MAHC 2016 Grant Season

This year, the Maine Acadian Heritage Council will distribute \$33,200 in funds received from the National Park Service. MAHC members and the St. John Valley community are invited to apply for the following three grant opportunities: the Heritage Trail Guides, the Acadian Heritage Speakers and Performers, and the Education Resource Development.

\$26,000 in Heritage Trail Guide Grants are earmarked for St. John Valley member museums and historical sites. These grants support hiring, training, and retaining personnel at local museums and historical sites. At these sites, personnel will be made available to welcome visitors, guide them through the site while educating them about the history of the buildings, their artifacts, and Valley Acadians.

\$2,500 is available for Acadian Heritage Speakers and Performers Grants. These grants make it possible for individuals and organizations to hire speakers and performers at festivals and other public venues in the St. John Valley. Performers are experts in the fields relating to Acadian history and culture, including: music, traditional arts, and French language.

\$6,700 are earmarked for Education Resource Development Grants to promote and preserve distinctive forms of Acadian cultural expression including language, performing arts, crafts, and folklore indicative of life in Northern Maine's St. John Valley.

The proposed projects will educate all residents of the St. John Valley, whether in the classroom or at public venues. Examples of past awarded projects: educational fieldtrips, resources for the classroom, and teacher workshops.

Completed applications will be evaluated for eligibility and ranked for funding in accordance with the priorities and criteria indicated on the form. A general accounting of spending is requested once the grant funds have been used. The Council also requires that any publicity about the funded activities name the Maine Acadian Heritage Council as a financial supporter of the activities.

The Council reserves the right to adjust the amount of each respective award depending on the availability of funds and feasibility of funding certain projects at less than the amount requested.

A public announcement of the awarded grants will be made at the Council's annual dinner and meeting, on Sunday May 22nd.

Last year, MAHC funded 10 heritage projects. We also funded a one-week teacher-training institute free of charge to all Valley teachers. We are deeply grateful to the National Park Service for its financial support of the people of the Saint John Valley.

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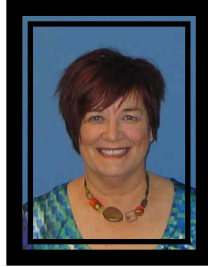

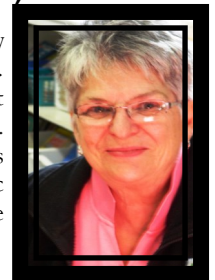
Meet Our Voting Members

Lise Pelletier, President



Lise is director of the Acadian Archives/Archives acadiennes at the University of Maine at Fort Kent. She received a B.A. degree in English and in French from the University of Moncton and an MA in French from the University of Maine. She has been teaching French and Acadian History and Literature since 1991. She was a founding board member of the Congrès mondial acadien 2014. Lise has created a teacher's institute about Acadians of the St. John Valley and has put together educational resources for teachers in an "Acadian Treasure Chest". She has been involved in local history since the 1970's.

Judy Paradis

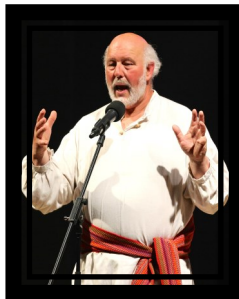

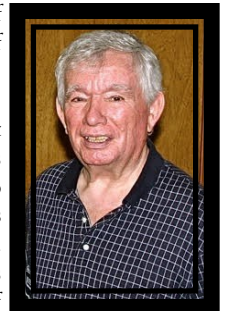
Marilyn McBreairty



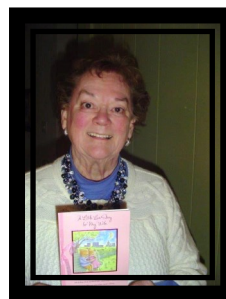

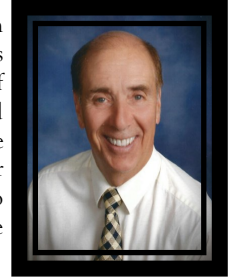

Reynald represents the Town of Eagle Lake on the MAHC Board. (No picture available)



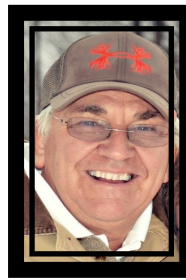
Donald Raymond
