#### FROM THE KITCHEN OF.....

This new feature was suggested during the Tuesday morning net. Thank you!! It is a wonderful idea! So get those recipes out and start sending them in. I will start off with one of Darwin's favorite dishes. It is also easy as it uses a crock pot.

Turkey Monterey

1 doz corn tortillas

2 cans diced green chilies

1 24 oz. Jar salsa (I use Safeway brand mild)

1 can cream of mushroom soup

1 can cream of chicken soup

3 to 5 cups of diced turkey

1 lb Cheddar cheese

1 lb Monterey Jack Cheese

(I use 2 lbs of the Mexican 4 cheese shredded Sargento or Kirkland)

1 jar mild taco sauce

Slice tortillas and set aside. Mix together the soups, salsa and chilies.

In the crock pot layer in order: Corn tortillas, turkey, sauce, cheese. Repeat layers 3 to 4 times, ending with cheese.

Top with mild taco sauce.

Cook on low until fully melted 8 to 10 hours.

### A BIT OF HUMOR

**Submitted by Robby, N6NML** From an e-mail making the rounds. **An Accident Report** 

I am writing in response to your request for "additional information." In block number 30 of the accident report form, I put "poor planning" as the cause for my accident. You said in your last letter that I should explain more fully. I trust that the following detail will be sufficient.

I am an amateur radio operator. On the day of the accident, I was working alone on the top section of my new 80-foot antenna tower. When I completed my work, I discovered that I had, over the course of several trips up the tower, brought about 300 lbs. of tools and spare hardware. Rather than carry the now unneeded tools and materials down by hand, I decided to lower the items in a small barrel by using a pulley, which fortunately was attached to the pole at the tip of the tower. Securing the rope at ground level, I went up to the top of the tower and loaded the tools and materials into the barrel. Then I went back to the ground and untied the rope, holding it tightly

to insure a slow descent of the

300 lbs. of tools.

You will note in block number 11 of the accident report form that I weigh 155 lbs. Due to my surprise at being jerked off the ground so suddenly, I lost my presence of mind and forgot to let go of the rope. Needless to say, I proceeded at a rapid rate up the side of the tower. In the vicinity of the 40-foot level, I met the barrel coming down. This explains my fractured skull and broken clavicle.

Slowed only slightly, I continued my rapid ascent, not stopping until the fingers of my right hand were two knuckles deep into the pulley. Fortunately by this time I had regained my presence of mind and was able to hold tightly on the rope in spite of the pain. At about the same time however, the barrel hit the ground. The bottom fell out of the barrel. Devoid of the weight of the tools, the barrel now weighed 20 pounds.

I refer you again to my weight in block number 11. As you might guess, I began a rapid descent down the side of the tower. In the vicinity of the 40-foot level, I met the barrel coming up. This accounts for the two fractured ankles and the lacerations or my legs and lower body.

The encounter with the barrel slowed me enough to lessen my injuries when I fell into the pile of tools, and fortunately only three vertebras were cracked. I am sorry to report, however, that as I lay there on the tools in pain, unable to stand, and watching the empty barrel 80 feet above me, I again lost my presence of mind.

Get on the radio and say "Hello." To obtain copies, e-mail the "Hello" campaign hello@arrl.org. Donations are welcome (make checks out to "ARRL") to help cover return postage to ARRL, Public Relations, 225 Main St, Newington, CT 06111. "Hello" logo bumper stickers will be on sale through the ARRL on-line catalog. Buttons for the "Hello" campaign will be available at Dayton Hamvention and at other major Amateur Radio events. Banners for the "Hello" campaign will be flying at Dayton Hamvention and at the National Association of Broadcasters convention in April. After that, they will be made available for use at major events in 2006.
