

Recipient: All Party Leaders

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We call for Edna's Law and a public inquiry into whistleblowing in all sectors, because the Public Interest Disclosure Act and the Francis Review have failed to protect the public, the victims or the whistleblowers in any sector.

We call for:

- 1. ONE law to protect ALL whistle-blowers in ALL sectors Edna's Law.
- 2. A public inquiry so that those responsible for wrongdoing, including victimisation of whistleblowers, or concealing wrongdoing are held to account and the wrongdoing of organisations and named individuals can be exposed to avoid recurrence.
- 3. That all those whistle-blowers who have been failed by the system and by the Public Interest Disclosure Act be given full redress.

Without accountability nothing can truly change. This is the root of the problem. It is impossible to build "a new culture" on an unjust and rotten foundation and to try to do so is to condone the past wrongdoing.

Edna's Law will protect the protectors and therefore protect the public.

It has arisen because it is easy to milk the public purse (eg PFI deals) because the officials believe that by outsourcing they have outsourced the delivery obligation. They have not: they are left with the obligation to deliver & protect and no money to do it with because they have gifted it away. A whistleblower is a person who has humanity at birth and who does not lose it thereafter. They are very ordinary people who expect to get on in their lives without burden including having to jump the hurdle of the vested interests who control the courts, causing them to be categorised as "not fit for purpose" House of Lords Select Committee re Mental Capacity Act 2005 and the Court of Protection. The same applies to the SCCO (costs court); the Companies and Bankruptcy Court; and the Court of Appeal where appellant's papers are removed & replaced by forgeries by those with no standing, appellant not told, and a neutral citation number attached to a fiction posted on BAILII, corrupt publisher abusing the Charities Act controlled by representatives of the vested interests as "trustees".
