Pastor's Message Continued:

People have asked what they can do to help ... the thing is that I don't know what to expect, so I can't quantify things and answer those questions. Tracie and I have placed this in God's hands, and we will go where He leads us. Please continue to pray for her ... for a successful surgery and recovery. And if possible, allow me some Grace if I seem a little scatter brained over the next few months. I still plan to be in the pulpit most of the Sundays that encompass her recovery.

I pray that as we start another school year with our families that you keep one thing close to your hearts. I have been convicted of late that I am not doing enough to keep my flock in the word. So, as I was thinking ... this analogy of the start of school came to mind. When we are in school, we are learning because we are expected to absorb the material and try to commit it to memory. Because everything said in class is testable and many teachers will remind their students of that exact thing. Taking that analogy ... how are our spiritual studies going? Have we committed to memory all or even some of the verses in the bible aside from John 3:16? I talk a lot about immersing ourselves in the word continually. There is a reason for this statement. If we are continually in the word, then we will know where to go when problems arise. We will know where to find comfort when we are saddened by events of this life. We will know not to be anxious or fearful when the going gets tough.

Familiarity with scripture should bring awareness and comfort. We should not wait until problems arise and then be forced to google what passage may help us through it. WE SHOULD KNOW what the word is going to say. Just like being a student in class ... everything is testable come judgment day.

I am not trying to scare you ... I am trying to remind you of the great importance of spending consistent time in God's Word. We have no problem sitting on a couch and binge watch our favorite shows on Netflix, but how much time are we willing to spend in the study of God's Word? We will soon have two bible studies going at the same time for the first time since I have arrived here. That's great, but having the same people involved in both is not so great. It assures those 8-10 people that they are doing what we have been commanded to do ... "Abide in His Word." But what about the other 50 plus members of this Body of Christ? I would implore you to make a point to get involved in a bible study. Don't be afraid that you're not smart enough and that you don't know enough to participate in a bible study. That's THE POINT! None of us know it all, and when we get together surrounded by God's word, we learn and become educated regarding what God wants from each one of us. Better to know God and what He wants for us then to have to google passages when we are struggling. Amen?

Thoughts from the Deacon's Den by Deacon Gene Bostwick

What is Righteousness?

"This life therefore is not righteousness, but growth in righteousness, not health, but healing, not being but becoming, not rest but exercise. We are not yet what we shall be, but we are growing toward it, the process is not yet finished, but it is going on, this is not the end, but it is the road. All does not yet gleam in glory, but all is being purified." Martin Luther wrote these beautiful words in 1521 as part of his defense of the 95 treatise he posted.

Let's examine this based on the truth of Holy Scripture. The first thing that comes to my mind is repentance. Without that small voice of being sorry, as Jesus taught, there can be no growth in righteousness. Mark 4:17 From that time Jesus began to preach, saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." And as we say in our liturgy every Sunday. "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." 1 John 1:9

I believe we are all growing in righteousness if we choose to make righteousness important. One of the ways we make growth in righteousness important in our lives is by participating in church with fellow believers. Just like our prayer life and reading the Bible, I do not think Church is optional. We read in Hebrews 10:24-25 and let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works,

not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near. By hearing, seeing, tasting, and smelling what righteousness is to God we in turn grow towards God.

So what is righteousness to God? Because that is all that matters. Anyone can call themselves righteous but what is righteousness to God in Heaven?

Righteousness to God is Jesus Christ.

By loving Jesus Christ more every day, thanking Him for his sacrifice, taking part in His blessed communion, we begin to gleam his Love. It is in this love, faith and thankfulness for his Son where we travel on the road of truth. We grow closer to our creator when we ask for forgiveness and cast all of our sinful self at the foot of the cross. Jesus willingly sacrificed himself to allow us to become beings reconnected with God through Him.

We might not gleam in glory as Martin Luther states but we are absolutely being purified the more we say it is not about me and all about you dear Lord. Thy will be done.

Now take this knowledge of complete forgiveness in Jesus Christ and SHINE.

Status of Projects:

Kneelers and Pew Cushions:

The kneelers and pew cushions were ordered several months ago. The fabric that matches our chairs and alter carpet in the sanctuary has been obtained. Additionally, the foam rubber for the kneelers and pews has also been obtained. At this time, all materials have been secured. Labor shortages persist everywhere. No specific delivery date is currently available.

Special Thanks:

I would like to once again thank the Wiggen's family for their support in maintaining the church grounds; especially cutting the grass. This is a huge task.

Future projects:

- Replace the floor in the main hallway/narthex of the church. Estimated cost \$2,500. On your next visit to the church please take a moment to look at the floor. This is our next project. If you are interested in donating for this project please identify your contribution accordingly.
- Replace the floor in the kitchen. Estimated cost \$1,500.
- Replace the exterior door and framing from the Pastor's office to the outside. Approximate cost \$1,000.
- Long-term project will be to repair and replace the deteriorating asphalt in the parking lot and entrance drives including repainting the striping for parking spaces. We have not received a specific quote for this work, but it will cost approximately \$25,000.



Venturing Crew Update

What is Venturing?

Greetings to the congregation and particularly to the young adults, ages 14-20 (or 13 and completed the 8th grade). This month, the Venturing crew just wanted to share what "Venturing" and the "Venturing crew" is.

Venturing is an inclusive older youth/young adult program sponsored by the Boy Scouts of America. It is a relatively young program and is what "Explorers" became back in 1998 (for you young-at-heart adults who may remember it from your youth). It is also a fully co-educational program, meaning boys and girls participate together at the unit level which is the crew.

Venturing emphasizes four main areas, known as ALPS - adventure, leadership, person growth and service. The Venturing program uses the components listed below to meet our needs and the goals of the Boy Scouts of America, which include building character, developing citizenship and fostering personal fitness:

Leadership and Mentoring – Venturers are given opportunities to learn and apply proven leadership skills. A Venturing crew is led by youth officers. Training courses, such as the Introduction to Leadership Skills for Crews, uses experiential learning to teach Venturers how to lead effectively. Once Venturers have led several activities, they are asked to then mentor the other leaders in their crew.

Group Activities and Adventure – Venturers work with teams on everything they do. Their success is dependent on the interaction and cooperation of all, preparing Venturers for their future careers and paths. The crew has experienced numerous adventures backpacking in New Mexico, indoor skydiving, kayaking, caving and rock climbing to name a few.

Recognition – Venturing includes an optional awards program that acknowledges and recognizes our youth for their progress through Venturing's four main areas of emphasis (ALPS).

Adult Association – Adults serve to advise the youth as they plan events and make decisions, while ensuring the program remains youth-inspired and youth-led. This partnership provides our youth with essential connections and lessons that will prove useful in their future paths.

Ideals – Venturers are expected to know and live by the Scout Oath and Law, ideals of Scouting created to inspire a culture of servant leadership, both inside and outside of Venturing. The Scout Oath (duty to God) and Law (a Scout is reverent), as well as Venturing's Trust award, promote a greater awareness of their faith.

Group Identity – Venturers are not asked to conform to a set uniform. Instead, they have the opportunity to create their own standards for attire at their events and meetings, as they see fit. We have an official crew t-shirt but some members also like to occasionally wear the official Venturing uniform.


Service – Venturers serve their local and distant communities through personal and group service as the crew plans activities and individuals make progress through the Venturing awards program. We have participated in service for St. Paul's, the local community and the environment.

All that in mind, we really aim to have fun together in various challenging and satisfying activities.




