#### September 17, 2019 Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time Lk 16:1-13

Dear St Pius X and St Anthony Church,

Shark Bite? Am I seeing one shark bite another one in the business 'shark tank'? And is Jesus treading into those waters? This parable Jesus tells, mentions a shrewd, dishonest manager being commended. Is Jesus also approving of a deceitful business manager's actions? Not at all. The result remains that the manager still gets the firing from the owner that was coming to him. If Jesus is commending anything, he is only pointing out the creative and clever repentance of the manager. Let's break it down. The owner gives the manager a 'pink slip' notice that he is going to be fired. What is the manager to do now? The market is not good. His skill set is limited. So, he tries to make a bad thing good. He calls his customers in, authorizes them to write down their due bills by a quarter or even half. Why? Some speculate that the manager was only giving up and writing off his own gougingly high commissions. Or he was exposing the owner's rip-off rates of re-sale (the purchaser knows best the true market cost of materials). In both cases, he is cutting the customers grossly inflated bills, and letting them in on the true value of their accounts. The manager is making public the 'inside' exploitative trade practices of the company. The manager might say back to the owner, "You taught me everything I know. Thank You!" When I hear this parable, I think of the common practice of government, business and the revolving door between them. Lobbyists and politicians switch jobs back and forth, in and out of their industries. Politicians exploit their contacts and files to 'grease wheels' favorable to the businesses that hire them. And businesses get their past directors elected in government for future preferences in govt. contract awards and deregulation. Yet, churches aren't immune from such greed, enrichment and 'insider trading'. Church financiers surely carry church investment accounts over into new private ventures just the same as business leaders entering church work can drum up new angles for past associates. (I guess what they say about skinning cats, sadly also goes for fleecing us sheep!) The good news is that Jesus our Good Shepherd knows all about it. He had an 'insider-traitor', and a dramatic confrontation at the revolving door of 'moneychangers' in the Temple. Jesus summarizes today's parable lesson so clearly when he states that ill-gotten gain and desire for wealth interferes with authentic discipleship service. In Luke 16:13, he says, "No servant can serve two masters. He will either hate one and love the other, or be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth-mammon." We may think that worshipping idols are something only found talked about in the Old Testament, but Jesus is clearly saying that money-wealth and its pursuit-acquisition take over God's place, becoming an idol for some people.

So, it is a matter of Priorities! With Jesus, advancing human relationships is always above accumulating material possessions. Jesus' business model is "people over profits". In the church today, the catch-phrases are 'Credible Witness' and 'Integral Human Development', which means how we go about advancing the mission goals (the means of raising funds-doing business) either supports or works against the mission message itself (the end of proclaiming God's Kingdom). Jesus led gently into this teaching on the 'corruptibility of riches' by saying, "Make friends for yourselves with dishonest wealth, so that when it fails, you will be welcomed into eternal dwellings." When it Fails (No If's)! Basically, friends endure. Wealth won't. He followed that immediately with "The person trustworthy in very small matters is also trustworthy in great ones; and the person dishonest in very small matters is also dishonest in great ones." We know Jesus' first priority in the kingdom was taking care of the 'little ones'. Have you ever heard the story of St Lawrence's martyrdom? In the 250's after Emperor Valerian executed Pope Sixtus, he arrested the Pope's treasurer St Lawrence. He demanded that Lawrence hand over the treasure of the church to him. So Lawrence went and sold everything, giving the proceeds to the poor in the streets. When he returned to face the Emperor and give an account, he told him, 'Behind me in the street is the real treasure of Christ's Church: the People, the children of God!' Of course, the emperor only knew one language, so St Lawrence was quickly dispatched on to heaven, but his 'credible witness' of serving the poor still stands with us. No two masters: either God or wealth. St Lawrence did not accumulate capital, he saved 'souls'. If we wonder how Jesus' teaching was received by the home crowd, just notice how the very next verse reads, "The Pharisees, who loved money, heard all these things and sneered at him" (Luke 16:14). But does it matter what the Pharisees thought about Jesus? No, what matters is what we think about His command to use money and all material possessions to better strengthen and multiply our relationships. Not just accumulating earthly deposits for ourselves, but developing lasting relationships to God and others before our own withdrawal! A man asked me once, 'When I'm gone, I wonder if anyone will think of me, and pray for me?' That brings it home to me. At heaven's gate, we are not asked the balance of our 401K's, we are only asked, "What did you do for the least of my brothers and sisters?" (Matthew 25:40).
