Reflections: EVERY DAY GRACE

The word you see above in the green box is the Greek word that is often translated as "grace". It probably won't escape your notice that the word transliterated is "charis". The words grace and charity are connected in many ways. If you were to try to define the word "grace" what would you say? Is it like love.... similar to forgiveness, maybe being nice to others, giving thanks, goodwill, generosity? I imagine that there is an array of options to define "grace". Pause for a moment and think, "How would you describe you experience when you feel grace given to you?" I would say, GRACE brings justice.

And it is <u>every day</u> grace is what inspires me. When I say 'everyday' I think of something that we are called to live, give and receive each and every day. I also think we are called to make it something common, frequent, not just a once in a while occurrence. Would it surprise you to know that the word 'grace' is found in the Hebrew Scriptures about 9 times. Wait, nine? Yep, in the 27 books of the Old Testament (Hebrew Scriptures) we find that word "grace" about 9 times, give or take a few, based on translations. AND would it surprise you to know that in the four Gospels in the New Testament, the word "grace" appears 4 times? Get outta here! In all the gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John the word "grace" is found just 4 times?? Yup.

BUT in the Epistles in the New Testament (Romans, 1 & 2 Corinthians, Galatians.....) the word "grace" appears 108 times. Hard to believe right?? Why? Why is it that "grace" is mentioned 108 times in the Epistles? In my opinion, it is because in the letters sent to local churches is where the rubber hits the road as they say. The Epistles overall deal with the experiences and problems that people are having in everyday life. Life goes along pretty well, when most things are looked at in theory in my experience. We can look around our cities and nation right now and see that living life "in theory" isn't real life. Living life in theory covers up a myriad of injustices. And then when you actually have to live the grit of life 'everyday', it gets exponentially more difficult and many times, volatile.

Everyday Grace! Can't we compromise and live God's grace on our terms? You know, more realistic for our own wants and needs like: "once in a while grace", "next week grace", "not including my brother-in-law grace", "not in my neighborhood grace", "not until you pay me back grace", "no non-July 4th fireworks grace", "only if you buy be Starbucks grace" "if you stay in your own place grace". You get the idea. That isn't grace at all. The writers of the

Epistles were faced with the nitty gritty of daily life. And wow, it could be ugly, screaming injustice based on wealth, gender, race, religion.

The Apostle Paul wrote 7 of the Epistles in the New Testament. (Romans, Corinthians 1&2, Galatians, Philippians, Philemon, 1 Thessalonians). Paul had a ton of experience with each one of these church communities. Some were on the 'plus side' of the everyday grace scale like the Phillipians, and some, like the Corinthians, were on the 'downside' of everyday grace to put it nicely. Paul's unwavering love and grace demanded that a new community be formed. A community where grace meant justice; everyday justice, not just when it was convenient.

Paul's sense of call and ardent faith in the grace of God lived out in Jesus Christ for Every Day and Every One, was the cornerstone of his ministry to the end. That is hardly where Paul began his journey with Christ. Paul's personal history was one as a synagogue leader who persecuted and even murdered those who didn't fit it to the prescribed hierarchy of the day. And yet, toward the end of his life, everyday grace was his mainstay. Even in jail, facing execution, his everyday grace made no exceptions or exclusions. In God's grace, everyone fits into the plan of new life. We are called to walk in love and grace with one another in every tribulation and celebration. Paul wrote to his congregations knowing that portions of their lives were filled with suffering, abuse, and injustice.

Paul wrote this sequence of faith: "We know that suffering produces endurance, endurance produces character, character produces hope and hope does not disappoint because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us." Suffering seems commonplace for many right now, but pause to imagine the suffering of the least among us. Maybe we are getting a flavor of enduring, but what do others endure if poor, homeless, immigrant? There needs to emerge is a reformed character that brings hope on every level.

For Paul, hope is not a wishful thinking, pie in the sky dream. Hope is grounded in the faithfulness of God. EVERY DAY GRACE. Every day, we hold fast to these words. Grace, endurance, character, hope, love. We have a long road ahead before we can all look justice in the face and proclaim that justice must be for all, not just for some. Theoretical love, grace, and justice have no meaning. We cannot pretend that our lives will ever be what they were before. And I say, it is time. We have an uphill and painfilled climb as we move forward. We have a long road ahead before we can feel any sense of relief from a virus that has claimed hundreds of thousands. We have a long road ahead before we can share an economic recovery. Grace is our dwelling place where we stand with God. God's goodness surrounds us, upholds us and makes us human, in the image of God.

The Rev. Dr. David Lose, who serves in the heart of riot ridden Minneapolis, preached these words to his people. "No tear shed is unnoticed by God. No hurt or frustration is unimportant to God. No tragedy is ignored by God. God is present with grace and hope." EVERY DAY.
