Vote Fails to Rescind County Legislative District Resolution

Following an executive session recommended by Weston County Attorney Michael Stulken at the Weston County Commissioners meeting in Upton Tuesday morning, September 17th, Commissioner Vera Huber told those in attendance that the County Attorney had brought up some issues concerning the County's ongoing pursuit of

This discussion, which has been widely reported in the Weston County Gazette over the years, is hinged on the question of whether or not the State of Wyoming is following its own Constitution by not having each senatorial and representative district in the State be comprised by county lines, which would mean Weston County and every

other Wyoming county would need its own State Senator and State Representative, instead of sharing a legislator with neighboring counties following redistricting endeavors by the State. The legislative districts based on Wyoming county lines were changed in 1992, when Wyoming counties were asked by the State Legislature to pass resolutions in support of
