Smoke Rise Prominent in Georgia Films

FODAC's Run Walk 'n' Roll is a five mile race (two mile walk) through Stone Mountain Park, starting and ending in front of Confederate Hall. The family-

Tucker City Council Wrap-Up

Tucker's City Council held the first of two scheduled March meetings on Monday night, March 12, hearing staff presentations on two major issues.

The first presentation, given by City Engineer Ken Hildebrandt, provided a review

of proposed paving areas to be funded by Tucker's SPLOST allocation. Questioning from Council surrounded how the pavement conditions of roads would be scored, as well as how subdivision roads would be

grouped for repaving. Specific decisions on those items could be made at the March 26 Council meeting.



Parks and Recreation Director Rip Robertson then led a discussion on how Council wants to approach an official policy for Parks and Recreation. Council asked questions involving room rentals at Tucker Recreation Center and got an update on how things have changed at the Rec Center since the City assumed responsibility at the start of 2018.

Council then heard a report from City Manager Tami Hanlin on an intergovernmental agreement (IGA) with DeKalb County on parks. The IGA ensures:

- Tucker will have the same rights that the County did as property owners
- DeKalb County will prorate 0.4 mils to Tucker to help fund Tucker's parks
- There will be a separate agreement with the County on storm water management

Council voted 6-0 to give the Mayor the authority to approve the agreement with the County. DeKalb's Board of Commissioners is expected to take up the IGA at their meeting on Tuesday.

One agenda item, which seeks to approve amendments to zoning districts in the City Zoning Ordinance, was deferred by a 6-0 vote.

The City Council will meet next on March 26. That meeting begins at 7 p.m. at the City Hall Annex (4228 First Avenue).



Your council representatives, Bill Rosenfeld and Pat Soltys hosted an information and organization meeting for our parks at Smoke Rise Country Club. About 20 residents attended. Carlton "Rip" Robertson, City of Tucker Director of Parks and Recreation gave a brief update on the acquisition of the parks from DeKalb County which began with the purchase of the Rec Center on January 1, 2018

and will continue through the second quarter. City Council approved three bids for maintenance of park land and facilities on March 12.

Beth Ganga spoke about the structure of the Friends of the Parks groups. There are individual groups for all but the three parks in Smoke Rise. Those are currently under Friends of Smoke Rise Parks. All Tucker parks are under the umbrella group, Friends of Tucker Parks (http://tuckerparks.org). The umbrella allows all parks the benefit of 501C3 status as well as a bank account with sub accounts for each group, park and project. Donations can be targeted rather than general by information put in the memo line of the check. Beth serves as treasurer.

Joe Scarpaci, president, extended an invitation to all to attend the Friends of Tucker Parks meetings. There are many other benefits from the Friends of Tucker Parks including equipment, event information, fund raising and expertise. Tucker is currently working on renewing a contract with Parks Pride which offers tools, services, expertise, corporate giving and grants for parks groups. Honey Van De Kreke attended the meeting and gave her perspective and information from her role on the Parks Bond Advisory Committee.

The spirit in the room was wonderful with ideas mainly focused on developing the largest park known as the Lord property with picnic tables, a walking path that would be senior friendly and a playground. Georgia Lord spoke about her commitment to the memory of her parents who had owned the land. We had people stepping up to volunteer, donate and a corporate representative bringing substantial resources. We will initiate an email distro list to keep anyone interested informed. If you want to be on the list or volunteer - please send your email address to psoltys@tuckerga.gov. We still have a lot of work to do and volunteers will be needed in many capacities. We need to make sure that the leadership and communications are in place as well as a website. We are off to a great start, let's keep the momentum going.

As the City of Tucker has formed and continues to move rapidly along, the TCA has become even more important as its partner. President Espy has often said, "Tucker is the best location to live, work, and play in all of Atlanta. Reflecting on Passover and the Last Supper

The eight-day festival of Passover (Pesach in Hebrew) is celebrated in the early spring, from the 15th through the 22nd of the Hebrew month of Nissan, March 30-April 7, 2018. It commemorates the emancipation of the Israelites from slavery in ancient Egypt. It is observed by avoiding leaven (the substance that makes bread rise), and highlighted by the Seder meals that include four cups of wine, eating matzah and bitter herbs, and retelling the story of the Exodus from bondage in Egypt.

