FROM PASTOR MUSE

*You desire truth in the inward being; therefore
teach me wisdom in my secret heart.*

Psalm 51:6

I was driving to Starbucks today (*not really a surprise*) when I passed through the ever-present “speed trap” on State Street, also no surprise. It seems that the police officer is there multiple times a week with a radar gun, clocking traffic. I am not opposed to “speed traps” in that they do help to keep the flow of traffic within the legal limit to some degree. Yet I would say that they are meant to catch people breaking the law. The very function of such activity is to identify those who are breaking the law of the road and punishing them accordingly. Hence the name “trap.” There is no celebration or acknowledgment of following the law, just a punishment when the law is broken. This, for many, is how God works.

God is up in heaven waiting for the person to break the law, watching with some moral radar gun to see who will transgress and then punishes them accordingly. And the punishment is not a fine, but some other action or circumstance: illness, broken relationships, pain, loss of money, or some other personal struggle. God sits and watches humans, waiting to inflict suffering. We hear it in statements like, “What did I do to deserve this?” or “Why

are you punishing me?” or “God this is not fair!” All of these statements point to a belief structure that sees an ever-present, ever disappointed, ever punishing God. I want to contend this by making something clear about God and ourselves.

God does not have to sit up in heaven and wait for us to transgress, because we will by our nature transgress. It is part of our base existence, sin. We will sin. God knows we will sin. God does not have to look to find us sinning. We are broken, and we will always go the road of sin. God would spend all day, every day of existence punishing us for sinning. I do not believe God is sitting in heaven watching us to see when we will sin, and then dole out punishment. I believe God is sitting in heaven watching to see when we strive to overcome sin and then pass out gold stars.

When we come to the truth of our brokenness before God and the fact that

we deserve punishment but get salvation we should be driven to live a life in honor of that gift. Paul says, “we have been given a spirit of freedom, not to fall back into slavery.” God wants to see us live into that spirit of freedom, by choosing to turn from sin. Choosing to live a life and interact with creation in a way that strives to be righteous and not sinful. This has to be a choice on the part of the believer, because without that choice, then the believer will just slip into sin and act accordingly.

Unless the believer chooses to seek righteousness and build up the work of God the believer will just naturally slip into sin and destructive behavior. For example: When gossip, belittling or vile conversation takes place, a believer must choose to engage

righteousness and stop the conversation and hold the speakers accountable. This is a choice, that if not made, will entice the believer to engage in sin and join the gossip, belittling and vile nature of the conversation. Another example: When a believer has the option to stay home from worship, engage in other activities, that offer far more earthly pleasure, the believer must choose the path of righteousness and engage God in worship. The unwillingness to make that choice for God will lead to default brokenness of worldly pleasure. The list goes on and on, the believer must make choices multiple times each day to overcome sin.

God is looking for the believer to actively choose righteousness and the path of faith over the path of sin. The path of sin is easy, do nothing, and you will be on it. Make no choice,

and sin will be your choice. There is no middle ground in this. God is not looking to see when a believer sins, God is more interested in the times the believer chooses to strive for righteousness. The choice is the first step toward a stronger spirit of freedom and a closer walk with God. We do not choose salvation, that is done for us, but we do choose whether we will live into that gift or enjoy the satisfaction of sin.
