers have about what church is. Church isn't just a Sunday service or worshiping a God that you cannot touch or see. Church is about having a community of people that will be there when it feels like nobody else is. It was around this time that the two of us decided that a youth program, to show people exactly that, was the best thing that we could do as a church.

The plan that we have is very different and nothing at all as spiritually based as many other youth groups are. We are planning to give teenagers and children all around our community a group of people, of friends, that will be by their side when it feels like nobody else is. We won't force them to come to services, we won't push them to join our church, we'll simply show them what church is really supposed to feel like; a second family. We'll go out for ice cream or go bowling, have movie nights and potlucks and talk about our days at school or our plans for the weekend. We'll share our stories and express our thoughts, we'll become close friends and have each other's backs. We'll

become a support group of our very own. A group of people who will stick together, who will be happy together, and who will live our good and bad times together. We will love each other, grow together, support each other and lean on each other. More than anything, we'll be a community bound together by one thing; acceptance.

Because really, that's what church is all about.

Do We Dare?!

I have had an August full of experiences with Skylight Festival and the General Council meeting. I am ready to embark on another season and year of ministry with all the folk here at Eastside. As we enter into this season, it is a time of discerning. Of discerning how we spend our time; of where God is calling us; of what God is calling us to do; of how we church in our time. The theme at General Council was "Behold, I make All things New" and an underlying theme became "Do We Dare" from a song that was written for Council that we sang throughout the week. Do we dare embrace God's new thing that is being created? Can we be open to new ways of offering ministry in our community? Can we commit to supporting the church worship Sunday mornings? Can we support this church to continue to offer ministry in this place, and explore new ideas or programs? Can we all do this together? Can we go forward into the unknown like the Israelites, because now is the time? These are the guestions we are being called to explore as we seek to be church and offer spiritual nurture to all who are seeking it.

This fall, we will seek to offer that spiritual nurture in a variety of ways, familiar and creative:

- We will continue to offer vibrant worship, including the worship band on the third Sunday of each month.
- We will continue to offer a Sunday School program for our young folk and a larger critical mass of children to enjoy it would be wonderful. I am excited that Amanda Tessier is able to continue coordinating and for the infectious enthusiasm of Taylor Balfour and Stephannie Banks who will be teaching. We will be using a new Interfaith curriculum, I discovered at the interfaith conference I went to.
- where will continue to offer programs and studies for adults and all ages, exploring what will be of interest to our community and those outside of our community. Check out the variety of options in our program sign-ups which are available on our website and will be a shorter paper copy available on our Kick-off Sunday September 20. The response to this will determine what is

- offered. We will have an opportunity to invite friends and family to experience our Worshiping community on Come To Church Sunday, September 27th.
- We will be open to the Spirit and new ideas that may be presented to us.
- We will work with our partners here at the Living Spirit Centre to offer shared worship services (outside of Sunday morning) and programs that will nurture us all.

I am also embarking on a new journey that I want to share with you. I have been presented with an opportunity to take a **Deep Coaching Certification** training program which will deepen my work and experience with the Enneagram (a personality typing system). It is a step toward my qualification to offer spiritual direction. I have the support of the Ministry and Personnel Committee in this venture, which will be a weekly online course, and 2 retreats, one at the end of September and one in early March. These weeks will count as part of my continuing education time, but I will be responsible for the costs. While this is related to my ministry, the course work will be on my own personal time.

It is my hope that you will consider what you can engage in to support the ministry and programs offered here for you and your family. I recognize we lead busy lives and are involved in many things. As we move through this time, may you dare to consider what role the church and your faith has in your life. I leave you with these words from the song from General Council, which you will be hearing throughout the season:

Do we dare try God's new thing?
As for me my house,
we'll serve the Lord
Let the soles of our feet
touch the rivers we ford.
Baptism blessings
for our new beginnings
Yes me and my house
we dare to serve the Lord.

Ministry and Personnel Committee plays critical role at Eastside

This committee supports the minister and communications coordinator, and acts as a liaison with the congregation.