Pesach means "to pass over" honoring God passing over the Jewish homes when killing the Egyptian firstborn on the very first Passover eve. We all remember the movie "The Ten Commandments" and watched Charlton Hesston put the blood of the lamb on the doorposts and the lintel indicating those inside were part of this new covenant.

For those of you who are Christians you of course know that the Last Supper was a Passover meal and Jesus redefined the elements in the meal revealing his role in the lives of his followers. The parallels are stunning and deepen the faith of all who take the time to consider them in their daily lives today.

The one I would like to emphasize is the role of leaven which to the Jews symbolized a break from a captive people to one on a journey to their promised land. They had no time to use the sourdough method of making bread. Instead, they started with a new lump of dough each time they made bread.

Jesus took that bread and redefined it as a symbol of life following him. It is interesting to note that this completely baffled his disciples at the time. They did not understand the journey they were about to undertake and as Jesus described it, the only thing they wanted to do was to argue about whether it was such a good idea.

As we each go through this month of new birth all around us with spring flowers and balmy weather, it wouldn't be a bad idea to reflect on the promises both faiths provide on this journey. Neither faith promised the journey would be easy. Both faiths promised you would not be alone in it ... and we are not ... if we take the time and quietly consider that we are not alone.

Don't be a "Fool" This Tax Season

"... Nothing can be said to be certain, except death and taxes."

--Benjamin Franklin, a Founding Father of the United States of America

Tax season is in full swing once again. All tax returns are due this year by April 17. (April 15 falls on a Sunday, and April 16 is Emancipation Day). Although we should be

mindful of potential scams all year long, it's important to be especially vigilant this time of the year. You might be surprised about the ingenious (and not so ingenious) ways thieves try to get your hard-earned income. From promises of a faster or bigger refund to threats of arrest or prosecution, the government estimates thousands of people will lose millions of dollars and their personal information to tax scams. Beware of unusual communications through your regular mail, telephone, fax and especially email.



Many scams involve erroneous or larger-than-expected refunds. If you receive any tax refund that you are not expecting, or before you've even filed your returns, contact your tax preparer immediately – or the IRS Identity Protection Specialized Unit at (800) 908-4490. You can also find more information online at irs.gov/identitytheft.

The best ways to minimize your risk of tax identity theft are:

- Send in your tax returns as early as possible before thieves try to beat you to it
- Do not share personal or financial information with anyone unless you know who is asking and why
- Shred personal and financial documents before recycling or throwing away
- Make sure you have confidence in your tax preparer do your homework before hiring
- Check the status of your refund after filling irs.gov/refunds

The IRS does NOT initiate contact with taxpayers by email to request personal or financial information. This includes any type of electronic communication, such as text messages and social media channels. Be very careful of any online communication you receive that looks like it's coming from the IRS. Criminals are getting more sophisticated at creating fake internet sites that look like the real deal. And, if you click on attachments or links within an unsolicited email claiming to come from the IRS, you might be at risk of downloading a malicious computer virus onto your computer – or giving away sensitive information to the wrong person.

The IRS does NOT call taxpayers with threats of lawsuits or arrests. Be mindful that criminals can easily alter their caller ID to make it look like they are calling from the IRS. Do not rely on caller ID to verify the location of where the call originated. The IRS will not contact you to demand a tax payment through a specific method such as a pre-loaded debit card or wire transfer. Finally, be very suspicious if someone contacts you claiming to be from the IRS and needs to know private information that's "missing" from your tax return. If it's really the IRS, they'll already know your personal information!

If you do receive a suspicious communication, you can reach the IRS directly at (800) 829-1040. You'll also find the IRS online at irs.gov.



Incorporate a shallow bird bath in a location with some shade and a nearby tree or shrub for preening. Add a few stones to the bath to provide smaller birds a choice of water depth and secure footing. Birds appreciate clean water for both hydration and a refreshing dip. Keep your bird bath clear of debris and change the water frequently to deter algae growth.

Plan your plantings to leave seeds in the garden during the chilly months of autumn. That's another good reason to encourage black-eyed Susan and coneflowers. To increase the number and diversity of birds in your surroundings, vary the type of feeders and seeds you provide. Platform feeders with a scattering of black oil sunflower seeds give cardinals and doves secure footing; a tube feeder with perches caters to the smaller birds who search out a mix of seeds.