We meet with staff members in the fall to establish goals for the coming year and to discuss continuing education plans. In the spring, we meet again to look back at the church year and conduct performance reviews. This past spring we also asked for input from the congregation to provide Russell with additional feedback for his review.

The Ministry and Personnel Committee does not actually make decisions; rather, its role is consultative and supportive. The committee looks into matters and then makes recommendations to the staff member or other church committee, such as the leadership team.

Did you know that Russell is entitled to, and is encouraged to take advantage of, 21 days of study time, including three Sundays, each year? These are often conferences within the United Church, or wider church. Even though Russell is away from Eastside at these times, they should be seen as events that benefit both Russell and the congregation. Our minister benefits from the opportunity to learn new things, re-energize, and confer with colleagues. The congregation benefits by the incorporation of these new ideas in sermons and plans for Eastside.

Russell is presented with more continuing educational experiences each year than he can possibly attend, and the M&P Committee helps him to choose which ones would be most beneficial to our congregation, and which times and costs are the most feasible.

Another way in which the M&P Committee supports the staff is with time management. Committee meetings, phone calls, extracurricular commitments and regular church business often extend far beyond a 40 hour week. Our committee can help by working with staff to find a better balance, and by adjusting the job description if necessary.

The Ministry and Personnel Committee also has the important role of receiving any concerns or complaints from the congregation regarding the minister or other staff. A letter of complaint would be dealt with, in confidence, by the committee. We would attempt conflict resolution, but use mediation, or ask for help from Presbytery pastoral relations to solve more serious issues. Concerns or complaints should be made in writing and addressed to the Ministry and Personnel Committee.

In conclusion, the M&P Committee has an important role in supporting the staff and enhancing communication with the congregation. We would be delighted to welcome new members to the committee, so if this is an area of interest to you, please email <u>Cathie</u> or <u>Peter</u>.



First Skylight Festival a Success

Skylight Festival of Arts, Faith and Justice gathered over 175 participants (230 people counting contributors and volunteers) July 31-August 2 for a weekend of exploring spirituality and faith in a variety of ways. There were diverse speakers, workshops and artists. A tent-city emerged as people arrived, and while there was some wild weather around us, the sun shone for us all weekend (there was a five-minute downpour on Saturday!). We were there during the Blue Moon, and one native speaker commented on this when she arrived, and that she was feeling a new consciousness emerging. People experienced opportunities to learn about First Nations issues ("How does a nation of stealers inherit the earth?" Adrian Jacobs); Emerging Church and the Inventive Age; Moving out of fundamentalism; poetry writing; Climate Justice; Activism and Solidarity; Film talks; Faith formation with all ages; and four musicians performing each night. The closing worship was a real celebration of God's inclusive love and joy complete with balloons, a powerful message, including a rap, prayer stations and a knotty prayer, which made it engaging for all ages.

A few comments from participants says it all:

"Arrived in a completely different space than I left. My time there was heart opening, generative, and transformative. I felt the feeling of the Skylight (in the sense in which it was treated in the poem) beginning Saturday night. I was in tears of heart opening, walls coming down energy before and through the Sunday service."

"The experience of people finding common ground, between different denominations, church/non-church, it was exciting to see the many ways people live their faith/beliefs."

As a member of the organizing team, we sat having supper after it was all over and cleaned up, knowing that we had planned this in just 5 months and said to one another, how did that go so well?! We had a real sense that we have started something larger than ourselves and the Spirit was actively a part of it. I hope you will consider joining us in Paris ON next year, July 29-August 1 for the next annual Skylight Festival! In the meantime, keep an eye on the website http://www.skylightfestival.ca/.

Following a request for volunteers, a number of individuals graciously put their names forward. A discussion via email resulted in agreed upon first steps, as well as possibilities for a labyrinth structure that will require less maintenance in the long run.

Labyrinth volunteers got to work right away, digging out stumps, applying herbicide and exploring alternatives to the current structure that would not require constant weeding.

While the labyrinth is now much more presentable, the need remains to plan and construct a low maintenance structure. This first breakfast of the fall program season will invite LSC women to *bring a photo or object that represents a place they experienced God this past summer.*