With food and water in place, the finishing touch to make your yard a wing haven is housing. While some birds insist on making their nests in the branches, most backyard birds will move into a clean, ventilated bird house. Choose houses with a hinged door to make clearing last year's nest easier. Remove perches (they give predators access to the interior) and reinforce entries to discourage squirrels from nibbling around the edges.

Ms. Karr encouraged members to place bird feeders, baths and houses near where they spend their time. In return for providing bird essentials, we can enjoy the sight and sound of the original "twitter feed."

HODGE PODGE

I'm actually working on the column early because today is (was) the day that the water main broke on Buford Highway. That seems like a good distance from us, but I, alas, have almost no water and so cannot even brush my teeth without boiling water. It goes without saying that I'm not going to get a shower this morning so I opted to skip bowling and write instead. My team bowlers will understand that I would give a whole new meaning to stinky bowler. And I am finding out as well that I am worthless when anything breaks or quits or malfunctions. I mean, I boil water all the time to cook...why is it so daunting to boil water for brushing teeth? I do not know, but I am daunted and grumbly, pitiful and slightly distraught. So recipes are going to be fairly easy and I'm sure you have water by now and just think I'm a whiny baby. You ought to hear me when the electricity goes out!

Ok, first recipe is really a good accompaniment for soup or salad. I found the recipe in a magazine someplace or the Sunday supplement. No telling, but it's cute and not too much trouble to make. Freeze cooked rugelach (crescent cookies) and just reheat.

Savory Rugelach

2 sticks butter, softened 8 ounces cream cheese 2 Tablespoons sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt 2 cups plain flour Prepared pesto Parmesan cheese 1 beaten egg

Coarse sea salt, dried Italian herbs, pepper

In food processor, beat the butter and cream cheese until it's smooth. Add sugar, salt and flour. Whirl it around by pulsing off and on until it comes together in a ball. Pat it out on waxed paper and divide into four sections. Wrap them and put in freezer for about 20 minutes or refrigerate about an hour. When you're ready, preheat oven to 375° and lightly spray cookie sheets or line with parchment paper.

Roll out one portion into a 10-12-inch circle on lightly floured surface. Spread about 1 1/2 tablespoons pesto in thin layer, but leave about 1/2 inch border around outside edge. Sprinkle with 1-2 tablespoons parmesan and press slightly into the dough. Cut into 8 portions and roll from outside in to create crescents. These are fairly large. Brush with a bit of beaten egg and sprinkle with a little salt, pepper and herbs. Repeat with another portion and bake for 20-30 minutes until browned on bottom and golden. The original recipe said 16-18 minutes, but my insulated cookie sheets took almost 30 minutes. Depending on your type of sheet, start to watch at 15 minutes. These are great warm. I froze half the dough to use later. Thaw until cool enough to roll out and proceed as above. Great with this soup:

Roasted Red/Orange/Yellow Bell Pepper Soup

I give you all the colors because that's what I got on sale. All red is fine. They were cheap so I mixed them up. Beautiful color though!

4 large red bell peppers (or one orange, one yellow and two red) roasted

1/2 a large diced onion 1 can condensed chicken broth 1-2 cans water (approximate so start with 1 can) 1/2-3/4 cup evaporated milk or half and half Salt and pepper

I roast the peppers in the oven, placing the whole peppers on a foil lined pizza pan. Place in upper middle of oven and set broiler to high. Turn with tongs until they are slightly charred and beginning to collapse. Don't let them really get black all over, or the flesh will be grey and the color pretty dismal when you make the soup. Usually takes about 30 minutes. Throw them in a plastic bag and seal. After about 30 minutes you can carefully slice them in the sink to catch juice, de-seed, and peel off the outer skin. It's messy, but do two batches and you can freeze them. Just cover in olive oil and they thaw beautifully.

Cook the onion in a little olive oil and water until tender in a Dutch oven. Add sliced peppers. Pour in the broth and water and use a stick blender to puree, adding a bit more water if you need. You can do this in a blender but it's pretty messy! If you do, once it's pureed, put back in the original cooking pot. Add milk, salt and pepper and heat until barely ready to boil. Taste and adjust seasonings. Delicious served with a dollop of sour cream on top and a couple of the savory rugelach. Adjust the soup to any thickness you like and you can add more or less milk as well. This should serve four and is easy to double too. Just enough for those 32 rugelach you made!!
